Dear Mr. Mafoli,

I spoke to you on the phone today, inviting you or another ANC leader, to speak at a meeting on Saturday, April 20, in defense of the Pathfinder Mural and freedom of artistic and political expression.

As we talked about, the mural was vandalized for the second time a few weeks ago. Red paint was splashed onto the large portrait of Fidel Castro. The paint landed on the edge of his beard and spilled onto the portraits of other Cuban and Latin American leaders, including Jose Marti. The April 20 meeting will begin at 7:30 P.M. The location has not yet been determined other than somewhere in New York City.

I've enclosed information about the mural that focuses on the previous attack as well as an example of the kind of statement others have sent. The response to the vandalism has been very good. Mayor Dinkin and the New York Council on the Arts sent a strong statement.

NEW YORK (AP) A six-storz-high mural lea.
luring Karl Marx, Vladimir Lenin. idel Castro. Malcolm X and other revolutionary leaders was dedicated yesterday in lower Manhattan.

Several hundred people sang along with talk singer Pete Seeger as several pennants which partial-I hid it were dropped to unveil the mural that covers the entire south wall at the Pathtinder building at no WestSt.

Known as "The Pathtinder Mural," its central image is at a press churning out publications with their authors depicted on sheets 0! paper that thicken into hooks.

Some oi the portraits that a pear include those of the leader ol the Cuban revo ution Ernesto Che Guevara. Russian revolutionist Leon Trotsky and German socialist leader and writer Frederick Engels.

"It's a tremendous victory," said Steve Clark, director of Pathfinder, which publishes revolutionary hooks and pamphlets. "There's no greater symbol 0! freedom than Fidel Castro and Che Guevara' The 10-teet-high and 85-teet-wide mural in volved the collaboration ol artists from 20 countries over the last two years at a cost at \$125,000. Clark said residents of the neighborhmd did not oppose the project. hut'criticism came trom others, including Patrick Buchanan, a columnist and former aide to President Reagan.

The New York City Tribune called it "a veritable Mount Rushmore to communism." It also questioned why the New York State Council on the Arts contributed 8500 "while the Communist world is disintegrating."

John Morgan, deputy director of the Cultural Council Foundation, which distributes the councul's tends in New York City, said a committee at eight people was split in its decision.

"I think they felt the artistic merits of the project warranted tunding," he said. The remaining mone was raised through contributions.

But the mural did not draw enough attention in two years for local elected ollicials to take notice. Councilwoman Ruth W. Messinger, the newly elected Manhattan borough president, said, "It is not something I know anything about so I can't comment on it."

Vandals splashed white paint over large sections of the 6'story, 85-footwide mural on a wall of the Pathfinder Press building at West and Charles Streets. The attack occurred between 9 p.m. Wednesday and 7 a.m. Thursday, said Meryl Lynn Farber, New York coordinator of the artists group that painted the mural. Dinkins said in a statement yester-, anC'!
