

The Lych Gate Notice Board

Last year, when Phase One of the Kingswood Foundation Trust's fund-raising scheme was drawing to a close, and the new effort in the shape of Phase Two was being launched, the Old Boys thought it fitting that there should be some tangible recognition for the efforts of those involved in Phase One. What better memorial to these men than something that would serve a long-felt need in the form of a central notice-board for the boys, as well as reminding present and future generations of the loyal support of Old Boys?

Thus it was decided to erect a notice-board in the "quad" behind School House, where once there stood the unsightly tin-shanty

lavatories etc. of earlier times. Accordingly the job was done, and the plaque on the Lych-Gate notice-board was unveiled by Mrs. Neville Turner, wife of the chairman of the Foundation Trust, on Foundation Day, March 14th, 1968.

Today Old Boys revisiting the school will hardly recognise the area between the rear of School House and the Melville Dold teaching block — well-trimmed lawns and paths, having as their focus the Lych Gate notice-board. What was nigh to being an eye-sore in the heart of the school, is now a pleasant courtyard, appropriately known as Foundation Close.

Thus the Lych Gate serves a three-fold purpose: it is commemorative; it is utilitarian; it is aesthetic.

Our New Kombi

So now we have two of these very versatile vehicles. One takes a tennis team; the two together can take a whole rugger or cricket team. Other school activities also are feeling the benefit e.g. groups from the Scientific Society have visited nearby research stations.

We still have problems when taking two or more teams away, or when larger groups of athletes or swimmers are involved and we hopefully look forward to the day when there may be even further additions. But already the strain is much lighter on the cars of staff, parents and friends.

Headmaster's Annual Report

OCTOBER, 1967

Mr. Chairman, Dr. and Mrs. Busschau, members of the College Council parents and friends:

I have the honour to present the College's report on the activities and achievements which have kept both staff and boys so busy during the past year. As you will see, many members of staff have contributed to this record.

Examination Results:

The senior Matriculation class of 1966 did not appear to us to be highly endowed academically. We did know that very many of them were hard working.

You may then imagine our delight when the Matriculation pass lists reached us in the middle of January. If ever my oft-repeated contention that it is the boy who works who wins, was to be demonstrated, then the 1966 Matriculation class did so.

(a) Joint Matriculation Board Matriculation and School Leaving Certificates: 11 First Class passes, 17 Second Class passes, 5 Third Class passes, with no few than 19 distinctions spread over six different subjects.

In addition a small group of boys, who appeared to have no chance of gaining a Joint Marticulation Board Certificate, were entered for the National Senior Certificate and seven out of 14 passed, one with university entrance.

- (b) In the Junior Certificate examination, written mainly by boys who are still in the fourth forms (Standard 7), the following results were obtained: 12 First Class passes, 31 Second Class passed, with 15 distinctions.
- (c) Taalbond: Voorbereidende Hoër Graad met Lof 1, Hoër Graad 11, Gewone Graad 39. Laer — Hoër Graad 5, Gewone Graad 67. Hoër — Gewone Graad 16.

Staff:

After a long spell of unprecedented stability it is inevitable that when changes come they take us by surprise. Mr. Watson's decision to leave the teaching profession in search of a far more lucrative way of life is one which I deplore; he is such a good schoolmaster. In their three years in charge of School House Mr. and Mrs. Watson have won the respect of boys, parents and the staff. Mr. Gavshon is reluctantly answering the call of his ageing parents to return to the United Kingdom. Mr. Nel is, for one year,

curtailing his class teaching so that he can spend more time developing his musical talents at Rhodes University. Mr. A. M. M. Rossouw, after a long and distinguished career, is retiring to his home at Jeffreys Bay.

Mrs. I. Murray has for the past five years been motoring back and forth some 36 miles each day to teach Biology to the senior forms. Only the dedicated wife of an Old Kingswoodian and the mother of two Kingswoodians would have kept up this grueling routine for so long. We are truly grateful.

Mr. S. H. G. Morgan has spent one year with us taking most of the physical education classes. He returns to University next year and then comes back to Kingswood as a permanent staff member.

