PREAMBLE

The alienation oi 'Lland irom lhe indigenous peoples and lhe denial ol lhe Alrican majority's tights to land and political power in our country is inlimalely connected. This relationship is a central element at our struggle against apailheid and will be cenhal to any iesolution oi our problem. In our country 87% of the land is held by the white minority, while only 13% oi the land has been allocated to blacks. This division oi land is a resuil oi conquest and dispossessioni Thus, the question oi land is a deeply left emotional issue.

The present division ol land embodies a power slmclure in which blacks have been denied the righl to live and work where they wanl, in which there has been no secunty ol lenure ior black people and in which conupl administralive shuclures weie imposed lo administer the land and the people living on it. '

Thus, our people live in extreme poverty and starvation withoul access lo lhe most basic human needs - land. lood, sheller, water and works Black women are the most oppressed and powetless section of the population. The skewed development of commercial agiiculture has resulted in environmental degradation and ineilicient production leading to a national agiicultural Ciisis of massive proportionsApanheid has destroyed the productive capacity of black fural producers on commercial larms workers are devoid of any legal protection and highly exploited.

The development oi a ptoductive agricultural seclor and a dynamic rural , economy is necessary tor lhe weII-being of a iuture South Alrica. Our appioach to both the land and lhe people living on it must ensme that this productive capacity can be realised to the lult, We must guaiantee human tights to all mial people. We must recognise that land is a natural resource m be used to: the beneiil of the nation Land belongs to the lulme generations and our policies must ensme its enrichment and COIISUIVQHOTT the Ciisis around land is also an mbah question For decades black people (lid not have rights to sellte heely in iuban areas. The massive housing backlog and shortage of land allocated for black people in urban areas has iesulted in millions of homeless people squalling in appalling in

conditions. In addilion. where land is made available it is usually lar liom jobs and tianspon is expensive.

A. THE GOALS OF A LAND POLICY . "e

To devise a comprehensive land reionn which includes the lollowmg:

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To redress lhe injustices caused by apartheid's policy ol iorced removals, by restonng land and whei'e this is not possible by making ieparalions lhiough a just legal process.

To addiess demands and giieunces around land redishibuilon by the creation of 3 land court through which competing claims to land can be heard and resolved. Such a claims process must be based on a sel of iust criteria: including productive use. traditional access, claims on the basis of bithright, lilte deeds, tenancy and usutruct rightshight to benefits how use and duty to maintain). historical dispossession and need.

The ANC's overall economic policy should ensure that the piesenl shortage oi land in rural and mban areas is eliminated.

To ensure that the diversily ol tenure lon'ns existing in our country is recognised and protected.

A policy ol allirmalive action within a viable economic development programme must ensme:

lhat all South Ahicans have access to a place lo live as a human light; the Iranslonnalion ol apanheid spalial geography;

lhal Women have the same iighls as men in tegard to all land ielaled issues and musl be given special assistance to realise lhese tights; lhe growth, suslainabilily. and lhe increased productivity of the agticuitural sectm oi our economy;

lhal all niral WOlkeTS. including seasonal and casual workers have human tights and protection under law;

lhal within lhe context of a nalional development policy, rural development is accorded priorily:

lhal lhe environment is protected lor lulure generations;

a comprehensive agricultural suppon structure as the basis lor The development oi the larming sectm. in particular to enable tull panicipation by resource poor lanners - including, collectives and cooperatives.

lhal democratic principles we adhered lo by local government in lhe allocation oi land. . $^\prime$. .

lhal lhe stale plays a leading role in lhe acquusnhon and iedlslnbuhon oi land to lhe pom;

- (xi) a policy at maximizing employment creation;
- (xit) the improvement at rural thtrastructure and processing and other industrial activities.
- 8. A DEVELOPMENTAL APPROACH TO LAND ISSUES
- Our approach to land issues must be understood in the context ot an overall development strategy at both the national and Iegionat levels. Land redistribution in this context will be implemented through a demand led process ol land acquisition and redistribution.
- 8.1 Redlstrlbu'tlon ot agrlcultural land
- (a) The present distribution at land has to be tundamentally changed so that landlessness and land hunger can be redressed.
- (b) The objective ol a programme to redistribute agricultural land shall be to enable people to use the land more productively and in so doing to alleviate hunger and poverty.
- to) Redistribution must take place within the context ol a unitary South AlrIca.
- (d) Service delivery must be on an equitable basis to all rural dwellers.
- (9) Given the history of torced removals, dislocation and destruction of communities. redistribution at land must be premised on a respect tor community cohesion. Communities shalt be able to identity and negotiate tor land suitable tor their expansion needs.
- (I) The state must play a key role in the acquisition and allocation at land. The state must have the power to acquire land in a variety at ways: expropriation with just compensation, purchase. grants oi state land, taxes on land and other mechanisms can be used to ensure this.
- (9) The sale and rental at land outside ot state control, should be encouraged and mechanisms to enable and regulate this put in place.
- (h) Decisions on land allocation should be inlormed by consultation with local communities, using criteria that ensure that women and the very poor are given equal access to land and resources.
- (i) The provision ol adequate inlrastructure and support must lorm part at the process at allocating land.
- (j) While poor quality land may be the easiest to acquire productive land must also be made available lor redistribution.
- 8.2 Access to land and ownershtp
- (a) Any rights to land that our people have need to be recognised in the context at a set of duties that landholders have. These include respect lor the human rights at people living en the land, productive use and 3
- the protection oi land as a natural asset.
- (b) The aim at a land ownership and tenure policy should be to ensure that all South Atricans have security at tenure and are not subject to albitrary removal and eviction.
- (c) All adult South Atrlcans should have access to land regardless of their race or sex.
- (d) A diversity oi terms at tenure and ownership must be recognised and protected. Inherent land rights presently existing in our country must be made explicit. This must include rights such as biIthright which are not based on documentation ol any kind. Individual treehold ownership, collective and communal torms should be able to coexist.
- (e) Communities must be carefully consulted on the torm of tenure that they consider to be the best for their social organisation.
- (t) The rights at tenants must be strengthened under the law.
- (9) Land must be used as a national asset in the interests of the broader public.
- 8.3 Rural local government and development tnstltutlons
- (a) In urban areas there has been considerable debate on how to create democratic terms at local government. This has not happened sulticiently in rural areas and we must recognise it as a major area tor consultation, Investigation and research so as to create tinancially viable rural local government
- (b) The systems of administration that exist at present are undemocratic creations of the apartheid state They must be replaced by democratic torms of local govemlhent tormulated in close consultation with rural communities and based on principles at election and accountability established in the national constitution.
- (c) The position of chiels within local government structures must be detined on a local and I'e'glonal basis in consultation with the community as a whole.
- (d) Women shall be entitled to participate lully in all aspects ot local government

