The following is the heading and the text of an article which appeared in the December 4 edition of the "Edenvale Nuus".

"ASSOCOM MEMBERS 'MAD AS HELL'

THE BROAD spectrum of Assocom's membership is 'mad as hell' about the fact that while they are fighting for survival they are being regarded as the 'goose that lays the golden egg' and are being called upon to bear the brunt of the new Constitutional dispensation and experimentation.

THIS STATEMENT was made by former town clerk of Edenvale, and present Legal Manager to Assocom, Mr Ken Warren, at a seminar on the new Regional Services Councils due to be implemented next year.

THE SEMINAR took place at a meeting of the Council of Reef Municipalities, held at the Edenvale Community Centre.

MR WARREN was commenting on statements made by the Deputy Minister of Constitutional Development and Planning, Mr P J Badenhorst, in regard to Assocom's contention that the way to raise funds for the RSC's was to broaden the GST base and not by means of levies calculated on remuneration and turnover.

MR BADENHORST said the Assocom proposal would have a cost raising impact and that the criticism levelled at the proposed levies would thus equally apply to the Assocom proposal.

HE SAID the levies were intended to differ from region to region and it would thus not be feasible or practicable to have a differentiation in General Sales Tax as between regions. FROM A constitutional point of view he said the Assocom proposal did not take into account one of the Government's basic policy guidelines, namely a maximum devolution of responsibilities, powers and decisionmaking to the local government level.

INSTEAD OF accomplishing a transfer of functions and funds to the local level, the Assocom proposal would lead to a further unacceptable centralisation.

MR WARREN said that Assocom and the private sector fully support the greater devolution of power to local government level and recognise the urgent need for additional financial resources for infra-structure and other services, particularly for under-priviledged sections of the community.

HE SAID they were not questioning the necessity for raising the necessary funds but merely the means, and they also questioned the ad hoc basis by means of which these funds are intended to be raised, prior to the Margo Commission report concerning the full tax structure of the Republic.

MR WARREN said that Assocom, the Federated Chamber of Industries and other employer (Continued on Page 3)

bodies had consistently requested that the
proposals be referred to the Margo Commission and that in the interim other sources
of finance should be found from Central
Government, or elsewhere.

ASSOCOM AND others had suggested, that as an interim measure, should the funds be that desparately required, they be financed by way of a Regional surcharge on GST (the so called 'piggyback' system could be imposed). This would also differ from region to region.

THE REGIONAL surcharge of GST would still be determined at local level subject to the necessary Municipal and other controls provided for in the Act.

IT WAS felt that this had the advantage of making use of existing tax collection mechanisms and procedures without creating a plethora of other collection agencies with the problems of training staff and collecting revenue.

MR WARREN stressed that Assocom supported the maximum devolution of powers to local government level where possible.

'HOWEVER, WITH respect, we must make the observation that the Act as it now stands provides for a devolution of functions to local levels but actual powers remain at central Government levels.'

THIS VIEW was supported by Prof. Jan Lombard, now Deputy Governor of the Reserve Bank, and Johan du Pisanie. 'While it is stated that the object of the legislation is that RSC's are new institutions in the hands of and controlled by local authority, the Bill itself leaves the strong impression that the Councils are to be imposed and controlled from above.'

IN REGARD to the cost raising impacts referred to by the Deputy Minister, Mr Warren said Assocom accepted that the regional surcharge on GST would also have a cost raising impact but the proposals as they now stood, and particularly the payroll levy, could have disastrous effects on the unemployment situation.

WITH UNEMPLOYMENT already at alarming levels a further tax on employment seemed utterly devoid of all logic.

'IN FACT further taxes on an already beleaguered business community struggling for survival in the worst recessionary circumstances since the 1930's, also does not make sense.' ??

IMPORT CONTROL

SARDINES IN OIL IN AIRTIGHT CONTAINERS

Until November 7, 1985 the above commodity could be imported free of import permit under customs tariff heading 16.04.50.