New appointments have already been made to fill all the vacant posts. Mr. K. H. Douglas is to be transferred from Wood House to School House and Mr. L. R. Victor has been appointed the new Housemaster of Wood House.

New Teaching Aids:

The enlarged language laboratory has taken over six months a-building, due mainly to our very wet winter. However, we have in our possession all the apparatus and furniture needed for the full tally of thirty booths. Surely we can expect to have the use of this new building, together with the gymnasium, by the beginning of next year.

The overhead projectors are slowly coming into use. The problem of the effect of glare on the teachers' eyes was not foreseen and has taken a little time to overcome. At present we have only nine of these projectors; I have no doubt by this time next year I shall be looking round frantically for the ways and means of doubling this number.

The Carey Memorial Gate:

The new gate which has just been built at the entrance leading to the area between School House and the Dold teaching block has transformed the whole appearance of this area. It has also pointed to quite a lot more face-lifting which must take place along Burton Street.

The gate is the gift of the sons and daughters of the late Mr. Oliver T. Carey. It has been built as a memorial to the memory of an Old Kingswoodian who was the father and grandfather of Old Kingswoodians and present Kingswoodians.

It is gifts such as this that bind the generations in their love for their old school, whilst at the same time bringing an enhanced sense of their heritage to the present boys in the school.

In the course of my truly-wonderful long leave Mrs. Dacam and I were quite overwhelmed by the kindness we received from parents and old boys. Accounts of our meetings with the Kingswood connection in Windhoek and Salisbury will appear in the next issue of the Kingswood Magazine.

For the second consecutive year the Synod of the very large Methodist Grahamstown Distict have elected me as one of their two lay representatives to Conference, this year in Pietermaritzburg. This honour I take as a special vote of confidence from the Church in what the staff are achieving in this school.

Chaplain's Report:

The year has seen great strides in the quality of worship produced in the Chapel both in morning prayers and in the Junior Chapel Services. Visitors to the evening services are struck by the quality of leadership that is provided by the boys of the Junior Leaders Committee. I am equally happy in the splendid reliability of the members and the fine atmoshpere and sense of eagerness that there is to take part in, and be part of, the worship.

We have had some memorable services too. At Christmas time we had the annual Carol Service. At this service we also received and unveiled the "W.H.S. Window" given to the Chapel by past members of the Wesleyan High School for Girls. The music prepared for the occasion by Mr. Stewart Thompson as he conducted both Choir and Brass Band set a new standard, and the large choir of boys gave a polished performance. There were numerous "Old Girls" of W.H.S. present and we were able to bring them a nostalgic moment when the grandsons of two present distributed some old W.H.S. hatbands that had somehow miraculously survived the ravages of time. These were much appreciated.

In other departments the work goes steadily ahead. Assisted by Mr. T. C. Hartzenberg and Mr. A. M. M. Rossouw regular weekly prayers are held on Wednesdays in Afrikaans. Their help and fine contribution is much appreciated.

In the teaching sphere no new books have been added as text books to the curriculum, as the opportunity presented by an overseas trip has suggested that new aids and valuable new books might be procured from publishing houses in Britain. We are well served here, but the range and therefore the choice is somewhat limited.

SCHOOL CINEMA


The facilities for showing movie films are being put to very good use by most of the School Societies and, in addition, regular feature films are enjoyed by the boys every third Saturday.



Medal to Maj. D. R. Butler, for 20 years efficient service in cadet work. A large number of local military dignitaries were present.

Fair weather, for a change, blessed the Foundation Day Parade on Sunday, 17th March. The smartness of the marching, and the volume of the singing from the gallery of Commem., were a fitting tribute to the memory of the 72 Old Kingswoodians who died in the last World War.

SHOOTING

The Inter-Detachment Bisley was arranged at a time which proved most awkward for our teams in that it was fired on Speech Day. Although they put up a very good score during practice most of our marksmen had disappointing shoots on the day of the competition, upset possibly by having to rush down to Port Elizabeth early in the morning. Whitehead were selected to represent Eastern Province in the Senior and Junior teams respectively. For the fourth successive year, Eastern Province won the Grand Challenge Shield at the Inter-Command Cadet Bisley.

