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GOVERNANCE MATTERS

- 4.1 Deployment of Chairs of Portfolio Committees: The Ofi¬\201cials and NWC discussed and decided on cdes to be deployed to serve as Chairpersons of Portfolio Committees in the National Assembly and NCOP.
- 4.2 Approach to Parliament: The NWC agreed to a recommendation by the Legislatures and Governance Committee to have a national workshop to develop a comprehensive strategy on our approach to the Opposition, within the context of how we use Parliament and the Legislatures to contribute towards the process of accelerating change.
- 4.3 Freedom Park Trust nominees: The Social Transformation tabled a pool of names of trustees, which was ratii¬ $\201ed$ by the NWC and recommended to the President.
- 4.4 Anglo Boer War: The main government event on the centenary of the War will take place in Bloemfontein, organised by the DACST. Political Education was asked to prepare a discussion paper for ANC members on the War.
- 4.5 Public Sector negotiations: The NWC received regular brie $in\201$ ngs on the processes from the Secretary General who has been convening meetings with Cdes in government and public sector unions.

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6.0
BRIEFING ON THE GOLD CRISIS
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The meeting received a brieï¬\201ng from cdes T. Manuel and P. Mlambo-Ngcuka on the

gold crisis and the steps being taken to deal with it, including lobbying other gold producing nations, international bodies and the UK.

7.0

LOCAL GOVERNMENT

Cde S. Mufamadi gave a brie $\bar{\}$ 201ng on the processes to establish the new Local Government structures and systems, leading up to the Elections towards the end of 2000. The report, together with recommendations on our Campaign phases for Local , government elections, was distributed as part of NEC Documentation Vol. 4.

The NEC discussed the report and the perceptions emerging from our election campaign for National and Provincial elections, thatâ\200\230local government may be our Achilles heel. Cde N. Pandor also highlighted the fact that the NCOP is dealing with a number of instances where provinces have to take over local municipalities due to their i¬\201nancial difi¬\201culties.

ADOPTION OF THE MINUTES

The Minutes of the meeting of 19â\200\22420 March 1999 was tabled. Cde S. Mthembi-

Mahanyele moved for the adoption of the Minutes and was seconded by cdes A. Pahad and O. Bapela.

9.0

OFFICIALS AND NWC REPORT TO THE NEC

The report covered all matters arising from the last NEC meeting and was presented by the Secretary General. NEC Documentation Vol. I

A process of interaction with all political forces in the DRC to assist the process towards their national dialogue has also started.

There is agreement that we

should engage in bilateral talks with parties in Rwanda and Burundi to contribute to the peace process in these countries.

The ANC Youth League convened an All-Youth Renaissance Conference with fraternal youth and students organisations in the continent.

5.3

Other Bilateral meetings were held with a delegation from Sinn Fein on the Peace process in Ireland. We met with a representative of FRETELIN on the situation in East Timor and sent a delegation as part of preparations for the referendum.

6.0 THE ALLIANCE

- 6.1 Following the NEC, the delegation of the ANC to the Alliance Summit met on 4 August 1999 and recommended to the other Alliance partners that the Summit (scheduled for 5â\200\2246 Aug) be postponed due to inadequate preparations on our side. The partners, with some reluctance accepted this recommendation.
- 6.2 We sent a delegation to the COSATU Special Congress.

The delegation

reported to the NWC and an assessment of the Congress was made.

6.3

An ANC delegation also attended the Policy Conference of the SACP, discussing the approach of the Party on Socialism, the nature of capitalism today and the SACPâ\200\231s relationship to capital. The NWC agreed on the importance of our participation in this event, but decided that given the absence of an ANC position on Socialism, members of our delegation would participate in their individual capacity.

Rev. F. Chikane presented the document \hat{a} 200\230 Programme of Action i^2 202owing from the speech of the President to Parliament \hat{a} 200\231. This document, as part of the planning program

in government represents phase 1 of operationalising our immediate priorities and programme; with phase 2 incorporating inputs from ministries and phase 3 detailed plans for implementation.

The underlying principle is to achieve the integration of policies and programme and ensure a participatory approach.

5.0

DISCUSSIONS ON THE POLITICAL AND OTHER REPORTS

The NEC discussed the Political report, the Elections Evaluation and the Accelerating Change documents.

The discussion focused on our immediate programme and priorities and the organisational tasks arising from each section of the document presented by Rev. Chikane. The meeting concluded on-the following issues:

The internal lack of unity had some impact on our campaign, resulting in us not responding in time to issues and lack of coherence and unevenness in our deployment.

