THE CHANCELLOR

 $\hat{a}\200\234$ Chancellor $\hat{a}\200\235$ is an office that goes back to antiquity: the original Chancel lor or cancellarius (as the office

was known) regulated access to the Roman Tribune. In medieval times, the office became asso ciated with

the heads of the writing departments of the early kings. Because so few people were literat e, a chancellor

was necessarily learned. This is why the heads and spokepersons of the early universities \boldsymbol{w} ere also accorded

the title. More recently, the office has become largely symbolic. The executive head of a \boldsymbol{u} niversity is its

vice-chancellor.

Justice Pius Langa is the sixth Chancellor of the University of Natal. His predecessors are : The Honourable

D G Shepstone (1949-1966), Dr G G Campbell (1967-1973), Dr B A Armitage (1973-1983), the Ho nourable

R N Leon QC (1983-1992), and Archbishop D E Hurley (1993-1998).

THE MACE

The Chancellorâ\ $200\231s$ Mace is used on ceremonial occasions presided over by the Chancell or and is regarded as

the Chancellorâ\200\231s â\200\234staff of officeâ\200\235. It symbolises the Universityâ \200\231s protection of its Chancellor.

The use of the mace as a symbol of authority has a long history. The head of a copper mace, which

apparently dates back to the 12 Century before Christ, has been excavated at Beyce Sultan in Asia. In the

early centuries, churchmen who went to war often carried a mace in preference to a sword. One side of the

mace-head was beautifully decorated with the owner $\hat{200}231$ emblem and on the other side w as a large knob which

served as a weapon, but was always round as a reminder of church law forbidding the sheddin ${\sf g}$ of blood. In

the early centuries the mace was a symbol of the king $\hat{a}\200\231s$ authority. During the power struggle between the

king and the Commons in the $13\hat{a}\204$ Century, the king gave the speaker the mace as a symbol of his indemnity

against arrest.

The Mace was designed by Mr G H Atkins, senior lecturer in sculpture in the University \hat{a} Department of

Fine Arts. The Mace was made in England, it was first used at the 1970 graduation ceremonie s.

THE ARMORIAL BEARINGS

(see front cover)

The armorial bearings of the University of Natal were awarded by the College of Arms in London.

The two black wildebeest come from the arms of the Province of KwaZulu-Natal, They are show n in full

course to symbolise movement and progress. The two open books represent the universal herit age of

knowledge and the two centres of the University, Durban and Pietermaritzburg. The five poin ted star refers

to the naming of Natal by Portuguese navigators when they landed for the first time at Durb an on $\operatorname{Christmas}$

Day in 1497. Stella Aurorae (star of the dawn) symbolises the role of the University in bringing to light new

knowledge and spreading the enlightening influence of education.

ACADEMIC DRESS

The wearing of gowns by judges, ministers, teachers and scholars is an ancient and signific

ant custom.

When the graduating students at universities receive their diplomas or degrees, they, too (and for some, only

once in their lives) wear the caps and gowns and so participate in this long tradition. By wearing the ancient

regalia, they join hands with students past and students present.

In modern academic ceremonies the standard cap and gown are almost universally worn. Of all the

components of the costume, the hood conveys the greatest amount of information: it makes clear the level of

the degree, the faculty in which it was given, and the institution which awarded it.

CONVOCATION

After being capped by the Chancellor, each graduate moves across the stage and hands the ho od to the

President of Convocation (or representative). The President places the hood upon the gradua $te\hat{a}200\231s$ shoulders.

At the end of the ceremony, after the Chancellorâ $\200\231s$ procession has left the stage, the President leads a

procession of the new graduates out of the hall, row by row, to symbolise their acceptance into, and future

membership of, the Convocation of the University of Natal, the statutory body through which graduates have

the opportunity to play a continuing role in the affairs of the University.

Professor Raidt was born in Ellwangen, Germany but has studied and taught in South Africa since 1954. She has had a distinguished career as an academic first at the University of Cape

Town and then at the University of the Witwatersrand, of which she is now an Emeritus Professor and Honorary Professional Research Fellow.

Professor Raidt has an impressive publication record in the areas of historical linguistics and

Afrikaans literature and language, having published six books and over 80 articles, as well as

educational publications and study guides. She has also held many editorships of journals in this

field. One of her books, Afiikaans en sy Europese Verlede, first published in 1971, \hat{a} \200\234remains to

this day the most thorough and authoritative account of the history of Afrikaansâ\200\235.

While excelling in this area of specialisation Professor Raidt is also highly regarded for her

contributions to another important discipline - Ethics and Business Management. In 1993 she co-founded an international, accredited journal, PRAXIS: Journal for Christian Business Management, of which she is the Editor. She has written and lectured extensively on Christian

Business Management both at home and abroad and has earned worldwide respect as a leader in this field.

Professor Raidt was a driving force in promoting the first Catholic University of Southern Africa, which was opened in 1999 as St Augustine College of South Africa. She became the first Vice-Chancellor and Chief Executive Officer. Under her leadership, St Augustine College,

which currently offers degrees at Master and PhD levels, is already beginning to make a mar \boldsymbol{k} as

a leading academic institution.