One of the most enjoyable shoots of the year was that against St. Andrew's. In a closely contested match St. Andrew's were the eventual winners beating our Senior team by 10 points, and our Juniors by 4 points.

C. J. Step was awarded Honours for his brilliant shooting throughout the year; Colours were awarded to S. P. Dunk and G. J. Lombard. Standards were attained by R. Knott, J. Muller, R. Stewart, M. Whitehead and B. Billingham.

The Col. Minnaar Trophy for the best Senior Marskman was awarded to C. J. Step and he also won the Fletcher Trophy for being the best rapid-fire marksman. The Jones-Phillipson Trophy

for the most improved under 16 marksman was awarded to B. W. Billingham, and the Deary Trophy was awarded to M. J. Whitehead. A Kingswood swagger stick was awarded to G. J. Lombard for his services to shooting on the range and in the armoury.

In a recent 100 metres match, W. Liversidge and D. Pitman shot well, and an under 15 team had a convincing win over St. Aidan's. The team was represented by J. Hedderwick, D. Pitman, M. Dean, W. Liversidge, N. Aggett and A. Rein. The highest scorer was A. Rein with 92%.

Grocott's Mail — 3/10/1967 KINGSWOOD ONE-ACT PLAYS

The evening of one-act plays by the Junior and Senior Dramatic Societies of Kingswood College provided very pleasant entertainment for those parents who came down to Grahamstown for the long weekend. The plays were preceded by the Junior Choir under the direction of Mr. Stewart Thompson.

The Junior Choir sang very well and impressed with their disciplined and charming manner of presentation. The songs all concerned the sea and were linked further by narrators who introduced each song.

"Kings in Nomania" by Percival Wilde, presented by the Junior Dramatic Society and produced by Mrs. Carol Tarr, went down extremely well with the audience. The choice of play was a happy one and ideally suited to junior school children. The story concerns a young boy king and a bootblack in the kingdom of Nomania, who are brought together by chance and injustice on Christmas Eve. Yanku, the bootblack, is condemned to death for finding a precious jewel that dropped from the King's ring, and failing to hand it over thinking it to be merely a piece of glass. The boy king pardons Yanku through a mistake on the part of his grown-up advisors and he and the boot-

black become firm friends. The story is a delightful fairy tale. Nomania is a minute kingdom in Europe. The army, air force and police force consists of one man. Yanku holds a court of his own in the poor part of the city, and deals out simple but effective justice to the members of his gang. Snigran, the miser, is the wicked landlond who charges Yanku and his mother an exorbitant rent for their house.

ACTORS

A very pleasing performance was given by Peter Roux in the part of Yanku and Graham Barlin as King Zoril II, was outstanding, especially when sitting on the throne reciting a very difficult and thoroughly boring ceremonial speech, prompted by his ministers whenever he became "stuck". Stephen Barlin as Snigrand tended to shout at times but managed to convey the nastiness that was required of the part. Marfa, Yanku's mother, played by Garth Newell, was a difficult role for a boy to play but the actor gave the best emotional portrayal of the play. The heralds, played by Theo Lombard and Michael Burchell, gave very competent performances.

Costumes were good but the lighting suffered, possibly through lack of equipment. The shadows on the curtains were disconcerting at times. It was pleasant to see that the make-up did not force the attention of the audience to it, and even the difficult task of making the Gendarme, played by Rolland Bryan, look suitably military, was done without the result being ludicrous.

"THE SNIPER"

"The Sniper", by Uys Krige, presented by the Senior Dramatic Society and produced by Mr. B. R. Pitman, was undeniably the most successful of the plays. The play has a deceptively simple plot. The story concerns the discovery, by a South African Jewish officer (Capt. Meyer), of two wounded Germans in Lombardy, May, 1945. The Germans are terrified that they will be shot as they are convinced by propaganda that this is the practice of all allied forces. This is the main reason for the stubborn resistance of the shattered German troops, who fight on regardless of their obvious defeat. This stubborn rearguard action causes considerable damage and slows down the allied advance. Snipers have killed 17 men under the command of Colonel Venter alone. Colonel Venter himself arrives shortly afterwards, discovers that one of the Germans has killed his godson and becomes determined to execute him as a sniper.

