Mr Cyrus Vance. has facilitated contact between the ANC and the government prisoners to ensure the release of all remaining political prisoners on the basis that the government understood and accepted the need for this matter to be finalised immediately," he said.
"To this end a delegation of the ANC met with the government on July 28, with a further meeting scheduled for the near tutute. "It is our view that all political prisoners should be released before Mr Vance returns to New Yotlt." the ANC official said. He confirmed Mt-Vance will leave Johannesburg todaylt' However.
