THE CHANCELLOR

"Chancellor" is an office that goes back to antiquity; the original cancellarius regulated access to the Roman Tribune. In medieval times, the office became associated with the heads of the writing departments of early kings. Because so few people were literate, a chancellor was automatically learned. This explains why heads and spokesmen of the early universities were also accorded the title. More recently, the office has become largely symbolic. The executive head of a university is its vice-chancellor.

Justice Pius Langa is the sixth Chancellor of the University of Natal. His predecessors were: The Honourable D G Shepstone (1949-1966), Dr G G Campbell (1967-1973), Dr B A Armitage (1973-1983), the Honourable R N Leon QC (1983-1992) and Archbishop D E Hurley (1993-1998)

THE ARMORIAL BEARINGS

The armorial bearings of the University of Natal were awarded by the College of Arms in

London.

The two black wildebeest come from the arms of the Province of Natal. They are shown in full course to symbolise movement and progress. The two open books represent the universal heritage of knowledge and the two centres of the University, Durban and Pietermaritzburg. The five-pointed star refers to the naming of Natal by Portuguese navigators when they landed for the first time at Durban on Christmas Day in 1497. Stella Aurorae, star of the dawn, symbolises the role of the University in bringing to light new knowledge and spreading the enlightening influence of education.

THE MACE

The Chancellor's Mace, generally referred to as "The Mace", is used on ceremonial occasions presided over by the Chancellor and is regarded as the Chancellor's staff of "office". It symbolises the University's protection of its Chancellor.

The use of the mace as a symbol of authority has a long history. The head of a copper mace, which apparently dates back to the 12th century before Christ, has been excavated at Beyce Sultan in Asia. In the early centuries, churchmen who went to war often carried a mace in preference to a sword. One side of the mace-head was beautifully decorated with the owner's emblem and on the other side was a large knob which served as a weapon, and was always round so that the church law never to shed blood was always carefully observed! In the early centuries the mace was a symbol of the king's authority. During the power struggle between the king and the Commons in the 13th century, the king gave the speaker the mace as a symbol of his indemnity against arrest.

The Mace was designed by Mr G H Atkins, senior lecturer in sculpture in the University's Department of Fine Arts, was made in England and was first used at the 1970 graduation ceremonies.

CONFERMENT OF THE DEGREE OF DOCTOR OF SOCIAL SCIENCE honoris causa UPON NJONGONKULU NDUNGANE

Njongonkulu Ndungane was born in Kokstad in 1941, and matriculated at Lovedale College in Alice. In March 1960 as a student at the University of Cape Town he participated in the famous demonstrations against the pass laws; and between 1963 and 1966 he was a political prisoner on Robben Island.

He later returned to Alice to study at the Federal Theological Seminary there. In 1974 he was ordained as a priest. In the following year he went to England, where while serving as assistant priest at London parishes he took a BA Honours degree in Divinity and a Master of Theology degree in Christian Ethics at Kingâ\200\231s College, London. After three months serving at an Anglican church in Paris, he returned home in 1980 to become rector of St Nicholas parish at Elsies River, Cape Town.

From 1981 he was for four years liaison officer for the Church of the Province of Southern Africa (CPSA). He then became Principal of St Bedeâ\200\231s Theological College at Umtata, and then from 1987 was chief executive officer of the CPSA responsible for administration and synodical government. He then spent a year as a visiting scholar in Berkeley, California, before being consecrated as Bishop of Kimberley and Kuruman. In 1996 he became Archbishop of Cape Town.

Njongonkulu Ndungane has never interpreted his role as an Anglican churchperson narrowly. Besides playing a variety of significant roles within the CPSA, he has participated, sometimes as a representative of the CPSA and sometimes as an individual, in many organizations and initiatives. He has represented the CPSA at a number of meetings of the World Council of Churches, at a special assembly of Roman Catholic bishops in Rome, and at several other similar gatherings. He has played a leading role in the SA Council of Churchesâ\200\231 Church Leadersâ\200\235 Forum. He has

been involved in ecumenical, inter-faith and socially-committed activities, and has given keynote addresses in many parts of Europe and North America. He has also been awarded several honorary degrees.

He has also served on many boards, trusts and panels. He has been, for example, a member of the board of the SABC. In 1997 he was the convenor of the Inter-religious Commission on Crime and Violence, and in 1998 he chaired the Hearings into Poverty in South Affica. Most notably he has become an international figure in leading Jubilee 2000, which has campaigned for the cancellation of Third World debt.