IRONY

The crux of the play revolves around the ironic situation in which a Jewish South African officer argues for the life of the German soldier. At the end of the play there is a very tense moment when the audience waits for the shot to be fired which kills the German. Venter himself does this as his men refuse to obey him.

The play has one simple climax — the death of the "sniper" — but throughout the action there is a continuous shift in the value of truth so that at the end of the play all pre-conceived ideas about Germans, Jews, and absolute right and wrong, have been examined and found wanting. The moral of the play is the futility and utter stupidity of war.

ACTORS

There is no change of scene in the play and consequently a considerable burden is placed on the characters, especially Captain Meyer (Alan Barnes), who nevertheless gave a very competent performance. His only fault was that he did not make enough use of light and shade in his voice — a failing of most of the characters.

The German soldiers, played by Guy Pitman and Ross Henry, managed to speak with convincing foreign accents and their characterisations were generally sound. The Italians, "11th hour Partisans", were very well done by Neil Nash, Brian Mathews and Timothy Fincham.

Colonel Venter, played by Jonathan Parkin, had flashes of brilliance but was in general rather too much the "British officer" at times.

In general, the play was highly successful and well worth seeing.

DEBATING SOCIETY REPORT

After an initial meeting in which the committee was chosen with Ian Dove as chairman and Jury as secretary, the Debating Society started its activities proper with a meeting in the library on the 13th February. The debate, "Is being "with it" really worth it?" had a successful opening with thought-provoking speeches from the four main speakers — Dove, Fincham, Attwood and Crafford.

Speakers from the floor made a contribution to the Debate which as a consequence became very lively on several occasions. Among the speakers from the floor who made conspicuous contributions were M. Collier, Rubike, Stewart, Spiegel, Van Niekerk, Vorster, Sparg, McKerron, Meyer. It was especially heartening to see how Form III boys, who constituted a large percentage of the 65 boys present, conquered their initial shyness and then stood up and had their say.

SWIMMING — 1967/68

This swimming season has been the best ever in Kingswood's history, culminating in the Eastern Province Inter-High Schools Gala where we came 2nd behind Grey. In the last three years Kingswood has now come 4th, 3rd and 2nd. Gavin Douglas was chosen to represent E.P. Schools at the S.A. Schools Swimming Championships in Klerksdorp, and Peter Steijl for the E.P. Schools Lifesaving team to the S.A. Schools Championships in Welkom.

Our successes were even more noteworthy for the fact that very few of our swimmers manage to get club training during the 2 month vacation. Their enthusiasm and diligence at training sessions, both in and out of the water, resulted in a greater degree of fitness, and those who worked on the Exer-genie exercisers soon achieved their best-ever times. Not a single swimmer failed to improve on his previous season's best times. The hoodoo of breaking the 100m. freestyle Colours time (64.0 secs.) was overcome early this year, and in the end M. Robus, G. Douglas and A. Collier all broke 64.0 secs. Many of the boys have now realized that achieving a Colours time is not the be all and end all of their swimming career: they are going for faster and faster times all the time, For example, A. Paris swam a 2.42.7 in the 200m. backstroke, a full 7.3 secs. below Colours time, but unfortunately there is no such event in any Schools Championship. This is one boy who must continue swimming when he leaves school: his time now (and he is u16) is very close to the S.A. National qualifying time for 200m, backstroke. In P.E. Gavin Douglas swam the 110 vds, freestyle in 1.03.9 (heat) and 1.04.4 (final). These times are equivalent to 1.01.9 and 1.02.4 in our bath!

The boys should also aim at greater all-round ability. Most of our swimmers are now not specialists any more. The 3 senior Victor Aquarum winners proved this by being way ahead of their next rival in their respective divisions: Open: E. Collier; U16: A. Collier; U14: M. Colley. Those who are also coming on nicely in this respect are P. Gosling, K. Kearns and B. Sandberg.

