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EVELOPING DIA

T]’IE source of fear that numbs  
the minds of most conservative

White South Africans and even

perhaps, but to a lesser extent, the

thoughts of a good many liberal

thinkers, has again been exposed  
at the Institute of Race Rel:;%?ons  
conference in Cape Town, The  
epicentre of that. fear is the  
projection of the president of the  
institute, Mr. D. C. Grice, that by  
the year 2000 there will be about  
27 million non-Whites in â\200\234Whiteâ\200\235  
areas with only about 6,5 million  
Whites. ’ :

So far, with few exceptions, the  
â\200\234whatâ\200\231s to be doneâ\200\235 has been.  
considered the exclusive preserve  
of Whites. Because there has not  
been a â\200\234seeking of solutionsâ\200\235 with  
non-Whites to any great extent,  
Whites see hardly a glimmer of  
light at the end of that long black  
tunnel of 27 million. The â\200\234what  
will they wantâ\200\235 has been  
submerged beneath cries of  
â\200\234integration,â\200\235 â\200\234swamping of the

Four ã©ptionã© for Whites

Mr. Grice has proposed four  
options for Whites : .

Â® Africans in White areas

would stay there but continue

to exercise their political  
rights in their homelands;

Â® Progressive resettlement of  
â\200\230Africans in the homelands  
until, the vast majoritythare  
living and exercising their  
rivglh?fs in those areas;

Â® Attempts could be made to  
satisfy the urban African  
with rights in White areas  
only; ,

Â® A drastic re-allocation of land  
could face the White group  
with the challenge of  
developing a portion of South

Africa as a new home for  
itself.

Popu'lÃ©tiouil projection

At the time of posing the first  
two Mr. Grice might have added  
that the population projection he  
quotes is one of the reasons that  
makes both almost impossible of  
achievement. ,

Those 27 million non-Whites in  
White areas are not likely to accept  
indefinitely a status of â\200\234foreign  
worker.â\200\235 The second option is a

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non-starter for the reason that the  
number of urban Africans is  
~ growing, in spite of separate  
development. el  
~ The third and fourth options are  
those which contain the seeds of  
hope. But immediately fear among  
Whites demands : What rights for  
non-Whites in White areas? What  
drastic re-allocation of land?  
What do â\200\234theyâ\200\235 want ?

There has been talk of Dr.

separation) of Southern African  
States, the Progressive and United  
Parties have plans for federations  
and at Umtata in November the

The big question

The big question, after Umtata,  
was what sort of federation?

Last night, for the first time,  
Whites at the Institute of Race  
Relations conference heard some  
thoughts on federation from Chief  
Gatsha Buthelezi, :

In his address, which is reported  
on the front page of todayâ\200\231s

Mercury, he was at pains to emphasise that his thoughts were not a blueprint.

#### Exchange of ideas

We do not suggest that he has - been influenced to any great degree at this stage by the exchange of ideas he has had recently with the Natal United Party Leader, Mr. Radclyffe Cadman, or his counterpart in the Transvaal, Mr. Harry Schwarz, but it is important that the United Party's federation proposals and the thinking of Chief Buthelezi are flexible and there is a fair deal of common ground to offer hope of

fruitful discussion and negotiation. The opportunity should not be allowed to slip by. :

The United Party leadership in Natal should suppress its irritation over the poaching expedition by Mr. Schwarz and develop its dialogue with Chief Buthelezi. If it does not and the Mahlabatini Declaration of Faith becomes a declaration of war within the Party, the coming parliamentary session could develop into a rout. The issues are too important for that. : :
