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The Chancellor

The Chancellor is an office that goes back to antiquity: the original Chancellor or cancellarius (as the office was known) regulated access to the Roman Tribune. In medieval times, the office became associated with the heads of the writing departments of the early kings. Because so few people were literate, a chancellor was necessarily learned. This is why the heads and spokespersons of the early universities were also accorded the title. More recently, the office has become largely symbolic. The executive head of a university is its vice-chancellor.

Justice Pius Langa is the sixth Chancellor of the University of Natal. His predecessors are : The Honourable D G Shepstone (1949-1966), Dr G G Campbell (1967-1973), Dr B A Armitage (1973-1983), the Honourable R N Leon QC (1983-1992), and Archbishop D E Hurley (1993-1998).

The Mace

The Chancellor's Mace is used on ceremonial occasions presided over by the Chancellor and is regarded as the staff of office. It symbolises the University's protection of its Chancellor.

The use of the mace as a symbol of authority has a long history. The head of a copper mace, which apparently dates back to the 12th Century before Christ, has been excavated at Beyce Sultan in Asia. In the early centuries, churchmen who went to war often carried a mace in preference to a sword. On one side of the mace-head was beautifully decorated with the owner's emblem and on the other side was a large knob which served as a weapon, but was always round as a reminder of church law forbidding the shedding of blood. In the early centuries the mace was a symbol of the king's authority. During the power struggle between the king and the Commons in the 13th Century, the king gave the speaker the mace as a symbol of his indemnity against arrest.

The Mace was designed by Mr G H Atkins, senior lecturer in sculpture in the University's Department of Fine Arts. The Mace was made in England, it was first used at the 1970 graduation ceremonies.

The Armorial Bearings (see front cover)

The armorial bearings of the University of Natal were awarded by the College of Arms in London.

The two black wildebeest come from the arms of the Province of KwaZulu-Natal. They are shown in full course to symbolise movement and progress. The two open books represent the universal heritage of knowledge and the two centres of the University, Durban and Pietermaritzburg. The five pointed star refers to the naming of Natal by Portuguese navigators when they landed for the first time at Durban on Christmas Day in 1497. Stella Aurorae (star of the dawn) symbolises the role of the University in bringing to light new knowledge and spreading the enlightening influence of education.

Academic Dress

The wearing of gowns by judges, ministers, teachers and scholars is an ancient and significant custom.

When the graduating students at universities receive their diplomas or degrees, they, too (and for some, only once in their lives) wear the caps and gowns and so participate in this long tradition. By wearing the ancient regalia, they join hands with students past and students present.

In modern academic ceremonies the standard cap and gown are almost universally worn. Of all the components of the costume, the hood conveys the greatest amount of information: it makes clear the level of the degree, the faculty in which it was given, and the institution which awarded it.

Convocation

After being capped by the Chancellor, each graduate moves across the stage and hands the hood to the

President of Convocation (or representative). The President places the hood upon the graduate's shoulders.

At the end of the ceremony, after the Chancellor's procession has left the stage, the President leads a

procession of the new graduates out of the hall, row by row, to symbolise their acceptance into, and future membership of, the Convocation of the University of Natal, the statutory body through which graduates have

the opportunity to play a continuing role in the affairs of the University.

A Brief History of the University of Natal

Natal University College - The forerunner of the University of Natal - opened its doors in Pietermaritzburg in 1910 with eight professors and 57 students, eight of whom were women. Lectures in Classics, English and Philosophy, Law, Modern Languages, Botany and Geology, Chemistry and Physics, Mathematics and Zoology were spread over various venues, including Maritzburg College, the Natal Museum building and at the City Hall.

It was not until August 1912 that Old Main Building - built on 40 acres of land donated by the Pietermaritzburg Corporation - was opened by the then Minister of Education, F.S. Malan and the core of the present-day Pietermaritzburg campus was established. The following year, Natal University College (NUC) ceased to be a state institution, becoming instead a state-aided body.

