ZIMBABWE'S Commissioner of Taxes, Gershem Past, calls his country a "tax heaven", and strongly defends the imposition of controversial withholding taxes on gross proceeds at share and real estate transactions. A 109%. capital gains withholding tax on share deals was temporarily suspended this year when the local stock market came to a halt, but similar systems remain in force. on gross income real estate sales.

He has angered blacks by leading the charge to end welfare and speaking with a forked tongue on the application of affirmative action. In Africa, his record is spotty: he plays hardball with the Serbians on Kosovo, but won't come to the rescue of Sierra Leone's struggling democracy.

Chinese smuggled to SA

Cape Town Whole families are being smuggled into South Africa from the Chinese mainland, and the rate is increasing, says the police Aliens Investigation Unit.

An illegal smuggling network led by the so-called Snakehead Gang, a member of the Hong Kong based Chinese triads, was linked to the smuggling of people into the United States, Japan and European countries such as Germany.

The head of the Aliens Investigation Unit, Superintendent Deon van der Westhuizen, said eight murders in South Africa could be linked to the Chinese triads - a Chinese version of the Italian mafia - as well as several kidnappings and disappearances.

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There has been an increase in the movement of people illegally from mainland China, and it is our experience that this results in an equal increase in organised crime.

Supt van der Westhuizen said the

Chinese triads were involved in prostitution, gambling and extortion,

Some of these Chinese gangs operate under guise of student organisations - and have branches in Pretoria and Cape Town. There are study centres which get people into the country legally, but then they remain in the country illegally.

Nahuo Hamaguchi, a senior police inspector in the National Police Agency, said Chinese triads brought with them violent crime.

WASHINGTON - The US Commerce Department ruled definitively this week that tax breaks Columbus Stainless received from the previous government were an export subsidy, giving the joint ventures - CXPRTS to the US an unfair and undue edge over domestic producers.

Trade and Industry Minister Alec Erwin has warned the US: he may find it difficult to gripe with the US Trade Representative on the issue.

The department concluded Columbus dumped stainless steel plate in the US market at well below the prices it charged its domestic customers at home. A dumping duty has been assessed at 41.69% on the dumped duty to offset the alleged export subsidies at 33%. These will become effective if, as expected, the US International Trade Commission decides next May that LES producers have been harmed or could suffer unless the duties are imposed to stem imports.

Both duties were higher than the preliminary penalties the Commerce Department announced last August. John Rehm, Columbus Washington attorney, said it was highly unusual for duties to go up between preliminary and final rulings.

Columbus marketing director John Rowe said the Thedeburg Steelnaker had not exported plate in coil to the US since last August. and would not resume

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sates unless the trade commission overruled the duties.

The one piece of good news, Rowe said, was that the Commerce Department had rejected the petitioners' claim that the Industrial Development Corpora-

tion's one third stake in the Columbus
venture should be treated as a counter-

The Post on March 9 quoted unnamed senior military officers criticising Zambia's ability to defend itself, saying it would not withstand any attacks by the far superior army of neighbouring Angola.

Relations between the neighbouring countries have been tense over Angolan allegations that Zambia is supplying arms to Angolan rebels.

Mâ\200\231membe said police detective Moses Xdakala told him: "Your story carries a byline of Staff Reporters, forcing us to arrest all the reporters so that they can disclose who gave them the informationâ\200\235.

The paper said Mâ\200\231membe refused to disclose any information on his reporters' news gathering.

He was released on bail of 50000 kwacha (\$25) and is expected to appear in court on spying charges

With nine other Post reporters.

The charges carry a maximum penalty of life imprisonment.

Mâ\200\231membe has accused the government of trying to close down the controversial award-winning daily by obstructing its journalism.

The Post faces several civil suits, including one filed by President Frederick Chiluba after it described him as a marijuana-smoking â\200\234twinâ\200\235.

PRESIDENT Nelson Mandela will depart from Johannesburg without having accomplished one of his objectives -â\200\224 while still president to see Libyan leader Muammar Gaddafi-\201 in South Africa-\201ca.

Mandela - Fresh from brokering an internal diplomatic coup around the trial of two Libyan suspects in the 1988 bombing of PanAm Flight 103 over Lockerbie, Scotland â\200\224 had indicated in 1995 that he wanted to invite the Libyan leader to the country for the 10th anniversary of the 1995 government provided for the African National Congress in the 1995 fight against apartheid

Mandela excluded the invitation to Gaddafi-\201 and Cuban president Fidel Castro to thank them for their contribution to the 1995 fight against

apartheid and for supporting the liberation movements, particularly the ANC.

Opposition parties at the time criticised the President's invitation to the two leaders saying it would send the wrong signal to foreign investors as the two leaders were regarded as world outcastsâ\200\234-

Nevertheless, Castro visited the country and addressed parliament in a session boycotted by opposition parties including the Freedom Front and the National Party-

With only two days left before Parliament wraps up its activities before the country's second democratic elections on June 2, Mandela's wish to see the Libyan leader in the country while he is President is fading fast.

Mandela helped broker a joint initiative with Saudi Arabia to convince Libya to extradite two suspects in the trial for the bombing

of Pan Am Flight 103 which killed 270 people in the air and on the ground.

Libya officially announced and informed the United Nations that it will turn over the two suspects by April 6.

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Presidential spokesman Mr. Pheko Mankahlana said it was unfortunate that Gaddafi was unable to come to South Africa because of both presidents' work schedules-
