

Headmasten's Address Prizegiving 2017





Good evening parents, members of Council, honoured quests, fellow heads and of course, more importantly, good evening, gentlemen of the Prep.

I say this every year, but a headmaster's address on speech night is quite a difficult thing to compose. It has to have a strong and clear message that can reach two audiences - parents and boys; it should embrace some highlights of the year and thank those who have worked hard behind, in front and at the side to make the Prep function and "rock".

Positive thinking is contagious. People around you will pick up and draw on your mental moods and, in turn, will then be affected accordingly. Think about when you smile at someone, they will smile back at you ... Try it now. Yep, it works ... I have a good feeling ... Yebo, yes!

And we have so much to smile about ... When I look back at the successes of our boys this year, the list is endless. Our Kids Lit Quiz boys are world champions! Our 1st rugby and hockey teams are unbeaten. All our squash teams won their respective leagues. The A and B athletics teams were unsurpassed, and won the interschools championship for the first time ever. Our 1st water polo team



won the SACS Tournament - the first time ever a Gauteng school has done so. But while these are a few of the successes, there were many more in other areas: boys who were awarded 4CTs for an extraordinary accomplishment, a boy who perhaps for the first time managed to solve a Maths equation, a boy who for the first time managed to deliver a speech out loud in front of his classmates, a boy who gave his first musical performance - the list is endless. All of these are successes and need to be celebrated ... Yep, I have a good feeling ... Yebo, yes!

In order to make positive thinking yield results, one needs to develop a positive attitude towards life, expect a successful outcome from whatever you do, but also to take any necessary actions to ensure the best outcome is derived. Thank you to my staff who, every day, practise that when they are at school. Every single one of you does so much, and the team that we have at the Prep is quite phenomenal. Thank you to my ever-loyal deputies, Margot Long and Nick Cooper, and to my executive team - your input and honest advice is much appreciated. Thank you to our front office ladies, Debbie Powell and Susie Kirk; what you bring and do for the Prep - be it to staff, boys or parents - is quite amazing. Thank you to my steadfast PA, Sue Venter; your unwavering support for me is so appreciated Wow, no wonder the Prep is great look at the team we have; I have a good feeling ... Yebo, yes!

At the beginning of my speech, I said positivity is contagious, and no wonder the boys have had such a good year because we have had some amazing individual achievements by our Prep staff: Margot Long, as the IBSC global action research coordinator, Anita Trolese for winning the best IBSC action research project in the world. Dudu Mashele, for being appointed the first Senior Mistress of Transformation and Diversity. Nicky Sulter, for taking our Kids Lit Quiz boys to be world champions. Nick Rodda, for playing water polo for South Africa, and Nic McCann, for coming 87th in the Comrades Marathon. What a good feeling ... Yebo, yes!

I am optimistic about South Africa, and this school, because I believe that we have the people here to overcome any challenge that is thrown at us. I am in awe of the thousands of South Africans who toil to help the

less fortunate. I would include in that statement honest policemen, hardworking nurses, teachers, and every member of our own community who work tirelessly and selflessly for the good of others.

To Jon Patricios, chairman of Council, and indeed to all our fellow members of Council. To Paul Edey, headmaster of the College, to Angela Bruwer, chair of the PA, and to so many others: Dave Vermeulen and Rita Kelly in finance, Alan Duncan and his staff from estate, Natalie Campbell and Kurt Frederiks, and their staff in the kitchen, Judi Dilchert and the PEC, to Jane Lane and Jenny Lobban, to Fathers lan, Jacques and Kabelo. Thank you for all that you do.

Some people may have seen the racial incident at St John's earlier this year as a disaster. I personally see it as a blessing. It is a wake-up call for the school and our society to do something. To change, to talk, to understand each other and to make sure that every child, staff member and parent feels like they belong in this wonderful school. Together as a team, we will make this happen, and I am committed to doing everything in my power to ensure that it does, and I urge every one of you to join in this endeavour ... I have such a good feeling ... Yebo, yes!

