ANC women say FW's views ridiculous

CAPE TOWN. — The ANC Women's League has described President De Klerk's views on violence as "ridiculous".

An ANCWL delegation that had a meeting with Mr De Klerk on Wednesday boasted at a Press conference yesterday that they had given him a "tough time".

They claimed they had stood their ground with him and that, while the President had apparently expected the meeting to be finished within an hour, they had kept it going for almost five.

They alleged that Mr De Klerk had been "very undermining", during the meeting, and that he had tried to dismiss them as women.

The 22-woman delegation was led by the president of the ANCWL, Mrs Gertrude Shope, and included Mrs Winnie Mandela.

They said President De Klerk had appeared unhappy with the meeting, saying that he had already discussed some of the points with the ANC itself.

The delegation had replied that the ANC Women's League was an

autonomous body and that, as lay women, they were asking him, as a Head of State and a father, for a hearing.

They said President De Klerk had tried to blame the ANC for the violence, and that he had surprised them all by standing firm in the defence of the Inkatha Freedom Party.

A statement by the ANCWL said President De Klerk had pointed out to them from the start that issues on their agenda were under constant discussion with the ANC's national executive.

Teenager wounded by grenade

THE teenage son of an East Rand businessman was wounded in a hand-grenade explosion which caused an estimated R30 000 damage to his father's shop in Tokoza, near Alberton, on Wednesday night.

East Rand police liaison officer, Captain Ida van Zweel, said the teenager, Basie Thanjekwawo (exact age unknown), had sustained shrapnel wounds when a hand-grenade, believed to be an M26, had been hurled into the Emfshabalala Store in Khumalo Street at about 7 pm.

The injured youth was admitted to Natalspruit Hospital, where his condition was yesterday described as "satisfactory".

Capt Van Zweel said the motive for the attack was unknown and no arrests had been made.
