Report of 24 April 1986

He was returning home from his job as a construction worker, currently working on Pep Stores, accompanied by a friend when they saw a police toot patrol approaching along the street. They turned and ran because they were afraid of being hit by sjamboks.

Nowa tried to jump over a fence and his jacket got caught. He was shot by one of the policeman and the bullet went through his chest and came out at the waist. He was thrown into a police van and taken to the old Beaumont and Rice building at Makana's Kop (where the Rini police are housed).

One policeman there sat on his head, one on the bullet wound and one on his legs and they pummelled him with their fists. All the policeman were black.

They then took his clothes off, washed him, put his clothes back on and took him to the Settlers' Hospital. At this stage he began to have difficulty breathing and was given oxygen and transferred to Livingstone Hospital in Port Elizabeth.

In the meantime his family believed him to be dead and mourners began to arrive at their house. However, Nowa recovered sufficiently to be transferred back to Settlers' with a coloured guard.

He told Eunice the above story and said that he was due to be discharged the next day to the police cells. He is anxious because he is totally innocent and he still feels far from well.

TOWNSHIP POLICE TO BE BOLSTERED

SEBOKENG — At least 5 000 black municipal policemen, to assist local authorities in townships, would be trained during the next six months, the Minister of Constitutional Development and Planning, Mr Chris Heunis, said yesterday.

Municipal policemen, under the control of local authorities and responsible for the maintenance of law and order and the enforcement of council by-laws, had powers comparable to the SA Police, Mr Heunis said here.

The Urban Councils' Association of South Africa has requested that municipal police be granted extended powers, and Mr Heunis said legislation would be tabled in Parliament to make the municipal forces "to a large extent ancillary to the SAP".

The Government had set aside funds so that training of the additional municipal policemen could be completed by April next year. — Sapa


POLICE in Port Elizabeth are looking for 40 Alsatians to train as police dogs.