Yes, I am optimistic, because I refuse to believe that we can continue to be held to ransom in this country by a criminal minority. Yes, I am optimistic because I believe we are resilient and tough, as people and as a nation. Yes, I am optimistic because I believe that the challenges ahead are surmountable, as war is waged against poverty, crime and corruption, and we build to transform our school (and ultimately our country) for our children's sakes and our children's children.

I am pleased to report our Realema Intern Programme is going from strength to strength. Next year we will have 30 interns on this programme. Realema helps with the tuition fees. board and lodging, and development and training of a much-needed new generation of teachers. Thank you to Pier Myburgh and Agnes Nugent for your unbelievable commitment, dedication and love for this programme. This is making a REAL difference, not only to the lives and families of those 30 people, but going forwards to the many future generations who will be taught by

them. From four to 30 interns in five years! I have a good feeling ... Yebo, yes!

Sadly, some staff will be leaving us at the end of the year. Jaci de Lange, thank you for your dedication in running the Maths department and for your love of the boys. We wish you well in your new venture. Thank you to Vicky Newton-King for your passion and love you have shown in the Drama department; we will miss your energy and laughter, and wish you and your family all the best in your move to the Cape. We also thank Pam Hayward for her contribution as a Lower II class teacher, water polo manager and for being the able medic at all our events. Luckily for us, Pam is not leaving St John's, but going back to teach at The Bridge next year and will still be involved at the Prep in the afternoons. James Hulley also leaves after two terms as an Upper III English teacher and sports coach, and we thank you, James, and wish you well.

We are also pleased that two of our interns will move on to develop children's talents at other schools -Nic McCann to Jeppe, and Kirsten Von Berg to the Spark Schools. We thank them all for their hard work and dedication and wish them well. We urge you all to continue taking your good feelings to your new places, and to continue the work there.

So, here is my own personal resolve and creed that I live by: be positive. Stop whingeing. Stop blaming. I have a good feeling ... Yebo, yes! Ignore the doomsday jokes sent out by people who want you to feel as bad as they do. I have a good feeling ... Yebo, yes! Find goodness in people and look for it. I have a good feeling ... Yebo, yes! Commit, regularly, to this beautiful country of ours. I have a good feeling ... Yebo, yes! Believe in God's plan for us. I have a good feeling ... Yebo, yes! The simple truth is, if we do not work hard to create the life we want, we will have to endure the life we get.







1992: ANNUS HORRIBILIS

Queen Elizabeth II described the year 1992 as an annus horribilis, a "horrible year", and with good reason: Prince Andrew separated from Lady Sarah, Princess Anne divorced Captain Mark Philips, and the Prince of Wales provided some cringeworthy statements in the "Camillagate" recordings. To top it all, in November Windsor Castle caught fire.

Twenty-five years later, St John's College could also describe 2017 as an annus horribilis. A disciplinary hearing of a senior College master eventually played itself out in the full glare of front-page headlines and a social media storm. The school did not appear "world class" in the process.

1666: ANNUS MIRABILIS

The Queen reworked the more commonly used phrase, annus mirabilis, to make her point. This phrase was first used by John Dryden in the title of a poem describing 1666 as the "year of wonders", rejoicing at the fact that the Great Fire of London had not burned the whole city, which it easily could have, and that there was a great victory over the Dutch in a sea

battle. The year 1666 also, incidentally, saw the development of Sir Isaac Newton's theories on calculus, optics and the law of gravitation. (Possibly made possible by the closure of Cambridge University in 1665 to the Great Plague, which allowed him to pursue his private studies; something positive coming from what otherwise appears to be a disaster.)

As we so often see in the Bible, God is able to redeem any situation and bring good out of apparent disaster - the Crucifixion being the clearest example. Likewise, the first seeds of "redemption" were seen as we were forced to begin confronting the unexamined baggage that decades of colonialism and apartheid had left in the school. This is not an easy undertaking, but a necessary journey that was begun this year.

2030: MATRICULANTS

The Grade 0s who will begin in the new year were welcomed to the Pre-Prep at a number of functions, and Mrs Lane pointed out that this would be the "Class of 2030". What the school will look like then is not clear. Will football and basketball have replaced rugby and cricket? (Or will the world have recognised that cricket is the sport of Third World slums in Kolkata and beaches in Barbados, and thus the true "sport of the masses"?) What exams will the 2030 Upper Vs write?