In 1923, NUC extended its tuition to Durban with university level courses in Commerce and Engineering at the Technical College, but it was not until 1928 that Durban agreed that NUC take over full responsibility for university classes in Durban, thereby establishing the characteristic dual nature of the University of Natal. A generous donation by T B Davis, whose son, Howard Davis had been killed during the battle of the Somme in World War I, facilitated the building of Howard College on the Berea which formed the core of a separate campus in Durban. Howard College was formally opened in 1931.

Largely through the efforts of Fabian Socialist Dr Mabel Palmer, separate classes for 19 "Non-European" teaching students at NUC were introduced in Durban in 1936. This number, reflecting an obvious need for training of this nature, grew to nearly 900 by 1960. However, like the University's Medical School, founded in 1951 for black students, classes still reflected the segregated nature of South Africa under apartheid. The government's Extension of University Act of 1959 limited new enrolments, other than those at Medical School, to whites and thwarted the University's aspirations to serve the educational needs of broader society. This act also restricted the autonomy achieved when NUC was granted full university status in 1949. It was not until 1983 when the University circumvented the government's racial admission "quotas" by an appeal to the High Court, that the University could fully resume its role of serving the educational needs of the broader community. Today, about 20 000 students, representing all sectors of South African society, are enrolled at the University of Natal.

In 1953, the administrative control for the University was shifted from Pietermaritzburg to Durban. In response to mounting travelling costs, the two centres were academically separated in 1973, with each centre having parallel faculties of Law, Humanities, Commerce, Science, and Social Science. Recent restructuring has meant the merging of some faculties across both campuses, with Faculties of Engineering, and Law being shared by both campuses. Unique to Durban are the Faculties of Community and Development Disciplines, Management Studies, Science and Medicine. Unique to Pietermaritzburg is the Science and Agriculture Faculty. There are separate Faculties of Human Sciences on each campus.

The University of Natal is fortunate to boast among its past vice-chancellors and principals some exceptional leaders. Its first principal, John Bews (1930-38), was a world-renowned botanist while Dr E G Malherbe (1945-65) was known internationally as an educationalist. In 1993, the University of Natal was the first South

African University to appoint a woman as its principal. Brenda Gourley is the present incumbent. Chancellors have also been distinguished figures, not least the present Chancellor, Judge Pius Langa, and the recently retired Archbishop Denis Hurley. Students include Alan Paton, Steve Biko and Alec Erwin. Honorary graduates include Nelson Mandela, Roy Campbell and Abdullah Ebrahim.

The University of Natal is committed to service through excellence in teaching and research and is opposed to discrimination on the grounds of race, colour, nationality, religion or gender. It is known as a centre for excellence in Africa, is one of South Africa's top research institutions, and has links with almost 260 international institutions. Aligned to the demands of a rapidly changing global environment, the University has embarked on a thorough reform of curricula and university structures and is currently a leader in multi-disciplinary studies and is engaged in significant HIV/Aids research. In recognition of its role in society, the University of Natal is also committed to greater emphasis on community-based education and service learning.

FELLOW OF THE UNIVERSITY OF NATAL

MARGARET JOAN DAYMOND

Margaret Daymond is not only a distinguished literary scholar, but one of the most respected feminist writers working in the field of South African literature in this country. Over the last twenty years she has published steadily in both local and international journals and has edited a landmark collection of essays which focussed attention on the work of South Africa women writers. Her introductions and endnotes have contextualised this work and, in a real sense, revealed it to the world. In her own essay in the collection, Professor Daymond was, moreover, the only person to offer a substantive critique of Njabulo Ndebele's influential essay, 'The Rediscovery of the Ordinary' from the perspective of gender. One of the referees for the award of the Fellowship commented that 'she rightly argues that Ndebele's claims quite ignore writing by women and thus misrepresent South African writing.'

