EDITORâ\200\231S LETTER.

September 1st, 1946. My dear Girls, Past aud Present,

We are approaching the end of a year that will always be remembered as an important one in the history of Wykeham School, for, on February 1st, 1946, it ceased to be a private concern and acquired the status of a Public School under a Board of Trusteesâ\200\224a digni~ fied status, more appropriate to a school, now well known throughout South Africa for forty vears of progressive education. The change has of course entailed considerable financial outlay, and none of us who wish to see Wykeham still in the forefront of the New Education Movement, which is after all the best guarantee of World Peace to come, want the School's efforts crippled by keavy bonds. The response from the Old Girls and Friends of the School to the Trust Fund Appeal, to date in cash  $\hat{A}$ £3,745 3s. 7d., has cheered us all tremendously. not only because of the money that has flowed in, but as a proof of how real your affection for Wykeham is, and how readily you co-operate with one another in a good cause, both inside and outside the school. It means that there exists that intangible bond between you, of the same spiritual quality, if in a lesser degree, as binds together the units of the British Empire, that precious pattern, to our anxious and chaotic world, of a League of Nations that really works, because fundamental in it are ideals of love and loyalty and not merely considerations of economics and self-interest.

Wykeham is indeed fortunate to have acquired a Board of Trustees such as ours â\200\224 all busy men of wide interests. Our Chairman, Mr. A. T. Allison, has, for many years past, proved himself a firm friend and wise counsellor. His outstanding financial ability and know-ledge will be a great strength to us, for the next few years, until the Bond is paid off and the necessary building plans completed, cannot fail to be an uphill battle. We have also on the Board two of Natal's outstanding educationalistsâ\200\224 Mr. S. W. Pape, ex-Headmaster of Maritzburg College, and Mr. K. M. Pennington, Vice-Principal of Michaelhouse. Senator P. H. Taylor, who has been Mayor of Maritzburg, Member of the Provincial Council, and Member of the Senate of the Union

Parliament, and Rev. C. P. Jeudwine, Vicar of St. Peterâ\200\231s, Maritzburg, also bring to the Board wisdom and experience in the business and educational worlds.

We have three of our outstanding Old Girls also as Trustees, Rose-Ella Waring, who, with her sisters, has done so much to get the Trust Fund goingâ\200\224Jane Fincken, distinguished for her War Work in Serbia during World War I, and one of our few South African Sculptors, though of late farming has again become her main preoccupation, and Lorna Hime, beloved Vice-President of the Old Girl's Association, always to be found to the fore if there is any particularly difficult or burdensome task to be done in or out of the School. We have a good hope that, setting out under the aegis of this Board of Trustees, the School may look forward to a long life of usefulness to the Community.

We all regretted that neither Mr. J. O. Smythe nor Mr. Justice Broome, our former Trustees, could sit on the new Board, but since they, as Administrators of the Estate of Miss R. M. Hodges, had to do the handing over of the School to the new authority, the Wykeham School Society, that in the nature of things was impossible.

And before I leave the subject of the Trustees and Wykeham's new status, I should like to record my gratitude to Mr. A. Austen Smith. who helped me frame the Draft Constitution of the Wykeham School Society and acted as our legal advisor throughout the period the Board was working upon it. He gave us his time and lidvice gratis, although he was then himself extremely

This year has been a year of change. The one that occurs immediately to the mind is Miss Abbott-Smith's departure from Wykeham after 33 yearsâ\200\231 service. She will be very much missed. Our best wishes go with her to England where she has gone to be nearer her sister at Wantage.

I am writing this letter from Windsor where I am  $\hat{A}$ ¢njoying more than I can say, after 8% years, living again in the home of my childhood with my Mother and Sisters, and I am most grateful to Miss Price and Miss Burns for making this leave possible for me.

I obtained a Priority Passage on the understanding that [ should be doing educational work in England. On the invitation of the Nursery School Association of Great Britain, I have been speaking at their Summer Schools at Roehampton and St. Andrews, putting before the teachers gathered there our need for trained Nursery School Superintendents from England to help in our South African Nursery Schools, since we ourselves are unable to train enough for the work.