However, with effect from November 8, 1985, the Department of Customs and Excise has revised the sub-headings of the main tariff heading of 16.04, with the result that the above item is now classified under customs tariff heading 16.04.05.20 and effectively requires an import permit.

Following a complaint from a member, the Chamber's Information Department has established that import permits are not required for the above commodity. The Directorate of Imports and Exports has advised importers experiencing difficulties in clearing their consignments to ask Customs to contact the Directorate in Pretoria (Tel. 012 - 285500) for confirmation that an import permit is not required.

Changes in customs tariff headings will occur from time to time until the harmonised commodity coding system is introduced in 1987. Similar problems could therefore arise in the meantime.

ESCOM TARIFF INCREASE - ANOTHER PRIME EXAMPLE

The magnitude of the Escom tariff increase is another prime example of the price we are having to pay for failing to get our politics right and unless we do, consumers should brace themselves for other significant price and tariff increases during 1986.

It is appreciated that Escom is having difficulty in raising loans overseas for political reasons and that there is a limit to the amount of capital that can be raised locally. Therefore in order to ensure that there are sufficient funds available for future development, Escom has no alternative but to look increasingly towards revenue as a source of funding capital expenditure.

It is regrettable that the increase has come at a time when the economy is at a low ebb and it is possible that Escom has miscalculated the adverse impact this will have on electricity consumption which could give rise to further significant tariff increases in the future.

The impact on the rate of inflation is a worrying factor and the Chamber is of the view that unless other price and tariff increases can be tempered in the short term inflation is likely to go through the roof next year.

INTERNATIONAL POSTAGE RATES INCREASE

Reacting to the announcement of a 30% increase in international postage rates from January 1, 1986, the Chairman of the National Consultative Committee on Post Office Affairs, Mr G A Ewer, said:

"Whilst there are understandable international payment obligations in respect of overseas mail this increase will have a very adverse effect on business. It is of

concern that increases for similar reasons might shortly be applied to telephone, telegram and telex tariffs and it is to be hoped that the business community will be given maximum advance notice." He expressed the hope that this increase would be reviewed as and when the Rand exchange rate improved. "It is at least gratifying that the increase has not been extended to internal postage rates," he said.

DELAYS IN THE PASSING OF BUILDING PLANS

The response from a number of members to the Chamber's request for details of continuing delays in this regard suggest that delays of some 4 months, including referrals, are still being experienced. The matter is to be pursued by the Chamber in conjunction with SAPOA whose members report similar experiences.

PAYMENT OF RATES

The Chamber has called for further information on a request by the City Treasurer for the Chamber's views on a contemplated change in the relevant legislation to require rates to be paid on a monthly basis only thus eliminating the option of paying annually.

SALE BY PUBLIC AUCTION: FORMER ALBERT STREET SCHOOL

The Chamber has urged the City Council to fully identify and evaluate the perceived needs and interests of Indian ratepayers and businesses in the general area before taking any final decision in terms of its notice to sell the school by public auction.

ENVIRONMENTAL GUIDELINES: WESTVILLE

The Chamber understands that the report of the Consultants to the Westville Town Council on the question of introducing environmental guidelines for the Borough should be available shortly for comment, when they will be examined by the Chamber's Westville Committee.

NATIONAL MANPOWER COMMISSION

The Chamber has now forwarded to the Chairman of the National Manpower Commission a (Continued on Page 5)

copy of its revised and updated policy
statement on the issue of unfair labour
practices and the status of the Industrial
Court, with the request that these views be
taken into consideration by the NMC in its
further report and recommendations to Government on these issues.

After very careful consideration the Chamber has concluded that, while the present definition of an unfair labour practice is not satisfactory, the concept is still developing and it is therefore preferable to allow further time to elapse before attempting any revision. It is therefore important that the status and functions of the Industrial Court should be urgently reviewed to facilitate a more satisfactory definition of ULP's through legal precedent, and the Chamber's representations have been concentrated mainly on this aspect.

