- 1. 0m T/LZ/glhwrote out a cheque to-himself for \$9707.48 and withdrew the msnem. He explains that this was to cover his pay from July Dec. during which period he claims he was not paid. He claims that he sacrificed his pay in order to help the students during a crisis period. One wonders how he maintained his accomodation and survived during that period. Simce his pay is supposed to be \$1500 per month we assume that Trevor should have received \$7500 reimhursement of salary, and yet he got \$91Q7.48. Bk claims that the difference Of 32207 was due to the exchange rate which was inwhis favour.
- 2. On 13/12/91 he withdrew 35000h The entry in the stubs of the cheque book have beam altered to read \$1500 (an act of dishonesty). This was pointedfaut to himhand he admitted his gwilt. The entry was for 'car repairat.
- 3. Onwn6/12/91 he withdrew 81400. The entry is for 'car repairs'
- 4, 0nx17/12/gn he withdrew \$2600 and againwentry was for 'car repairs'
- 5" Om 20/12/91 he withdrew \$1000 for running expenses. (no vouchers available.)
- 6" 23/12/91 Withdrew \$1300 for 'car repairs"

i//ill transactions wereentered. in this fashion by me Up to 20th Dee. 1990, as an instruction for Trevor. '

Trevor continued to fill inithe required details up to 4th April 1991, when'he abandoned the practi.ce. His exouse was that he was overworked and the procedure was time-consumwng. I' hhs't admit that the procedure is cumbersome but it is very necessary because one can see at any one time how much money has been withdrawnlfromlthe account, and for what purpose. Amw person entrusted with funds is expected to-follow some acceptable method of keeping books, and records of all financial transactions. Trevor has not done thts.

;. Im the past all the monies of the RJE.C. were handled by the Regional treasurer; Because of the difficulties encountered by the Education officer with the Regional treasurer, it was suggested that antaccount should be opened in the name of the ARC Education Committee. It was agreed then that . operate this account there must be THREE- silgnatories, but any TWO of them wourd be required to signneach cheque issued. It was agreed that the signatories would be: The Chairman; the Chief Rep., and the Educ. Officer. It ts therefore surprising that the agreed practice has been changed and Trevor has been signing cheques on his own, at his discretion without reference tw any other officer. Suchla practice is very irregular, and the motives for arranging this are highly suspect.

NormalTngdes who are bong fide students studying at schools or Colleges and having sponsors are entitled to-receive stipends. It would appear that one or two students tnwmarare were paid stipends although they were not yet enrolled at a school. Trevor said that he had done this in order to help Q students, but I am certain that the Educ. Committee would find it hard talaccept this explanation.

Three students tram Lesotho, viz: Lerato thbu, Dineo Khalewa and Nthati Lebona are sponsored by the Lesotho Govt. Trevor, being fully aware of this fact, decided to place themlon the list of W.V.I. students. They a receive the monthly allowance of \$650 from'W.V.I. as well as allowances from the Lesothw Govt; Trevor said that he had been approached by some "comrades' when he was ian.A., and asked to help these students because the plwere facing hardships as their alnowances were inadequate. When asked to indicate what sumvthey were receiving from the Lesotho Govt., he could not do so.

- t the totall sum for withdrawals of 'CAR REPAIRS' is \$10,300. If these were genuine-pammente it follows that Trevor should have paid all the account fer the car and yet'there is an outstanding amount for repairing the cm far \$6770.57"
- I recall that in a previous meeting-Qrevnr Said he had paid the initial Emlle for the car from his own funds, Tbta is not true because he used Educatium Committee fUnds tatpay the bills for \$1300 and \$1400 to A & W Panel Beaters, KADOMA.