While answers would be entirely speculative, I am entirely confident that the Faith Foundations of school will continue to be a source of security and strength. As the College did way back in 1898 at its founding and after reopening after the South African War, when confronting the threat of the "Milner Schools", we will read the same Bible, pray the Lord's Prayer and celebrate the Mass. Though the words may have evolved to reflect the times, the message and truths encapsulated within them will remain unchanged.

2017: THANKSGIVING

In Psalm 77, David says: "I cried out to God for help; I cried out to God to hear me. When I was in distress, I sought the Lord" (vs 1), then when he reflects on what God has done in the past, he eventually says, "Your ways, God, are holy. What god is as great as our God? You are the God who performs miracles." (vs 13-14) Recognising that God has been in control of the school all along, even in difficult years like this one, one

can move forward in faith, confident that God will grow the school in new and significant ways if we listen to his voice and follow his prompting.

There is an overwhelming number of people who are involved in the school in various ways, all of whom want the best for the school as it moves forward, embraces change and looks to God to "perform miracles" What will St John's look like in 2030? We cannot say. But we pray that it will reflect more fully the diversity and dynamism of our country, and be an example of an African Christian school.

The chaplains are often the frontline of the school's "faith-life", and the people who make this aspect most noticeable. However, they are not alone, and are supported by the wider community of the school and the church, and especially by those who draw alongside and help in ministry in various ways.

So, for their contribution to the spiritual life and growth of the school, we thank the headmasters of the various sections of the school, together with:

- The boys who have been part of the Christian Leadership Team this year - those who have helped to organise and run JOCs and the servers
- The staff who help as lay ministers at Mass and/or speak at the chapel services, Patrick Lees, Jane Lane, Grant Harrison, Nicky Sulter, Jon Gunning, Dudu Mashele, Anna De Gouveia, Nicky Löser, Heather Baker, Anita Trolese, Nick Cooper, Mark Hood, Jayne Legg and Kate Rodrigues
- Ben Oosthuizen, Cameron Upchurch and Siduma Nyamezele for the choir to lead the singing, and the music that brightens the mass each week

This year may have been an "annus horribilis", but our "faith foundations" are strong and the future is in God's hands, and we know St John's College will be blessed. In Luke, Jesus says he has come to "proclaim ... recovery of sight for the blind" - may he open our eyes to see his work and his wonder within the school as 2017 ends, and we move into 2018

The Community Service team has been involved in many interesting and varied outreach drives this year.

Within 35 minutes all 200 scarves were snapped up! One of the team mentioned that the huge smile on the face of one of the ladies who took a scarf was worth every minute spent preparing and planning this activity. I believe our boys got a glimpse of the meaning of being able to give without expecting anything in return.

Our next outreach initiative was in support of the charity Cupcakes 4 Kids with Cancer. Jamie Berriman (Lower III R), together with a few friends and the Community Service team, held a cupcake sale in support of this very worthy cause. It was one of the most frenetic, noisy, messy, crazy, sticky, colourful events I have seen in a long time - and within 20 minutes it was all over! Cupcakes of all shapes, sizes and flavours were



donated by the Lower III parents and the rest of the school went crazy for them. The raffle items were hotly contested, with many boys spending their money on tickets for the draw, rather than on the cupcakes.

The Community Service team's final initiative in 2017 was a trolley drive for the TLC Children's Home.





PREP CLASS MUSIC

It is wonderful to witness so many boys participating in a variety of music activities in the Prep School. The boys are given many opportunities to experience, create and learn music skills which translate into endless music opportunities.

Weekly lessons, concerts and performances for all the boys encourage each boy's musical growth and aim to provide a varied performance experience for each of them.

Activities include the playing of xylophones and marimbas, drums. percussion instruments, dancing, singing and composing using music technology. The Music department offers a range of individual instrumental lessons, as well as choirs and music ensembles for the boys to become involved in. These include choir, the rock band, the iazz band, marimba band, a brass ensemble, string ensemble and symphony orchestra.