Field-Marshal Smuts, speaking in August at Pretoria said that South Africa was in great need of the right kind of European immigrant and that the Government must revise its policy to attract such into the Union. I certainly hope there will be a good response from overseas, with such great problems as ours to cope with, we need as many men and women of good will as we can get  $\hat{a}200\234$ to take up the White Man $\hat{a}200\231$ 's burden $\hat{a}200\235$  in South Africa. At the moment I am in the midst of a course at St. Gabriel's College, Camberwell, on the teaching of handicapped children, and am learning much of the new developments in Educational Psychology, which are bearing such good fruit in the Child Guidance Clinics all over the world today. For this course I am going up to London from home every day again, as I did when at College. I always enjoyed it and take the opportunity after lectures of visiting the old familiar haunts and exploring  $\hat{a}\200\234$  fresh woods and pastures new. $\hat{a}\200\235$  What a terrible time these busy, cheerful, patient people of London must have had during the various blitzes. You cannot go far in any direction without passing a gap in the long line of houses, where one has been sliced out by a small bomb, or the corner house torn away by blast. They are demolishing the brick and reinforced concrete air-raid shelters all over London now, though the big auxiliary water tanks for fire-fighting still stand on the sites of many demolished houses. In the heart of London there are great bare patches of land where â\200\234block-busters,â\200\235 land-mines, rocket bombs or flying bombs have completely cleared areas as big as the site of Winchester House and garden.

I pass each morning, going to St. Gabriel's, a big area, where the houses have just been erased. There the workmen are putting up  $a\200\234a\200\230$ prefabs $a\200\231$  guaranteed to last ten years. They look like big square-shaped, asbestos-

sheeting, boxes with glazed windows inlet, and a chimney like a button on the top. A little further up the road on the edge of the blasted area, they are repairing the walls, ceilings, doors and windows of some brick houses shaken and cracked by the concussion, but not destroyed. It is surprising to see how tough bricks and mortar have proved in these blitzes.

Well, paper is still on ration, so I must not take up more room with personal reminiscences, but before closing I must thank Leila Beater, Lorna Hime and Sheilagh Burchell for taking over all responsibility for the magazine in my absence.

May I wish you all another happy and successful year.

MINUTES of the 38th Annual General Meeting of the Wykeham Old Girlsâ\200\231 Association, held at Wykeham School on Sunday, April 28, 1946, at 10 a.m. Present.â\200\224Miss Abboit-Smith was in the Chair, and all present signed the Minute Book. Apologies.â\200\224â\200\224Apologies for absence were received from the President, Miss D. Mellor, and many Old Girls, who regretted that they were unable to be present, but had sent good wishes for the Week-end. (Miss Mellor was unable to attend the meeting as she was in Johannesburg on urgent business.) The Minutes of the last Annual General Meeting, published in the 1945 Magazine, were taken as read and confirmed.

Business arising out of the Minutes:â\200\224

- 1. Old Girls Dance.â\200\224It was the wish of the majority of those present to hold the Annual Old Girlsâ\200\231 Dance this year. The last dance, held in September, 1942, at the Ansonia Hotel, had not been a success financially. After a great deal of discussion, it was finally decided that the Executive Committee should appoint a Dance Secretary, whe would be willing to undertake full responsibility for arranging the dance. If no Old Girl would undertake this responsibility then the dance would not be held as the Hon. Secretary and Treasurer advised that she would not be able to cope with the additional work. It was suggested that in view of the present food shortage, the management of the hotel, where the dance was being held, might allow the Old Girls to provide the supper and thus help to reduce expenses.
- 2. School Present.â\200\224The total amount collected towards the School Present during the year ended March, 1946, was  $\hat{A}$ £13 15s. 6d., and this sum was being transferred to the Trust Fund, in accordance with the wishes of the last Annual General Meeting in April, 1945. The Secretary advised that the amount received so far for the new year was  $\hat{A}$ £3. It was unanimously decided that all contributions should again be put into the Trust Fund, as that Fund should prove of the greatest benefit to the School.:
- 3. Bursary. $\hat{a}$ 200 $\hat{b}$ 224The Bursary had fallen vacant in December, 1944, so the Bursary Committee, following cut the recommendation of the Annual General Meeting in April, 1945, awarded the Bursary ( $\hat{a}$ £20 per annum) to

Mrs. Bessie Carter to go towards the schooling of her youngest daughter at Wykeham. ThlS action was approved and unanimously carried.