It is not surprising that Professor Daymond has been invited to be one of the South African editors of a large archival research project entitled 'Women Writing Africa'. Funded by the Ford Foundation and published by Feminist Press in New York, this will result in six volumes of written and oral work by African women. This honour will, of course, enable Professor Daymond to build on her earlier work. Here we may mention her co-edited collection *Momentum: On Recent South African Writing*, published in 1984. These essays summarised the first wave of South African literature entering the Universities. In 1996 she edited the even more influential *South African Feminisms* which was the first collection of feminist criticism published in the United States. It should be mentioned that the origins of this work lay in *Current Writing*, the journal which she and her colleagues at the University of Natal pioneered in 1989.

Professor Daymond has also edited important works of fiction, notably, Frances Colenso's novel *My Chief and I* and its sequel *Five years Later*, as well as Bessie Head's first novel *The Cardinals* and a reprint of Lauretta Ngcobo's second novel *And Theyv Didn't Die*. These are a fine complement to her literary criticism.

In addition to her scholarship, Professor Daymond has given generously of her time in fostering graduate research and she is regarded as an outstanding supervisor of higher-degree students. She lends her expertise to a number of literary and professional organisations and has for some years been one of the University orators.

It is fitting that we honour Professor Margaret Daymond both for her contribution to Literary Studies in South Africa and also to many spheres of scholarly life at the University of Natal.

ADRIAAN DONKER

We begin with the image of a boy on a bicycle. It is 1942. He is riding out of the city of Rotterdam to the countryside. He is transporting people on his bicycle. This is occupied Holland and the people are Jews. They are being hidden, safe from deportation by the Nazi death squads. This work has been arranged by his father, whom the boy is helping. Later the boy, whose name is Ad Donker, will take up his father's publishing trade and move to South Africa, where he will dedicate himself to the thought that in a repressive society, the writer is called on to overcome the regulations which the state imposes on public conversation, reading and thought, by creating works which sing the imagination, denote the social facts and create communities of readership whose bonds defy the borders placed on persons by that state - in this case, by the apartheid master plan. Without the publisher who gets the writer's manuscript from her study into the field of public life, the writer can, however, do little, and her manuscript becomes a gathering place for dust rather than an occasion for the communion of human minds.

Until Ad Donker and a small number of others came along, publishing in South Africa was largely a matter of coffee table books about flower painting, or worse, English cooking, and the only nudity allowed on the South African silver screen were close ups of the big five. Nadine Gordimer had to make her reputation abroad. And yet Donker diagnosed those perilous times as ripe for a literary renaissance, one of diverse South African voices, some known, some unknown. He published the first anthology of what became known as the Soweto poetry: To Whom it May Concern. It concerned everybody. His poetry series, it is no exaggeration to say, kept local poetry alive. He published the unknown with the same care as the well-known, in some cases leading to new recognitions. The result, collections by Mitshali, Serote, Gwala, Livingstone, Campbell, Plomer, Butler.

Since such publishing was never profitable, Ad Donker Publishing House was financed by the publication of reference books, which in turn allowed him to produce books like A Century of South African Short Stories, a standard work in universities, and in the 1980s, to publish Bloke Modisane (banned at the time) and Dikobe wa Mogale (in jail at the time). Mogale is, interestingly, the nom de plume of Ben Matthews, now a member of parliament.

Some few years after the end of apartheid, Donker was brought out of retirement to develop the Centre for Creative Arts, which is, as we all know, now a vibrant part of this faculty. In the three years of his tenure he turned that Centre into a whirlwind of cultural activity, revitalizing the Durban International Film Festival, and establishing both the Poetry Africa Festival and the Time of the Writer Festival. Working the field of international links and funding agencies like an impresario, Donker has again gotten the vision and the practice right, understanding that what is needed in post-apartheid South Africa is to bring

g the world here in
the form of a tapestry of distinctive American, European, Asian and above all, African voices, while also
offering the world at large the culture of the South African doorstep. A model for the African renaissance,
Donker has translated this vision into events which have given the Centre for Creative Arts
, and the University
of Natal, national and international recognition.

We look forward to Ad Donker's next move. In the meantime, we salute his important accomplishments.