- (e) A programme to train rural people In local government and administration shalt be implemented as a matter at urgency $\frac{1}{2}$
- (1) A policy on the appropriate institutions to best lacititate land retorm and rural development must be researched and tormulated. Community participation and Control at development processes must be cen' hat in the tormulation at such a policy. Governmental, non-governmental and community based organisations all have a key role to play in the process oi land relorm and rural development.

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8.4 Ptotectlon tor Worket Rights
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All rural walkers shalt have lull human rights including tult ptotection under law, as is the case with industtial workers. (b) All mtal workets shall have tutt protection unde! law in teaard to working conditions. housing, health and satety and renumetation. This shall include tutt-time wage workets, part time and seasonal workets. labour tenants. shaie-croppeis, daity paid wotkers. contract walkers and people work. ing tat sub-contractms.

Chitd labour on tarms shall be outlawed. -

The rights at tarmworkers to stay on land owned by others must be sepatated trom their tights as workers and this must be recognised in law. $^\prime$. .

The position at women i

A tand and twat development policy tor the iuture shall recognise that btack women are at present the most dlsadvantaged section at the population.

Women shall have the same tights as men in all respects.

Women shall have access in their own right to land allocations, to support services and to tinancing tor agriculture.

The contribution oi women's labour to the economy must be recognised and the ptincipte ol attirmative action should be applied to assist them to produce more ettectively. J

The ptobtems and needs at women shall be taken into consideration in the tormutation of land retorm and rural development policy. There shall be equal rights tor all in any Institution concerned with land relatm and rural development.

. 8.6 Urban land policy

The existing shortage 0! land and housing in urban areas is a product at apartheid policy and must be eradicated. The spatial geography oi apartheid must be etadicated. Housing and land to: black people must be made available close to work and to the cities.

The aim at an urban land and housing policy is to meet the needs oi the majority of our people for aitordable. sale and secure land and housing.

In ordev to meet this aim the shortage 0! housing must be eliminated and homelessness must be etadicated.

The state must play an active role in achieving these aims by: (i) expiopriating land where necessary (ii) buying land and allocating it to people who need it (iii) ensuring that tow-cost housing is built (iv) passing laws preventing developers trom speculating In land (v) gene erating tevenue that will help to meet the costs at such a programme 5

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a market in land and housing has a rote to play and must continue to exist harmoniously alongside a state housing sector.

The private sector has an tmponant role to play in the ptovision oi land and housing. The ptivate sector should: (i) be encouraged to build and tinance low-cost housing (ii) conltibute a proponion Ot ptotits towards a homing lund

- (9) Land owned by the mining sector near to cities must be made available tor housing.
- (h) Collective means oi acquiring and owning land. such as community trusts should be explomd.
- (i) Special courts must be established to deal with disputes over land and housing.
- (j) Tenants rights must be protected and rented accommodation must continue to be made available. Rent control must be investigated with a view to reintroduction.

- (k) A programme tor the tenewal oi inner cities and underutiiised town centres must be implemented.
- (1) A programme at housing activities must be instituted as a developmental strategy. This must include the development at appropriate skills and the implementation oi labour intensive projects.
- (m) A programme tor the transformatinn oi the apanheid city must include attirmative action tor the provision oi land tor attordable accommodation. commerce and industry.
- 8.7 Flsherles
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To optimise the utilization of the tishing resonces with the view to provide employment and earn toreign exchange whilst preventing the over exploitation at this natural resource.

- 8.8 Land and the Envlronment
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Land is a natural and national resource to be used in an appropriate and sustainable manner. :

Laws on the conservation oi the environment must be examined and consolidated. The implementation oi conservation laws and the management oi natme reserves must be done in consultation with the communities attected and co-management models put in place. Declared natme conservation areas must be respected as pan of the nations common wealth. However the intetests at local communities must be considered and the benefits of this land shared with them.