3.2 E Cape: The votes we have lost to the UDM in the former Transkei area was mainly because of our style of work and because of traditional allegiances. We also had an absence of an $a\geq 0$ and a cadreship $200\geq 3$ at provincial leadership level and a

problem of sectarianism that alienates professionals who want to work with us.

3.3N Cape: The province did not have a problem of social alienation, due to its Campaign

3.4 Northwest: We had success in our focus on the rural and farm areas and on The main weakness of our

traditional leadership; and we only lost two places.

strategy in the province however, has been to underestimate the former homeland sentiment. We lost three voting stations around Mmabatho and some parts of Maï¬\201keng to the UCDP. Reasons for this include lack of focus on the old Bop elite, including civil servants, the police and teachers and the arrogance of our councilors in Maï¬\201keng.

We also did not mobilize $sufin\201ciently$ amongst the religious community in the province.

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3.5 Freestate:

Although the campaign started late in the province, we did well. The 1;) p M made inroads in Thaba Nchu and one colored area. We still need to analyze the shift to the DP amongst whites in the province. We 'did not do enough work amongst farm workers and did not use our constituency of \(\text{in}\)\(\text{201ces}\) effectively. Lessons are that walk-abouts worked better than rallies and the training of our party agents helped a lot in circumstances where IEC of \(\text{in}\)\(\text{201cials}\) were less knowledgeable about election procedures. Despite the changes to the lists, the leadership in the province was united during the campaign.

3.6 Gauteng: The fact that our research showed this to be a marginal province was an important wake-up call.

The campaign strategy focused on consolidating our primary support amongst Africans and we ran a secondary campaign aimed at other national minorities, using the two Presidents. Campaign methods such as Cabinet meet the people highlighting delivery, taking a message of assurance to farmareas and informal settlements, door to door and walk-abouts assisted with mobilization.

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4.6 Public Protectorâ\200\231s Report on cde NJ Mahlanguâ\200\231s Statements: The Ofi¬\201cials and NWC considered the report and discuss an approach with the province.

5.0

INTERNATIONAL MATTERS

5.1

Socialist. International: As per decision of the NEC, we have submitted our application for membership of the Socialist International and this will be ratii¬\201ed by their General Assembly in November 1999. We have been participating in the SI African committee in preparation for this meeting. The NWC has asked International Affairs and POLED to prepare a discussion document for our membership on the history of the SI and the implications of our membership to

this body.

5.2

Party to Party Relations on the Continent: The International Committee is still working on Guidelines on our overall approach.

Work done thus far

include bilateral meetings with the MPLA (Angola) on the war in this country

' and with Frelimo (Mozambique) on their coming elections, working towards a tripartite meeting.

We also had bilaterals with the BNF and BCP of Botswana, attended the Conference of the BDP; met with representatives from the Ethiopian embassy and the Ethiopia Peopleâ\200\231s Revolutionary Front; with a representative of the

Niger Party for Democracy and Socialism (NPDS); met with the Sudanese National Movement (UMMA) and attended the second leg of the South Africaâ\200\224 Nigeria Dialogue organised by the Institute for Global Dialogue. .

NEC Committees: The amendments to the committees were adopted, and it was noted that cdes J . Khasu, C. Masilela, N. Balfour and M. Shilowa still need to be deployed to Committees. The meeting agreed that the Leagueâ\200\231s participate in all committees, represented by members who are members of the NEC.

10.0 FINANCIAL REPORTS

The meeting decided to defer the Financial reports to be tabled by the Treasurer General to the NWC.

11.0 DEPLOYMENT CONIMITTEE REPORT

The Deputy Secretary-General tabled the report contained in NBC Documentation Vol. 5. The report covered activities of the committee as well as Guidelines on the Role of Premiers, On the Relationship between our Elected Representatives in Government and ANC Constitutional structures and on Accountability of our Public representatives.