PENSION PRESERVATION

The Chamber was represented on a small subcommittee of Assocom that met on December 10 to formulate an Assocom response to the Parliamentary Select Committee on Pension Preservation.

Assocom was recently represented on a SAC-COIA delegation which gave oral evidence to the Parliamentary Select Committee, the main thrust of which emphasised the need to set up a more broadly based independent commission of inquiry on the issue. SACCO-LA members were particularly concerned that all employee groups should be effectively consulted and involved in the formulation of any scheme for compulsory pension contribution and preservation.

COMMENT ON DRAFT MOS REGULATIONS

The Chamber has now finalised and forwarded to Assocom its comments on the Draft Asbestos Regulations and the Environmental Regulations for Workplaces that were published for comment in Government Gazette 9952 of October 4, 1985.

MINISTERIAL INTERVIEWS/CONGRESS MOTIONS

An Assocom delegation called on the Minister of Law and Order (November 28) to discuss its concern over the unrest, consumer boycott issues, and congress motions affecting his portfolio.

An Assocom delegation also met the Minister of Constitutional Development and Planning in Cape Town on December 11, 1985.

An interview took place with the Minister of Trade and Industry (at which the Deputy Ministers of Trade and Industry and of Finance were present) in Pretoria on November 22, 1985. The prevailing business mood, as expressed during the Assocom Congress, was put before them. Arising from the discussions it appeared that noticeable sociopolitical and economic measures will be taken during the forthcoming Parliamentary Session. An assurance was given by the Minister that the Government is not moving towards a closed economy and therefore it does not foresee the need to exercise further restrictions to control importations. He also indicated that the import surcharge will be phased out as soon as possible, and that R30 million from the import surcharge collections had been made available to the Small Business Development Corporation to provide bridging finance to small businessmen in terms of the Small Business Development Assistance Fund.

MARGO COMMISSION

VAT vs GST

The Margo Commision has called for further views from Assocom regarding its preference of GST to VAT. This is under consideration by both the Assocom Taxation and Distribution Committees. It is for noting that the FCI was supportive of the introduction of VAT as an alternate to GST. Assocom on the other hand is not, believing that a VAT system will swamp the business community with a mass of paper work.

Expenditure Tax System

In answer to a further request from the Margo Commission, Assocom's Taxation Committee has prepared a memorandum which specifically considers the possibility of an expenditure tax system, the main purpose of which is to provide a tax incentive to save.





REGIONAL INDUSTRIAL INCENTIVES - NEW BOOKLET NOW AVAILABLE

Dr. D.J. de Villiers, Minister of Trade and Industry, states in a recent news release that since the publication of the Manual for Regional Industrial Incentives in November 1982, it became clear from the implementation of the incentive scheme, which at that stage had only been in operation for a short while, that some amendments to the scheme would have to be made to eliminate certain practical problems and to improve its cost-efficacy.

In view of this need, the participating states mutually agreed to revise the Manual completely, and after extensive multilateral negotiations, this task was completed. The Chamber's Information Department has obtained a supply of the revised manuals and members may obtain a copy from the 2nd Floor, Commerce House, 39 Field Street, Durban.

SAA OVERBOOKING AND STANDBY ARRANGEMENTS

ASSOCOM has been informed that South African Airways has abolished the system of overbooking on scheduled flights. A standby system has been introduced in its place.

Members will soon be able to learn Zulu in the comfort of their homes. SABC is to present a 6-month course in Zulu on its TVl service commencing in January.




The course will commence with Episode 1 on Monday, January 6 in English, followed by Episode 2 in Afrikaans on Tuesday, January 7.