The University of Natal honours Archbishop Ndungane not only for his distinguished spiritual leadership but for the crucial role that he has played in the upliftment of suffering human beings in South African and in world society.

A Brief History of the University of Natal

Natal University College - the forerunner of the University of Natal - opened its doors in Pietermaritzburg in 1910 with

eight professors and 57 students, eight of whom were women. Lectures in Classics, English a nd Philosophy, Law,

Modern Languages, Botany and Geology, Chemistry and Physics, Mathematics and Zoology were s pread over various

venues, including Maritzburg College, the Natal Museum building and at the City Hall.

It was not until August 1912 that Old Main Building - built on 40 acres of land donated by the Pietermaritzburg

Corporation - was opened by the then Minister of Education, F.S. Malan and the core of the present-day

Pietermaritzburg campus was established. The following year, Natal University College (NUC) ceased to be a state

institution, becoming instead a state-aided body.

In 1923, NUC extended its tuition to Durban with university level courses in Commerce and ${\tt E}$ ngineering at the

Technical College, but it was not until 1928 that Durban agreed that NUC take over full responsibility for university

classes in Durban, thereby establishing the characteristic dual nature of the University of Natal. A generous donation by

 ${\tt T}$ B Davis, whose son, Howard Davis had been killed during the battle of the Somme in World War [, facilitated the

building of Howard College on the Berea which formed the core of a separate campus in Durba ${\tt n.}$ Howard College was

formally opened in 1931.

Largely through the efforts of Fabian Socialist Dr Mabel Palmer, separate classes for 19 "N on-European" teaching

students at NUC were introduced in Durban in 1936. This number, reflecting an obvious need for training of this

nature, grew to nearly 900 by 1960. However, like the University's Medical School, founded in 1951 for black students,

classes still reflected the segregated nature of South Africa under apartheid. The governme nt' s Extension of University

Act of 1959 limited new enrolments, other than those at Medical School, to whites and thwar ted the University's aspirations to serve the educational needs of broader society. This act also restricted the

autonomy achieved when NUC was granted full university status in 1949. It was not until 1983 when the University circu

mvented the government's racial admission "quotas" by an appeal to the High Court, that the University could fully r esume its role of serving the

educational needs of the broader community. Today, about 20 000 students, representing all sectors of South African

society, are enrolled at the University of Natal.

In 1953, the administrative control for the University was shifted from Pietermaritzburg to Durban. In response to

mounting travelling costs, the two centres were academically separated in 1973, with each c entre having parallel

faculties of Law, Humanities, Commerce, Science, and Social Science. Recent restructuring h as meant the merging of

some faculties across both campuses, with Faculties of Education, Engineering, and Law bein g shared by both

campuses. Unique to Durban are the Faculties of Community and Development Disciplines, Mana gement Studies,

Science and Medicine. Unique to Pietermaritzburg is the Science and Agriculture Faculty. There are separate Faculties

of Human Sciences on each campus.

The University of Natal is fortunate to boast among its past vice-chancellors and principal s some exceptional leaders. Its

first principal, John Bews (1930-38), was a world-renowned botanist while Dr E G Malherbe (1945-65) was known

internationally as an educationalist. In 1993, the University of Natal was the first South

African University to appoint a

woman as its principal. Brenda Gourley is the present incumbent. Chancellors have also been distinguished figures, not

least the present Chancellor, Judge Pius Langa, and the recently retired Archbishop Denis H urley OMI. Students

include Alan Paton, Steve Biko, Alec Erwin and J M Coetzee. From the Medical School, come i llustrious alumni such

as Dr Ben Ngubane, Dr Mamphela Ramphele, Dr Zweli Mkhize and Professor Ronnie Green-Thompson. Honorary

graduates include Nelson Mandela, Roy Campbell, Abdullah Ebrahim, Fatima Meer and Selby Baqwa.

The University of Natal is committed to service through excellence in teaching and research and is opposed to

discrimination on the grounds of race, colour, nationality, religion or gender. It is known as a centre for excellence in

Africa, is one of South Africa's top research institutions, and has links with almost 260 i nternational institutions. Alive

to the demands of a rapidly changing global environment, the University has embarked on a thorough reform of curricula

and university structures and is currently a leader in multi-disciplinary studies and is en gaged in significant HIV/Aids

research. In recognition of its role in society, the University of Natal is also committed to greater emphasis on

community-based education and service learning.
