COMMITTEES REPORT.

In presenting the Committees Report, a brief review of the- events that led to the institution of the Committee is desirable.

The abnormal rains that took place on the 12th and 13th June, 1935, throughout Natal caused serious floods in various parts of the country, with considerable damage to homes, vegetables and other crops. The small Indian farmers and gardeners were the principal sufferers and their losses were very heavy.

The principal centres affected were Clairwood, Sea Cow Lake, Springfield, Umgeni and Umlaas. At Clairwood a large number of homesteads which were situated on the banks of the River Umhlatuzana, near the Bayside, were in great danger. With a considerable change in the course of the river, the banks were llooded, with the result that houses stood not only in danger but some were actually washed away with all the goods and chattels.

There was a heavy landslide at Sea Cow Lake and the roads became blocked for a long stretch. Houses slid down the hill, one for a distance of over a furlong. The lowelying gardens were inundated, with water several feet deep, and all transport facilities were cut oflr for some time. Since the floods of 1917, fortunately for the residents of Springfield, their homes were built on the hillsides, while they farm on the low lands, but they, in common with others, suffered a heavy loss of crops.

Serious situation had risen in Umlaas district owing to the great damage done to some of the gardens and to the roads, which Were rendered impassable for a time.

The first scene of relief activity was at Clairwood, where in the dim of night the soaring river caused its devastation. Men, women and children were marooned. They were panicstricken and the distress could be better imagined than dee scribed. It was amidst such scenes that Messrs. H. S. Done, Headmaster of the Clairwood Government-aided Indian School, N. P. Naidoo, R. P. Das. Pavadai R. Father, the Social Service Committee (Clairwood Branch), the staff of the Clairwood Government-aided Indian School and other residents, with the aid of the local troop of Indian Rover Scouts, went to the rescue of the people and to tender assistance. It was a timely act and averted a serious loss of lives. The splendid service rendered by the Rover Scouts were worthy of mention. The Clairwood Indian bus owners and the local taxi owners rendered free services in transporting about 400 of those affected to a place of safety to the Hindu Temple Hall and the Clairwood Government-aided Indian School. When the news of such devastation was given publicity in the local Press, the Governor-General, Earl of Clarendon, and Lady Clarendon, the Agent-General for the Government of India, the then Deputy-Mayor, Mr. W. E. Langton. and Mr. A. C. Stead. of the Protector's Department, visited the scene of the distress. Mr. S. R. Pather, representing the South Coast Junction Area Indian Advisory Committee, in consultation with some of the above officials present suggested the opening of a Fund which they unanimously approved and was undertaken by the South Coast Junction Area Indian Advisory Committee.

In the interim, the Natal Indian Farmers' Association and other institutions expressed a desire to co-opetate with a view to consolidating all efforts.

Without loss of time, a joint meeting of representatives of the following institutions was convened by the South Coast Junction Area Indian Advisory Committee, the Natal Indian Farmers Association, Colonial Born and Settlers' Indian Association, the Clairwood Branch of the Indian Social Service Committee and the Natal Indian Congress. All but the reptee sentatives Of the Natal Indian Congress attended, and the Central Indian Flood Relief Committee was formed. Before the opening of the Fund by the South Coast Jgnction Area Indian Advisory Committee, the kind action of MLIW. E. Langton, the Deputy Mayor, in authorising the expenditure of the immediate supply of food was greatly appre-

tiated. In addition to this, the local Indian community and others also rendered help.

Mr. A. C. Stead, representing the Protector's Department, in the absence of Mr. H. Robinson, who was on his way from overseas, took a very active interest in the welfare of the flood victims.

The Central Committee assumed full responsibility of the Fund started by the South Coast Junction Indian Advisory Committee.

STATISTICS.

Immediate action was taken to obtain statistics from the various districts on printed forms supplied by the Central Committee, such forms containing details as to losses, number of dependents, etc. In order to effectively carry on the work, District Committees with investigators were appointed, who enquired carefully into all the cases and reported to the Central Committee. Immediately the cases of the sufferers were gone into and recommended for help, they were issued ration cards on which were stipulated the quantities they were entitled to according to the number of dependents on a scale of rationing agreed to by the Central Committee, as shewn in the annexure appended to this report. Mr. N. P. Naidoo was appointed as Statistics Ocher and Mr. T. M. Naicker as the Inspector of Investigations. The arduous services of Mr. S. R. Father, the General Secretary, in the success of the Committee's work deserves to be specially mentioned.

The annexed schedules Will show the number of the sufferers and their dependents to whom assistance was given.  ${\tt INFLUENZA}$ 

Simultaneous With the distress of the sufferers through the fiood, there was an outbreak of influenza and the Central Committee had to undertake the work of relief in this direce tion.

The Protector of Indian Immigrants, Mr. H. Robinson, immediately on his arrival paid a personal visit to some of the areas affected accompanied by the ofhcials of the Committee and rendered every help.

The Committee is indebted to his Department for free

supply of medicine and to Dr. G. M. Naicker for free medical services to Springfteld and Clairwood sufferers.

The rations consisted of rice, dholl, potatoes, onions, salt and oil. In addition to these, there was a distribution of some blankets and clothing.

District distributors, with the aid of their respective committees, were in charge of the rationing. Rationing commenced on 14th June, 1935, on weekly basis and thereafter for longer periods. Rations were supplied up to let December, 1935.

A banking account in the name of the Committee was opened in the Standard Bank of S.A., Ltd., Pine Street Branch, The services Of Mr. E. M. Paruk as treasurer. assisted by his son, Mr. M. I. Paruk, is greatly appreciated. All accounts have been carefully scrutinised by Mr. D. S. Chetty, who was appointed by the Committee as its examiner. The Financial Statement and Annexures reflect the manner in which the fmances of the Flood Relief Fund have been dealt with and relief granted. The Natal Provincial Administration, Durban City Council, and the Immigration Bureau Fund contributed 12 100 each towards the later stages of the relief distribution. The services of collectors in augmenting the Fund are greatly appreciated. The administrative expenses of the Committee had been kept as low as possible.

The thanks Of the Committee are due to all those who helped In any way for then untiring services, thus ensuring the success of the work undertaken, including its chairman, Mr. M. A. Karim.