THE DECEMBER/ JANUARY SCENE

The Chamber is receiving numerous telephone calls from members and their staff regarding the December and January holiday and shop hours situation. Would members therefore please note and advise their staff as follows:

In terms of Proclamation 78 of 1985 published in the Provincial Gazette on February 21, 1985, ALL SHOPS WITHIN THE DURBAN LICENSING AREA WILL BE PERMITTED TO BE OPEN FOR TRADING DURING THE EXPO '85 OPENING HOURS.

Expo is open from 10h00 to 22h00 every day of the week except Mondays on which day normal trading hours for shops (from 06h00 to 18h00) will apply. The extended closing hours during weekdays as well as trading on Saturdays and Sundays do not affect opening times for shops which remain at 06h00 from Mondays to Saturdays.

Taking account of Proclamation 78 read with the existing provisions of the Licences and Business Hours Ordinance 1973, the following shop hours are permitted in the Durban licensing area until January 6, 1986:

> Monday 06h00 to 18h00 Tuesday/Saturday 06h00 to 22h00 Sunday 10h00 to 22h00

WHAT ABOUT THE HOLIDAYS?

In addition to the above, members should also bear in mind the following situation regarding public and commercial holidays falling within the period of Expo 85:

MONDAY, DECEMBER 16 - DAY OF THE VOW AND WEDNESDAY, DECEMBER 25 - CHRISTMAS DAY

These are both public holidays throughout the Republic and are two of the four religious holidays on which all businesses must close including those with extended hours licences.

THURSDAY, DECEMBER 26 - DAY OF GOODWILL AND WEDNESDAY, JANUARY 1, NEW YEAR'S DAY

Public holidays. In the <u>Durban licensing</u> area only, a special concession has been

granted during the period of Expo 85 allowing all shops to open from 10h00 to 22h00. However, shops with extended hours licences may observe their usual hours on December 26 and January 1 which will run concurrently with the Expo trading hours concession.

THURSDAY, JANUARY 2, 1986

Commercial holiday in terms of the Natal Licences and Business Hours Ordinance, applicable to SHOPS ONLY and affecting certain towns in Natal.

Special concession for Durban in 1986 only

As a special concession during the period of Expo 85 all shops in Durban will be permitted to open on January 2, 1986, during the opening hours of Expo (10h00 to 22h00). Shops with extended hours licences may observe their usual hours on January 2 which will run concurrently with the Expo trading hours concession.

However, under normal circumstances, all SHOPS in Durban would have to close on January 2 with the exception of those with extended hours licences.

Effects on Ordinary Legal Provisions Governing Maximum Ordinary Hours of Work

These extended hours granted do not affect or override the ordinary legal provisions governing maximum ordinary hours of work and payment for overtime which may apply to the business in question. (These may be found either in the Basic Conditions of Employment Act 1983 or in the appropriate Wage Determination or Industrial Council Agreement for the trade in question).

If the business falls within the scope of Wage Determination 406 for the Commercial Distributive Trade, then a 10% "night work allowance" will also be payable to all staff required to work between the hours of 19h00 and 06h00. The relevant section of Determination 406 reads:

"Night work allowance - an employer who requires or permits his employee form night work shall pay such employee, in addition to his wage, an allowance at a rate of not less than 10% of his hourly wage for each hour or part of an hour worked by such employee on night work. Provided that this sub-clause shall not apply to a manager, security guard, watchman or an employee who is excluded from the hours of work provisions by virtue of Clause 5 (9)(a)."

Previous restrictions on the hours of employment of females in shops and offices, etc., have been removed since the enactment of the Basic Conditions of Employment Act 1983.

TRENDS IN THE DURBAN CBD

The Chamber is informed that the majority of CBD retailers will be trading from approximately 08h00 until 17h00 on the remaining two Saturdays before Christmas - December 14 and 21. On Sunday trading, most CBD stores will be open on the two Sundays ahead of Christmas - Sundays, December 15 and 22 - from 11h00 to 16h00. The Chamber has alerted SATS and bus transport authorities on the need to revise schedules to accommodate this change of trading hours.