This season we took part in 9 galas, 2 in Kingwilliamstown and 2 in Port Elizabeth. Four masters are now connected with swimming: Mr. Wegerhoff is master-incharge and coaches senior swimming, while helping Mr. Joubert with water-polo. Mr. Joubert coaches diving, while Mr. Osborn does the Junior Swimming. Mr. Smith, the Phys. Ed. master, has re-introduced Lifesaving: Many boys have been awarded lifesaving certificates or medals and we also took part in the E.P. Schools Lifesaving Championships. I had the privilege of being manager of the E.P. Schools Swimming Team to the S.A. Schools Championships in Klerksdorp this year, and at the end of this report I have included the highlights of these and the S.A. Schools Lifesaving Championships in Welkom.

Time trials, held early in February, saw many swimmers doing their best-ever times. Most boys improved on these times later in the season, but perhaps the best performances (which could not be improved on) were the following:-

B. Sandberg 3.04.5 200 m. Breaststroke.

P. Steijl 3.05.5 200m. Breastroke.

E. Collier 2.46.2 200m. Individual Medley.

The former 2 boys should break 3 mins. next season, and the latter must aim at breaking 2.40.0.

The season started in October last year with the 10th Albany Boys' Schools Gala at St. Andrew's where we gained 10 first places and set up 3 new records:-

M. Colley U14 66 2/3 yds. backstroke 46.9.

S. Barlin U14 100 yds. breaststroke 1.21.6.

U16 Medley relay team 3.04.5.

This latter team proved to be our outstanding combination this season: A. Paris backstroke, A. Smith breaststroke, A. Collier butterfly and G. Douglas freestyle.

The Annual River Race at Kasouga saw 2 new records being set up, in the Open by E. Collier (16.08.6) and in the u16 by G. Douglas (15.12.4). B. Larsen was injured at the start of the open race by diving against a rock submerged in the water. After a swim in the sea, the boys thoroughly enjoyed a braaivleis. Overall, Wood House won from Jagger.

An exciting and very hard played inter-house water-polo competition was held in November, Jagger running out winners closely followed by Gane.

The Wistyn Cup was won by Wood House: Inter-house Swimming Relays Gala, this being a new event on our programme. A number of Open buffer events were held during which A. Paris set up a new school backstroke record of 1.17.0.

Very early this year the Kingwilliamstown Swimming Club held their Annual Gala: most of the top E.P. and Border swimmers took part. Numerous Colours and Standard times were set up, while our best performances included:-

M. Colley 2nd U14 100 yds. Backstroke (1.12.3).

A. Collier 2nd U16 100 yds. Butterfly (1.13.9).

G. Douglas 3rd U16 100 yds. Freestyle (58.8).

E. Collier achieved Colours in the 220 yds. Breaststroke (3.08.0) and 100 yds. butterfly (1.09.2), A. Paris in the 100 yds. Backstroke (1.10.0) and A. Momberg in the 100 yds. Backstroke (1.10.2).

The following weekend, again in Kingwilliamstown, we came 4th in an E.P. and Border Inter-schools Gala behind Grey, Selborne

and Dale. Our best performance was put by E. Collier in winning the open $4 \times 33 \ 1/3$ yds. Individual Medley in a new record time of 1.31.7 (Colours). The Open Medley Team (A. Momberg, P. Steyl, E. Collier and C. Botha) also set up a new record of 1.15.4. In coming 2nd or 3rd the following also broke existing records:-

M. Colley 45.8 U14 66 2/3 yds. Backstroke.

A. Collier 44.1 U16 66 2/3 yds. Butterfly.

K.C. U16 Medley Team 1.18.0.