Professor Raidt is a distinguished academic who has dedicated her life to the pursuit of knowledge and scholarship, the promotion of academic values and the building of the new South Africa. The University of Natal honours her for excellence in the enhancement of academic learning and in promoting the progress of human society.

A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE UNIVERSITY OF NATAL Early Days

Natal University College - the forerunner of the University of Natal - opened its doors in Pietermaritzburg in 1910 with eight

professors and 57 students. Lectures in Classics, English and Philosophy, Law, Modern Langu ages, Botany and Geology,

Chemistry and Physics, Mathematics and Zoology were held at various venues throughout the c ity, including Maritzburg

College, the Natal Museum building and the City Hall.

In August 1912, Old Main Building (built on 16 hectares of land donated by the Pietermaritz burg Corporation) was opened and the core of the present-day Pietermaritzburg campus was established.

In 1923, NUC extended its tuition to Durban with university-level courses in Commerce and E ngineering being offered at

the Technical College. In 1928, NUC took over full responsibility for university classes in Durban, A generous donation by

Mr T B Davis, whose son, Howard Davis, had been killed during the battle of the Somme in Wo rld War I, facilitated the

building of Howard College on 20 hectares of land on the Berea, which formed the core of a separate campus in Durban.

Howard College was formally opened in 1931.

Largely through the efforts of Fabian Socialist Dr Mabel Palmer, separate classes for $19\ bl$ ack education students at NUC

were introduced in Durban in 1936. This number grew to nearly 900 by 1960. However, as in the case of the University's

Medical School, founded for black students in 1951, classes still reflected the segregated nature of South Africa under apartheid.

Multi campus system

In 1953, the administrative control of the University was moved from Pietermaritzburg to Du rban. In response to mounting

travelling costs, the two centres were academically separated in 1973. Recent restructuring has occasioned the re-merging of

some faculties, with the establishment of university-wide single faculties of Engineering, Education and Law. At both

centres, departments have been replaced by multi-disciplinary schools of cognate discipline s. With the incorporation of

Edgewood College of Education in 2001, the University acquired another campus in Pinetown, while the $Medical\ School$,

which was renamed The Nelson R. Mandela School of Medicine in 2000, constitutes a fourth campus.

Leadership

The University of Natal is fortunate to boast among its past vice-chancellors and principal s some exceptional leaders. Its first

principal, Professor John Bews (1930-38), was a world-renowned botanist, while Dr E G Malhe rbe (1945-65) was known

internationally as an educationalist. They were followed by Professor Owen Horwood (1966-70), Professor Francis Stock

(1970-77), Professor N D Clarence (1977-84), Professor Piet de V Booysen (1984-91) and Professor James Leatt (1991-93).

South Africaâ $\200\231s$ first female Vice-Chancellor, Brenda Gourley, served the University of Natal from 1993 to 2001. The present

incumbent, Professor Malegapuru Makgoba, is an internationally-recognised Molecular Immunol ogist and a graduate of the

University of Natalâ $\200\231s$ Medical School. Chancellors have also been distinguished figures, not least the present Chancellor,

Justice Pius Langa, and the recently-retired Archbishop Denis Hurley.

The Struggle for Autonomy

A government ruling that the Medical School should be closed to white undergraduates was th

e first major inroad into the

University $200\231s$ freedom to determine its own admissions criteria. In 1957, this was the reatened further by a Bill that provided for

the removal of the Medical School from the University $\hat{200}231$ s control, and the exclusion of $\hat{200}234$ non-white 200235 students from the

University $\hat{a} \geq 00 \geq 31$ s other Faculties. Academic staff at the Medical School resolved to resign en masse if the Bill was enacted. As a

result, the government withdrew the proposal to remove the Medical School from the University $200\231$ s control.

The government's Extension of University Act of 1959 limited new enrolments, other than tho se at Medical School, to whites

only and thwarted the University's aspirations to serve the educational needs of broader so ciety. Although NUC was granted

full university status in 1949, it was not until 1983, when the University circumvented the government's racial admission

"quotasâ $200\235$ by an appeal to the High Court, that the University could attempt to meet its responsibility to serve the educational needs of the broader community.

The University today

Today, the University of Natal has approximately 27 500 students who represent all sectors of South African society.

The University is known as a centre of excellence in Affica, is one of South Africa's top r esearch institutions, and has links

with hundreds of international institutions. The University has led the way in the establis $\frac{1}{2}$ hment of a number of multi-

disciplinary innovations such as the Centre for Ethics, the Leadership Centre, a School of Maritime Studies, the Centre for

Entrepreneurship and the Centre for Civil Society.

The University is also committed to community-based education and service learning. In keep ing with its mission to be a

socially-responsive institution, significant research is being conducted in many sectors of the University into issues such as HIV/AIDS.

The University has, over the course of time, built an impressive reputation as an instituti on of high academic standing. It has

shown itself over time to be capable of adapting to a changing context and responding to the needs of the region. It is a

mission that the University intends to fulfil with even greater efficacy as it engages with the opportunities presented by the

intended merger with the University of Durban-Westville.
