country.
3 IThe SARB will use its considerable influence (rugby is a

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6 All people of goodwill should support the merger process. The ANC acted as a mediator at the Harare meeting, but at the same time it was very much an interested party. Non-raeial rugby up to national level is politically important. It will further undermine the regime if the white rugby community turns against apartheid. .1'q And, by Xm\$%%%%%N implication, the white rugby bosses will be joining the broad democratic movement in South Africa. But even if all the goals agreed in 53;; Harare are achieved, South African rugby will not see itself back in international rugby the following day. The SARB must\_be seen to have played its part in achieving \_ non-racial rugby at all levels, including the sharing with all of its generously- subsidised facilities. Sports Minister F.w. de Klerk's threat to withdraw SARB subsidies for meeting the ANC underlines two things: 1 The control the government has over white sport, and' 2 The fact that non-racial sport receives no statelsubsidies.
