In a long essay published in
the magazine and based on a
recent visit to South Africa,

Mr Grunwald said the most frightening thing about South Africa is not just the inhumanity of apartheid, but its air of remoteness from the world and from reality.

To move about South Africa is to argue constantly on behalf of that world, that reality, he wrote.

After extensive interviews, Mr Grunwald concluded, "One nian, one vote virtually antagonizes all white South Africans, convinces them that the United States is neither serious nor reasonable and that they might as well go down fighting."

He said: "For the near term, some form of qualified black suffrage should be the goal. Even most black spokesmen in South Africa plead only for a form of sharing in the decision-making process." " " " " " "