NEW PRIORITY MAIL SERVICES



The Post Office has introduced a priority mail service between Durban and Vereeniging.

Posting times from Durban GPO:

Monday to Friday 16h30

As from January 6, 1986 a priority mail service will be introduced, on a sixmonth trial basis, between Durban and Benoni.

THE BUSINESS CONFIDENCE INDEX (1983 = 100) FOR THE PERIOD JANUARY TO OCTOBER 1985

The figures for the composite index of business confidence for the ten months to October 1985 are shown below:

At 76,1 April 1985 reflected the lowest point of business confidence in 1985. The recovery in confidence which was noticeable in May and June was interrupted by the political and financial crises in July and August. A small rise in business confidence followed in September, mainly as a result of the Government's continued measures to stimulate the economy. This recovery in the index, however, did not continue in October, for a number of factors, including the negative reaction to the introduction of the import surcharge, a sharp drop in the financial Rand and the lack of visible success of the October meeting in London with South Africa's foreign creditors to discuss procedures for our foreign debt re-scheduling.

NOVEMBER INDEX

The latest BCI - for November 1985 - stands at 80,6 up from the previous month. This slight improvement was the result, chiefly, of:

(a) the announcement of the Mossel Bay oil project;

(b) the early repayment of loan levies by the Commissioner of Inland Revenue in mid-December, and the abolition of the 7% surcharge in income tax as from March next year;

(c) the reduction of the prime rate of commercial banks by not less than two percentage points to 16,5% during November; and

(d) the sharp upswing of the all market index on the Johannesburg Stock Exchange.

Nevertheless, business confidence remains at relatively low levels with the numbers of insolvencies still on the increase, unemployment very high and the rate of inflation nearly 17%. In addition, real purchasing power of the consumer is still declining and, in the present situation of low rates of utilisation of production capacity in manufacturing industry, expenditure on capital investment is remaining low.

PETROL PRICE RISES AGAIN

For the fourth time in 1985, the price of petrol has been increased. At the beginning of this year, 93 octane petrol on the Witwatersrand was 63,5 cents per litre, while the latest increase which came into effect on 11 November, raised the price to 100,5 cents per litre - an increase of nearly 60% so far in 1985.

During the past ten years to September 1985 the consumer price has risen by about 240%. When the most recent rise in the petrol price is taken into account, the past ten years have seen an advance of approximately 380% in the price of 93 octane petrol on the Witwatersrand.

The following table gives the price in cents of a litre of 93 octane petrol on the Witwatersrand in November of the years indicated:

From the table, it will be noticed that the petrol price jumped by more than 80%, from 30,1 cents in 1978 to 54,4 cents per litre in 1979. During the next five years to 1984, the increase was only 17% to 63,5 cents per litre in 1984. The causes of the 1979 petrol price increase were increases in the dollar price of oil. However, the 1985 petrol price increases were the result of the continued and at times, e.g. in August and September 1985, extremely steep falls in the value of the South African Rand against all foreign currencies. The recent jump in petrol prices may have had a beneficial effect - it may have contributed to make it possible for South Africa to exploit the petroleum gas discovery at sea near Mossel Bay.

A project to develop these oil resources at an estimated cost of R3 500 m was announced recently by the State President.

When on stream, this project should make a considerable contribution to South Africa's liquid fuel requirements.

MISSION TO TAIWAN

PLANNED FOR 1986

The South Africa-Republic of China (Taiwan) Chamber of Economic Relations is planning a trade mission to Taiwan in March/April next year. The dates are being fixed in consultation with its Sister Chamber in Taiwan and further advice is awaited.

Members should take advantage of this valuable opportunity to participate in a trade mission organised jointly by the SA-ROC Chamber and its counterpart in Taiwan as it offers facilities and advantages which are not freely available to individuals seeking to establish trade with the Republic of China.

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

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
