re: Education Crisis

We the ANC, SACP, NECC, Cosas, Cast, SADTU and its allies have called today's press conference to give clarity on the current education crisis and campaigns.

Since 1992, the National Education Conference of which we are all a part, have been requesting the establishment of a National Education and Training Negotiating Forum.

All stakeholders other than the Government, have indicated their support for this forum which is considered crucial to address the impending crisis as well as medium and Iong-terrn issues. The Government persists in postponing the establishment of the forum on various pretexts which results in their neglect of urgent issues. This has seriously undermined the confidence of people in negotiations in education and it is of the utmost urgency that the forum is formally constituted without delay.

Some of the consequences of the States failure to act are seen in the current crisis in secondary schools where the Government has deadlocked in negotiations around exam fees. Another consequence has been the collapse of negotiations around teachers salaries and retrenchments.

We are facing a crisis of immense proportions in that the collapse of the negotiations for which we have been consistently calling has left no recourse but mass action. Our organisations believe that such action must be disciplined and accountable.

Cosas has since the beginning of this week, embarked on a five-day programme of action in the form of demonstrations, marches and pickets in and around schools. These campaigns will culminate in a regional march to DET offices in Braamfontein tomorrow, Friday, May 7. The action is embarked upon on to demand the following:

- scrapping of exam fees
- re-opening of negotiations on teachers salaries $///\ensuremath{\text{w}}$

- delivery of textbooks to students and o the establishment of the National Education Negotiating Forum. This camapaign does not include the closure of schools. Incidents of looting of shops and burning of vehicles are unacceptable and are definetly not part of the action.

We, the allies gathered here today, distance ourselves from all incidents and activities of looting, hooligalism and damage to property. We call on all our people to ensure that any action is disciplined and accountable and that criinal activities are strongly discouraged. Incidents that are outside the programme of action must be reported to leaders of out organisations in communities that are affected. The high levels of frustration with the failure of the government to negotiate in education has resulted in calls such as the one to occupy schools. This call will remain high on the agenda until the Government does what only it can do and that is to become part of the education forum so that at last we can sit down together around a table and address the crisis and longer term issues in responsible manner. In these difficult and trying times, we must ensure that there is normal schooling. We therefore, call upon all students to report to their respective schools on Monday, May 10 and to embark on various programmes aimed at making up for lost time and in preparing for exams. We reiterate that the campaign for the scrapping of exam fees will continue while the students are in their classrooms. We call upon all students to continue to register and to write examinations without paying.

We call upon the Government and police in particular to stop harrassing students and to contribute to the creation of a climate conducive for learning. We also call upon the police to charge or release all detained students. .