Other outstanding results were as follows:

A. Paris 2nd U16 100 yds. Backstroke (1.09.3 Colours).

A. Momberg 3rd Open 100 yds. Backstroke (1.11.0 Colours).

M. Robus 3rd Open 100 yds. Freestyle (57.9 Colours).

At the Annual Kingswood — Graeme Gala, we beat Graeme 140—87. There were 21 new Gala records as well as 10 new Kingswood records, the latter by M. Abraham, G. Douglas, E. Collier, M. Colley (2), M. Robus, A. Paris, M. Schuddinh, A. Collier (2). The Albany Junior Schools Gala was held at the Rhodes Bath where we came 2nd behind St. Andrew's. First places were gained by R. Newman, I. Sawers, G. Wade and C. Sparkes, as well as the U12 and U13 relay teams and the U13 medley team. A number of open buffer events were held, with E. Collier winning the individual medley in a new record time of 1.33.1 (Colours).

The Inter-house Gala was our best ever: 23 school records and 40 inter-house records were broken. All the long distance events, more than 100 metres, were held in the week prior to the Gala, while the inter-house diving was held on the next day. The U16 and Open 800 metre freestyle events were new events this year. M. Robus won all 4 Open freestyle events (800m., 400m, 200m., 100m.) with A. Collier winning the same U16 events, but tied with G. Douglas in the 100m. freestyle. E. Collier won the Open individual medley events and the 200m. breaststroke, while A. Momberg won the 2 Open backstroke events. A. Collier took the U16 individual medley events and the butterfly, B. Sandberg the breaststroke U16 events, and A. Paris the backstroke U16 events. M. Colley (who won 7 events) and M. Schuddinh made a clean sweep of the U14 events. The Senior Birch Cup was won by Wood House from Jagger, and the Junior by Mercury with Olympics as runners-up.

At the E.P. Schools Championships we came 2nd behind Grey, our best performance ever. The fact that only Gavin Douglas made the E.P. Schools Team, and that we won only 1 event (U16 Medley Relay) testifies to the great effort put up by everyone in the team. It was also significant that all K.C. boys who went to P.E. made the finals, i.e. in the 110 yds. events, 2 out of 9 finalists were from K.C. The new

- (a) Consistently good performances of a Colours standard.
- (b) Helping junior and other swimmers.
- (c) Exceptionally diligent training.
- (d) Selection for E.P. Schools.

My thanks go to all those staff members and boys who helped to officiate at the Galas. Special thanks go to Mr. Ken Douglas for his interest and help at time trials and training sessions, and also to those people who provided transport for our away Galas.

ATHLETICS

This report of course is a bit like writing up history. The first events it records are those which took place in the latter term of last year since the South African Athletic Season begins in October and ends at Easter with the various Junior and Senior Championships.

Last year was one that was outstanding in at least two respects.

and possibly three. I do not remember a year when the Athletic events have been so be-devilled by rain. This is a strange thing to say when we have come through one of the worst droughts, but measured athletically this is nevertheless true. To begin with, the Eastern Province Inter-Schools Athletic Championships that are normally held in March managed only to go through half of the day and early in the afternoon had to be called off when the going on the track became impossible. This was singularly unfortunate for us because Peter Kamp's under 19 team would have registered one of the best victories that we have ever achieved in this competition. This was disappointment number one. The next came the following Saturday when it simply poured and the Interhouse relays had to be postponed until the third term. We had seen enough to know that the team was a very good one and our hopes were high for the end of the year.

The third term opened with a very successful Junior and Senior Road Relay. The Mercury team won this first ever Junior Road Relay in 56 mins. 23.8 over a course that is exactly similar to the senior save that the "loop" has been cut off. Pegasus were 2nd, Achilles third and Olympics fourth. The Senior event went to Chubb House ably led by Evan Dold who turned in the 2nd fastest time of 12/39 seconds. Gane was second, with Russell Kirkby putting in a terrific run to break Lindsay Sabatta's record by 11.4 secs. to set a new time 12/2.6 (0/ " = mins). Wood were third and Jagger fourth.

The next events of consequence were the Inter-House Relays Junior and Senior, postponed from the first term. As always this proved a most keenly contested competition. It produced records in the Javelin (when Wood House represented by P. Forsyth, A. Anastasia and E. Funck set a new distance of 480 ft. 3 in. to break the old mark by 67 ft. 7in); the Discus was improved by 34 ft. $5\frac{1}{2}$ inches and the High Jump by $2\frac{1}{4}$ inches to take it to 15 ft. 10. Chubb had this distinction, while Wood were responsible for the Discus. The overall winners were Jagger. They managed to pip Wood House by 3 points gaining 41, Chubb were third with 32 and Gane fourth with 29.