ROCK BAND AND JAZZ BAND

The contemporary music section at St John's College is celebrating its 12th year since the first candidates were enrolled for rock school exams in 2005. More than 140 boys from the Pre-Prep, Prep and College form part of the section, taking either guitar, bass guitar or drum lessons at the school.

Jan Lategan is the head of contemporary music and the section also employs the services of seven parttime teachers. Aside from the lessons, students are given the opportunity to play in a variety of ensembles, which include the Prep Senior Jazz Band and the Lower III Rock Band.

These bands have played at various concerts throughout the year, including the St Mary's Prep Ensemble Concert, Look and Listen Concert, Three Schools Concert, Pridwin Jazz Festival, as well as at the Prep Prizegiving

PREP BRASS ENSEMBLE

The St John's Prep Brass Ensemble was started in 2017 by Mr Jaco Van Staden to give Lower II boys an opportunity to participate in a music ensemble. The ensemble consists of pBones (also known as trombone) and cornet. The Prep Jazz Band and the



College Big Band participated at the 2017 Pridwin Jazz Festival, held at the Venus Street Playing Fields on Sunday, 21 May 2017. The festival is held to promote jazz music ensembles of schools around Johannesburg and attracts jazz and contemporary music appreciators. There were several ensembles involved at the festival, and St John's entertained the audience with music from big band sensation Stan Kenton to British rock band Cream.

ALL STRINGS ATTACHED

St John's Prep string department has shown great growth in numbers and diversity, consisting of violins, violas, cellos and double basses from Upper I right through to Upper III. The strings performed at the Johannesburg Festival for the Advancement of Music and received the highest possible result, a diploma. These musicians take pride in their playing, attending weekly practice sessions and performing at various inter-schools events such as concerts with St Mary's, The Ridge, Kingsmead and Pridwin.

Some Prep boys have attained a high enough standard on their instruments to join the College Symphony Orchestra. These boys work particularly hard, performing at all the College functions and events. The orchestra's repertoire consists of Mozart, Bizet, Brahms, Holtz and more popular pieces, such as Pirates of the Caribbean.

MARIMBA MAGIC

The Marimba Band has become exceptionally popular in the Prep. It is wonderful to witness so many children celebrating music in a highspirited and festive environment. Owing to popular demand, boys are

required to audition to join the various marimba groups. It takes great skill but also talent to achieve at the standard that they perform. The boys display skills of working together as a team. communication, creative thinking. imagination and invention, with dance moves complementing their playing and improvisation. I think what stands out for me most is their passion, which is evident at every rehearsal and performance.

CHOIR

The Prep Choir and Schola Cantorum have continued in their primary role as a liturgical choir, leading the singing at the weekly Eucharist and providing an anthem during the Communion. The full schedule has been further amplified by the performance of major works such as the Mozart Requiem, as well as appearances at other functions such as Supper and Song, Gaudy Day and the Carol Service.

The Jolly (Upper I) and Cool (Lower II) Choirs offer our boys the wonderful opportunity of singing a wide variety of music in collaboration with one another. We strive to give our boys the opportunity to develop music excellence and encourage a love of singing through the work of enthusiastic staff, in an encouraging environment. I work with a wonderful team, which includes Ms Sonja Van Zyl, our accompanist. She transforms the music with her ability to improvise, bringing a fresh approach in her accompaniments. Mr Sidumo Nyamezele brings out the best in the boys, and gets them singing and dancing to traditional African music. This year, the boys participated in many performances, including our annual choir festival: Let the Children Sing, On the Night, as well as during Chapel services and assemblies.


Barn Owls

he St John's Pre-Prep boys participate in Drama lessons once a week and much fun is had by all. The Drama lessons give the boys an opportunity to explore and express their creative ideas using both their voices and the body. We use theatre sports or game structures as a means to develop creative thinking, confidence, vocal projection, vocal articulation, teamwork and physical expression. The personal growth shown by the boys from Grade 0 to Grade 2 in the subject matter is tangible and inspiring and we enjoy watching them develop and grow during the three years they are with us at the Pre-Prep.