Financial Statement.â\200\224The Secretary then presented the Balance Sheet, which showed an Excess of Revenue over Expenditure of  $\hat{A}$ £32 12s. 5d. The adoption of the Balance Sheet and Financial Statement was moved by Mrs. S. Cockburn and seconded by Miss L. Beater. The Secretary drew attention to the high cost of printing the Magazine and additional expenses connected with the Trust Fund campaign. Previously when there had been an excess of Revenue over Expenditure, 209 of it was voted to the Trust Fund, but Miss L. Hime proposed, seconded by Miss M. Graham, that in order to keep the Association financially stable, no percentage should be paid over this year, as funds in hand were lower and the cost of printing the Magazine was likely to be heavy again. This was carried and the Balance Sheet and Statement were handed round for perusal.

On December 20 and 21. documents were signed arranging for the transfer of the School to the new Board of Trustees as from the 31st January, 1946. The Chairman of the Board was Mr. A. T. Allison, who had already proved an invaluable leader. He had collected a lot of money for the Fund and had secured a loan of £10,000 from the Municipality. Mrs. S. Cockburn proposed and Miss L. Hime seconded, that the Secretary should write a special letter of thanks to Mr. Allison for his inspiring example. An amount of £2,000 had already been paid out from the Fund, leaving a balance of £542 12s. 9d. in the Fund to date. Miss L. Hime had held a highly successful Jumble Sale, which had resulted in £60 for the

Fund. Outstanding as a contribution lately was Mr. Justice Broome's donation of  $\hat{A}\pm 315$  (money owing to him as a former Trustee) in memory of his daughter, Sonia. a former Head Girl of the School. The President stressed the urgency of raising funds to pay off the loan of  $\hat{A}\pm 10,000$  as soon as possible. Any suggestions of how to raise funds would be welcomed.

2. Executive Committee.â\200\224The meetings had been most harmonious and there were four new members:a\200\224

Leila Beater had replaced Maureen Rutherfoord.

Beth Behrmann had replaced Sheldine Gafney.

Thelma Merrick had replaced Greta Wood.

Sheilagh Burchell had replaced Sheila Cockburn.

The confirmation of these appointments was carried unanimously. On the resignation of Maureen Rutherfoord, the former Secretary-Treasurer, the Executive Committee had appointed Penelope Kershaw to carry on these duties. Miss J. MacNeillie then proposed, seconded by Mrs. M. Calder, that the Committee be re-elected en bloc. The Secretary notified her intention of resigning in the near future and it was decided that the Executive Committee should try and find someone to understudy her.

- 3. Magazine.â\200\224The President thanked Mrs. Toria Jepson and Miss L. Beater, who had undertaken the subediting of the Old Girlsâ\200\231 News Section and the School Section in the 1945 edition of the Magazine respectively. Special thanks were due to Miss L. Hime and Miss V. Cope, who had made themselves responsible for the Wykeham Old Girls" addresses, which had made a very welcome reappearance. In view of the Editorâ\200\231s proposed trip overseas, Miss L. Beater kindly offered to edit the Magazine and Mrs. S. Burchell volunteered to do the Old Girls" News Section.
- 4. Old Girlsâ\200\231 Saleâ\200\224The Sale had been a most successful affair and an amount of £92 0s. 5d. clear profit, had been realised. Miss L. Hime proposed and Mzrs. O. Harris seconded, that £61 4s. 6d. should be donated to the Trust Fund. This amount plus the £13 15s. 6d. School Present money would make a total contribution of £75 towards the Trust Fund. Discussion arose as to whether any money should be given to local charities, but it was agreed that as £10,000 was\_still required to repay the Municipality Loan, the Trust Fund was the more pressing cause,

5. Loss of Miss M. Abbott-Smith.â\200\224In concluding her Report, the President took the opportunity of wishing Miss M. Abbott-Smith, the Associationâ\200\231s first Vice-President, â\200\234goodbye and God speed.â\200\235 After 33 vears at Wykeham, Miss Abbott-Smith was leaving in June, 1946, and planned to visit her sister in England.
