Senator Ben Nsibandze, has said his country considers itself bound by its membership of the Organisation of African Unity and the United Nations to continue giving humanitarian aid to ANC and other refugees.

He said he knew nothing of reports that the

Mr Stan Mabizela, was
about to be expelled by

And he denied any knowledge of alleged South African Government pressure on Swaziland to clamp down on the ANC.

Senator Nsibandze,

whose Ministry is re-

sponsible for refugee affairs in Swaziland, was speaking against the background of a number of incidents involving ANC members with arms, that were said to have strained - relations between his Government and the ANC last year. But relations between