In Grade 0 the boys are introduced to simple game structures that for the most part allow them to start exploring their creative voice and develop confidence. The boys then have the opportunity at the end of the year to perform in the annual school nativity play. This is an opportunity which they enjoy thoroughly and which gives them their first chance to prepare and perform in front of an audience. There are occasionally some tears and fears when performing, but we support the boys through all their doubts and uncertainties and the exercise of performing benefits

them immensely. By the time the end of their first year comes, they are well prepared for the demands of Grade 1 and Grade 2 Drama.

Grade 1 is the year in which we focus on creative group tasks and further developing the boys performance skill set. The boys spend most of the year working on tasks that allow them to creatively develop and enact various scenarios and game structures. They often work in groups and are required to negotiate and compromise when developing a class performance presentation. We also work on group poem performances that are presented at the annual Cultural Evening. The boys are expected to listen and work in synchronism as much as possible in order to perform a poem provided to them by the teacher. This year the boys did a fantastic job and they impressed their audience with their confidence and growth.

Grade 2 is the year in which the boys really get to display their skills at performance. The Grade 2 classes are more demanding and the boys get the opportunity to perform for an audience on three different occasions. We start the year

Je have had a fun year in Information and Communication Technology (ICT), learning as we play. Lessons are aimed at giving the boys the opportunity to explore together as well as on their own. Each lesson is an opportunity to learn new skills and to spend time experimenting and sharing their discoveries.

Through games, they practice the basic skills of manipulating the mouse and becoming familiar with the keyboard.

Creating their own digital puzzles and 3D games has been exciting and also a great learning experience for the boys. Trial and error is a major part of our lessons and everyone benefits from this essential part of the learning process. Taking photographs and making collages was a highlight for many of the boys and they loved the independence given to make this activity completely their own.

The introduction to coding is a challenge that the boys thoroughly enjoyed. They enthusiastically attempt to work out the most efficient code for each level. Some time is spent reinforcing numeracy and literacy concepts that are covered in class. This is a wonderful way to motivate the boys in these learning areas. They play the games with little awareness of the fact that concepts and skills are being practised and consolidated as they play.

The Grade 2 boys loved learning to email. Sending messages to friends and family was such fun and their delight in receiving emails was lovely to observe.

What a fun-filled year of interacting with technology, exploring the unfamiliar, attempting new things and sharing with each other. Everyone is a learner and a teacher in our ICT lessons.

































I umerous studies have highlighted the benefits and importance of music participation to young children. Participating in musical activities helps accelerate brain development in young children (Gersema, 2016). These benefits are not only limited to academic achievement; other benefits can include social, emotional, language and motor skills amongst others.

The boys in the Pre-Prep are exposed to numerous musical activities. They have three music lessons per week where the focus is on singing, playing Orff

instruments, recorder playing (Grade 1 and Grade 2), music theory (Grade 1 and Grade 2), movement, music appreciation and lessons on the following music concepts: tempo, dynamics, pitch, beat and texture. The Grade Os may also learn to play the violin, viola, cello or piano privately at school should they desire. The guitar and double bass can be chosen from Grade 1, whereas the Grade 2s can opt for the brass instruments instead.

The Pre-Prep boys have performed in the following events and services this year: Mother's Day service, Father's Day service,

two instrumental concerts per grade, Grade 2 nativity play, annual Grade 2 play, Christingle service, Carols by Candlelight, Grade O nativity play, Cultural Evening and Grade 1 and Grade 2 Awards morning. The Pre-Prep also has a string orchestra which performs regularly at schools events. The orchestra performed at the Festival for the Advancement of Music and obtained a Diploma award for their performance. Well done, to all the Pre-Prep boys on their hard work and producing music of a commendable standard.










With all these events, there has not been much time to rest. As the one event is finished, the next one is around the corner and the boys are needing to prepare, so they can do their best.

The boys are not the only ones who have been very busy this year, so have all the coaches. On top of the normal coaching sessions in the afternoons, they have attended many different courses and clinics.