(0 New Membership System: The new system is reaching its in \201nal stages of design and we will start piloting it in Mpumalanga this month. The new system will have the following main features:-

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- a) Each member will be given one membership number which will be used throughout her/his life;
- b) A Membership fee will be paid, which will be renewed annually and may be paid for up to two years.
- c) Improvement of the allocation of the 1/3 portion to the branch;
- (1) A tighter management of Recruiter packs, with the appointment of local Recruiting committees comprising of ANC stalwarts and veterans, working in conjunction with the BEC;
- e) The capturing and transferring old membership data to the new system;
- O Implementation of the Constitutional amendments on. membership as adopted at the 50th Conference, such as the grace period for the lapse of membership (Rule 14.20), etc.
- g) The extension of the Annual Levy (before only applicable to elected public representatives) to all members, which can either be paid annually or for 2, 3 Or 5 years;

For the purposes of the pilot in Mpumalanga, the old recruiter packs have been withdrawn and Regional administrators and Organisers will be trained. The Joining fee should remain R12 for the purpose of the pilot. A process is already underway to capture the old membership data of the province.

STATE AND TRANSFORMATION

The document was tabled and discussed and the Summit agreed that a joint task team be set up to $i_7\201$ nalised

amendments to the document.

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We also utilized the negative campaign of the opposition to our advantage. The announcement around the Premier-candidate assisted greatly to change the mood and boost morale in the province.

The campaign revealed that our organizational structures and branches are very weak and there were complaints that we have neglected the hostels. We have yet to analyze why about 30 000 people voted for us nationally, but not for the province and address the issue of organizing black intellectuals in the province, the problems raised about our councilors and the move from the NP to the DP in Eldorado Park.

- 3.7 Mpumalanga: This province also started late with its campaign, but managed to set aside differences to focus as a united force on reaching at the least the same target as in the 1994 elections. The visit of the President changed the mood in the province and the fact that we had reliable statistics from our branches, meant that campaign activities such as door to door work, rallies, mandating forums and blitzes were successful. The DP made inroads into the NNP constituency in towns, but to a lesser extent in rural areas. The province will use the unity displayed during the campaign, to build on beyond the elections.
- 3.8W Cape: The province have yet to do a detailed analysis of the results, but preliminary analysis point to a consolidation of our African support although the management of the elections by the IEC in African areas meant that many voters did not have the opportunity to vote.

In the metro we made inroads into Coloured

working class areas and we won more than half of the rural vote. Our strategy of diffusing the traditional race tensions in the province helped in undecided areas and door to door work was decisive.

Sectoral work amongst farm workers and with the

churches also helped with access to areas previously untapped. The uncertainty in the NNP about Marais position, our bold action with Operation Good Hope and the $200\230\-200$ t blacks $200\231$ interpretation of the DP $200\231$ s campaign also helpe d to sway things our

way. However, we did not pay sufi¬201cient attention, considering that we were not likely to get an outright majority, to the process of building a coalition post elections and were overtaken by events.

3.9 KwaZulu/Natal: The province made signi $\ddot{}$ -\201cant advances by consolidating our urban support and making inroads into rural areas, where we won three out of seven Regional council areas.

The report further focused on the process of forming a coalition in the province.

- We lost considerable support from civil service in areas such as Lebowakgomo, Thoyando, etc.

There also seems to be an ethnic dimension, with Chimoko getting more than us and the PAC getting some votes in the Venda area, primarily because of their choice of Premier-candidate;

- We underestimated the capacity of the DP to make inroads into the rural areas;

It was further agreed that the document will be referred to NEC Committees for further elaboration on their relevant sections and consolidated into an overall Programme of Action for the movement.

We also utilized the negative campaign of the opposition to our advantage. The announcement around the Premier-candidate assisted greatly to change the mood and boost morale in the province.

The campaign revealed that our organizational structures and branches are very weak and there were complaints that we have neglected the hostels. We have yet to analyze why about 30 000 people voted for us nationally, but not for the province and address the issue of organizing black intellectuals in the province, the problems raised about our councilors and the move from the NP to the DP in Eldorado Park.

- 3.7 Mpumalanga: This province also started late with its campaign, but managed to set aside differences to focus as a united force on reaching at the least the same target as in the 1994 elections. The visit of the President changed the mood in the province and the fact that we had reliable statistics from our branches, meant that campaign activities such as door to door work, rallies, mandating forums and blitzes were successful. The DP made inroads into the NNP constituency in towns, but to a lesser extent in rural areas. The province will use the unity displayed during the campaign, to build on beyond the elections.
- 3.8W Cape: The province have yet to do a detailed analysis of the results, but preliminary analysis point to a consolidation of our African support although the management of the elections by the IEC in African areas meant that many voters did not have the opportunity to vote.

In the metro we made inroads into Coloured

working class areas and we won more than half of the rural vote. Our strategy of diffusing the traditional race tensions in the province helped in undecided areas and door to door work was decisive.