The Annual Cross Countries produced some splendid running in all age groups. The under 12 was won by J. Oosthuysen, second was Murray Douglas third J. Truter, 4th L. Swart.


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The next meeting of consequence was the Junior Triangular between Graeme, St. Andrew's and Kingswood. This under 14 event has become a fine meeting and is now very keenly contested. We ran concurrently with it a new Pentathlon competition for Under 16 and Open athletes. A. P. Forsyth won the Open from M. Kent with a total of 444 points, M. Kent achieved 440. D. van Niekerk won the Under 16 with a tally of 452 points. Now back to the Junior Triangular. Kingswood won by chalking up $28\frac{1}{2}$ points to Graeme's 19. St. Andrew's were third with $18\frac{1}{2}$ points.

I began by saying that athletic events were bedevilled by rain. The long awaited Triangular against Grey, St. Andrew's and Kingswood was scheduled to take place on the following Tuesday. Sunday the weather broke. It cleared again on Monday evening and then at 7.30 a.m. There was a message from Grey to say that their track was underwater. Grey were then invited to travel to Gråhamstown, as there seemed more prospect of holding the competition on the grass track of Gane field. No one could have thought it possible that when the Javelin throwers began their event we should have had the day of thrilling performances which indeed we did. The weather cleared at about lunch time and with a little re-arrangement of the programme we managed to hold every event. Hence we prevented the rain from robbing us a second time. The Kingswood team put up one of the best performances that a triangular side has ever done and won by $8\frac{1}{2}$ points from St. Andrew's who gained 26. Grey were third with $17\frac{1}{2}$.

Now came the big test. St. Andrew's were the organisers of the Hirsh Shield and this took place on the Rhodes Track. Things went well and our hopes were high until the lunch interval the relays were held. Then, in a strong field, at the last baton change the baton went to ground, not dropped, but knocked out of the receivers hand by the lifting knee of the third runner. A complete accident! This team was one of the most experienced relay sides that we have ever fielded and had come within .1 of a second of the E.P. Record the previous Wednesday at a training rehearsal on the Rhodes track. It was a slip that cost us dear and eventually Queens ran out the winners by $1\frac{1}{2}$ points. Largely owing to the splendid achievements of D. van Niekerk who gained three firsts a second and a third we managed to win the S. F. Edwards Shield that has been presented to the under 16 competition. It was a day of thrilling athletics and the standard was very high indeed.

This brought the formal season to a close, but three of our athletes continued and brought further lustre to their already impressive records. D. Wilson (440 yards), C. Ansley (880 yards) became the first boys to break 50 seconds for the $\frac{1}{4}$, and 2 mins. for the $\frac{1}{2}$ mile whilst at school. This they did at the Stirk Bowl competition and

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together with W. Jackson who is the most impressive Shot Putter we have had since Des Whitehead left, all got into the Senior Men's E.P. Team before the year was out. D. Wilson in his last race for E.P. covered himself with glory running from behind to come second to J. Cyrus, also of E.P. with the splendid time of 49.1. In so doing he beat the reigning under 19 champion P. Schneiders of Defence. Ansley set a time of 1 min. 58.8 secs. whilst Jackson achieved 44 ft. $10\frac{1}{2}$ in. with the Open (16 lb.) Shot. J. Gallet, the most determined Hurdler that I've seen, achieved the seemingly impossible for a school, clocking the same time as the winner for the 120 yards Men's High Hurdles to come second at the Stirk Bowl. Our normal hurdles for the Triangular are 3 ft. These are 3 ft. 6 ins. Since he has done this, D. van Niekerk has attempted as an under 17 and looks very promising indeed.