We started with a cricket session in the indoor centre with Mr Justin Sammons, the school cricket pro and also the Lions batting coach. We brushed up on all the different aspects of cricket and got some ideas of fun new games and exercises. The coaches also attended a level 1 soccer course (and passed with flying colours).

We had a very interactive session with the College 1st Team coach, who showed us lots of very active and exciting skills/games to do with our boys. We all attended the rugby Boksmart training course along with level 1 coaching for rugby. The College's head skills coach for rugby had a session with the coaches, to update us with any new developments for rugby.

The College's head skills coach for hockey also ran a very interactive coaches training session for us to brush up on our skills levels.

Our boys are very privileged to be taught by coaches that are as committed and skilled as our coaches are.

The coaching style for young children has undergone a big change. Gone are the days of standing at a cone doing one skill over and over again for a lesson. The new way of thinking is focused around more movement, more touch time with the ball/bat in fun,small-sided games. So, in fact, more like organised chaos. Yes, there are still times that one has to revert back to more structure to teach some of the basic techniques, but on a limited basis. Our PE lessons and afternoon sports training has been heading in this direction for more than a year and I believe that we are really seeing the benefit of it. The boys love the sessions and their skills have definitely been improving, which is amazing to watch.

We added this year to our Saturday morning cricket sessions by having winter sports coaching. We were very privileged on these mornings to have the top coaches from the College and Prep School come down and do skills and small-sided games with our boys and their dads or moms (or granddads and even a granny or two).

We had the College directors of sport, pupil development, hockey and rugby, the College rugby skills, hockey skills and 1st Team

soccer coaches, the Prep master in charge of rugby as well as some of the college coaches taking our boys. We could not get any higher school level coaching for our Grade 1 and Grade 2 boys, which is an amazing opportunity.

Despite these coaches normally teaching older boys, they loved the enthusiasm and sheer happiness that all our boys at the Pre-Prep showed. Thank you to all the coaches from the College and Prep that gave extra time out of their very busy Saturday school commitments to their own teams and sports departments, to help develop the Pre-Prep boys.

A big focus this year has been to teach the boys that hard work and doing one's best is what matters. Even if a certain sport is not their favourite or does not come easy to them, what counts is how hard they try to improve themselves and that they are not compared to other boys in the class or grade. Each boy develops at his own rate and at this stage of their sporting career what matters is that they have fun and try to improve with no external pressure put on them. At only five to eight years old, they are all still in the developing stage.

Teaching sportsmanship and teamwork, which is as important in sport as winning is, was another focus area. Sportsmanship and correct sporting etiquette needs to be taught to the boys. This does not come naturally to them, but this also needs to be reinforced by parents at home.

For a positive, fun and nurturing experience of sport for our boys, parents must remain positive, regardless of the result and stay realistic in their shared expectations to avoid putting unnecessary pressure on the child. You can greatly assist your child's development through your engagement with your child's coach, by being a strong and positive role model and upholding integrity and respect at all times, by:

- Setting the example
- Praise and support good play both teams
- No negative comments towards officials
- No negative comments, criticism or hostile shouting from the sidelines
- Remain in designated areas alongside the field
- No coaching from the sidelines
- The coach's decisions need to be respected
- Focus on the process and not the result
- Avoid pressuring your child about winning or losing
- Help your child to separate sport failure from personal failure
- · Allow your child to play for himself

Together teachers, coaches and parents can pave the way for a positive environment that the boys want to be part of and help create lifelong active people, owing to the positive and nurturing environment that their sporting life began in.

Having said the above, I do have to thank our parents for their support at all our sporting events.

Thank you and well done to each and every boy in the Pre-Prep. We have had such a fun year together and seeing the boys giving their best is very special. Keep enjoying sport, boys, and keep trying your best - you will be amazed to see where this will take you. Thank you also to my very special team, Mr Matthews and the

coaches: Sihle, Dillon, Miss B, Mr Odgers, Junior, Flex and T. You are very special people and everything you put into your coaching is greatly appreciated by myself and the boys. Without you, the boys would not have enjoyed all the sport and developed as they have. You are greatly appreciated!