Sectoral work amongst farm workers and with the

churches also helped with access to areas previously untapped. The uncertainty in the NNP about Marais position, our bold action with Operation Good Hope and the $200\230$ helpe d to sway things our

way. However, we did not pay $sufi¬\201cient$ attention, considering that we were not likely to get an outright majority, to the process of building a coalition post elections and were overtaken by events.

3.9 KwaZulu/Natal: The province made signiï¬\201cant advances by consolidating our urban support and making inroads into rural areas, where we won three out of seven Regional council areas.

Having presented our programme of action to the nation, a number of questions Amongst others, have we assessed the response of our people to our confront us.

Are we as the leadership of the ANC approaching the

implementation of this programme in a systematic manner, have we given direction to our structures in how they should mobilize to accelerate the implementation of this programme and thus speed up change? How do we use this programme to strengthen our structures and mobilize the masses of our people?

How do we respond to opponents to our programme? The impact of the elections results on the balance of forces \hat{a} 200\224 do we have better space to implement our programme? How do all the elements of the programme contribute to our objective of the fundamental transformation of our society?

How do we take forward debates in

society, e.g. on crime and set the agenda, instead of allowing the opposition to do so?

All the above questions and challenges we will have to address as a leadership. The forthcoming Alliance summit too will have to grapple with these issues.

The rebuilding of the ANC is critical to the success of our programme of action. The election campaign was a good vehicle of mobilization and we should not loose the

momentum.

3.0 EVALUATION OF OUR 1999 ELECTIONS CAMPAIGN

The National Report by the Elections department was circulated - NEC Documentation V01. 2 and presented by cde A. Masondo.

The provinces presented their elections evaluation and raised the key weaknesses arising from this evaluation.

3.1N Province: The Elections campaign focused on the areas where we thought we

were weak and tended to neglect areas where we thought we were strong. results showed the following:- $a\geq 0$

Border issues did not warrant the amount of work we have done, e.g. in Bushbuckridge the voter turnout was 95%;

- We lost considerable support from civil service in areas such as Lebowakgomo, Thoyando, etc.

There also seems to be an ethnic dimension, with Chimoko getting more than us and the PAC getting some votes in the Venda area, primarily because of their choice of Premier-candidate;

- We underestimated the capacity of the DP to make inroads into the rural areas;

On a positive note, the attention given to white areas paid dividends, we won all

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stations around Pietersburg and in other minority areas we won all but two stations.

The internal lack of unity had some impact on our campaign, resulting in us not responding in time to issues and lack of coherence and unevenness in our deployment.

3.2 E Cape: The votes we have lost to the UDM in the former Transkei area was mainly because of our style of work and because of traditional allegiances. We also had an absence of an $a\geq 0$ and a cadreship $200\geq 3$ at provincial leadership level and a

problem of sectarianism that alienates professionals who want to work with us.

3.3N Cape: The province did not have a problem of social alienation, due to its Campaign

3.4 Northwest: We had success in our focus on the rural and farm areas and on The main weakness of our

traditional leadership; and we only lost two places.

strategy in the province however, has been to underestimate the former homeland sentiment. We lost three voting stations around Mmabatho and some parts of Maï¬\201keng to the UCDP. Reasons for this include lack of focus on the old Bop elite, including civil servants, the police and teachers and the arrogance of our councilors in Maï¬\201keng.

We also did not mobilize $sufin\201ciently$ amongst the religious community in the province.

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3.5 Freestate:

Although the campaign started late in the province, we did well. The 1;) p M made inroads in Thaba Nchu and one colored area. We still need to analyze the shift to the DP amongst whites in the province. We 'did not do enough work amongst farm workers and did not use our constituency of \(\text{in}\)\(\text{201ces}\) effectively. Lessons are that walk-abouts worked better than rallies and the training of our party agents helped a lot in circumstances where IEC of \(\text{in}\)\(\text{201cials}\) were less knowledgeable about election procedures. Despite the changes to the lists, the leadership in the province was united during the campaign.

3.6 Gauteng: The fact that our research showed this to be a marginal province was an important wake-up call.

The campaign strategy focused on consolidating our primary support amongst Africans and we ran a secondary campaign aimed at other national minorities, using the two Presidents. Campaign methods such as Cabinet meet the people highlighting delivery, taking a message of assurance to farmareas and informal settlements, door to door and walk-abouts assisted with mobilization.