So we come to the short but intensive 1968 first term season. W. Jackson returned and has led the side well. He has set a fine example and has twice this term represented E.P. Seniors. He managed to gain selection with D. van Niekerk to go to the recent Juniors at Bloemfontein, Both did their personal best, Jackson throwing 47 ft. 3 inches to come 5th (Booysen of S. Tvl. won in 56 ft. 3 inches) and D. van Niekerk was fifth in the under 17 Pole Vault with a leap of 11 ft. 6 inches. This was won at 13 ft. 6, but the winner has already done 14 ft. So both our Shot Put and our Pole Vault have a long way to go. The season opened with the journey to P.E. after five days training, the heat being held in the last week of Cricket. We managed to come second to a very strong Pearson side in the under 19 section, but were a good 8 points behind. Actually this was much better than we had dared to hope. But some fine distance running by S. Douglas, and also some 400 metre running by H. Cilliè a new comer, together with steady support from K. Shaw who won the High Jump, helped us to keep in the fight and run out eight points better than the third who was Brandwag. 47 High Schools took part, so the competition was heavy.

We returned to be hosts to Graeme, P. J. Olivier and St. Aidan's in the Annual Quadrangular Relays. St. Aiden's unfortunately had to pull out and so we fielded a Kingswood B. Side. This competition takes place in three divisions, Open, Under 15 and Under 13. We had a very good afternoon of events and managed much to our surprise to win all three sections as we did last year. Graeme did very well particularly in the under 13 section, and both the P.J. and the Graeme Medley sides proved too much for us.

The final event was the 1968 Inter-House Relays. This was again very keenly competed and after some tremendous reversals of opinions and expected form Jagger again ran out winners gaining $56\frac{1}{2}$ points, Chubb were next with $39\frac{1}{2}$, Wood third with 33 and Gane fourth with 31. Achilles won the Junior $31\frac{1}{2}$, Pegasus $25\frac{1}{2}$, Mercury 21, Olympics 12.

IN MEMORIAM

SIDNEY SOUTHEY STIRK died in Grahamstown on 1.2.1968 after a long illness, in his 91st year. He was at Kingswood from 1894 to 1898. He was our oldest O.K. and was always most loyal to his School. A man with many and varied interests, he was also a great sportsman, and had the distinction of being the first Cricket Captain of Kingswood. Besides excelling at cricket, he was an expert shottist and marksman, a keen tennis player, golfer and, later, as a bowler he was Captain of the Grahamstown Bowling Club for many years — up to the time of his death. His Xhosa name "Tandabantu", meaning "he who loves everyone", pictures vividly for us this kind and gentle man.

ROBERT HENDERSON MATTERSON died in his sleep in Natal on 21.2.1968, aged 81. He had suffered recently from an enlarged heart. He was at Kingswood from 1900 to 1903 and, after attending Dulwich College in England, went on to Cambridge University where he graduated M.A. He returned to Kingswood and was Science Master from 1912 to 1922. In 1923 he became Headmaster of Kearsney College, Natal, until 1947, when he retired, but retained a keen interest in the School, living close to it and helping in many ways, particularly with the raising of funds to enlarge the Chapel, of which he was Treasurer. He never forgot Kingswood and was a regular and generous subscriber to the funds of the Foundation. He is survived by two daughters, both of whom are married and live in Natal.

WALTER JAMES KNIGHT died suddenly while asleep on 21.1.1968. He was at Kingswood from 1902 to 1910. After attending the Agricultural College at Potchefstroom he enlisted and served during the First Great War, both in South Africa and on the Western Front where he was wounded and where he won the M.C. with two bars. He was President of the O.K. Club in 1953 and was a member of the College Council from 19.3.1928 until his death — almost 40 years. In spite of an unfortunate impediment in his speech and hearing he served this Council most loyally and ably.

His funeral service was conducted by the Rev. H. F. Kirkby in the Kingswood College Chapel.

THOMAS GORDON BENNETT, at Kingswood in 1906, was not only a good scholar, but an excellent sportsman, playing in the School First XI, as well as in the First XV. He lived for many years as an attorney in Peddie where he died last year — a man who loved his old School.

We received the following self-explanatory letter last month, followed in a few days by the arrival of a very handsome Cup, together with ten Miniatures. What a splendid gesture!
