1. Hith regards to the Italian Governmental Assistance Programme, 41/NGO/CIES/TANZANIA, for South Africa exile communities of Hazimbu and Dakawa, the African National Congress has, with the help of CIESJ implemented the major aspects of this Programme. This includes, inter alia, the costruction at SOHAFCO of Block 5, which incorporates workshops for computer studies and electronics, an art laboratory and facilities for students - offices. meeting rooms and a catering unit.

In view of the decision to phase out activities at hazimbu and Dakawa over a time-frame of two to five years, the planned expansion of the curriculum to include computer and electronic studies will now not take place. It has, therefore, decided that the computer and electronic equipment acquired in Italy for SOHAFCO should instead be sent to South Africa. As part of the arrangements beeing made for the children, students and adults who will repatriate to South Africa the ANC has taken the initiative to establish five Institutions within the country. These Institutions are being set up in coordination with the South African Government which has agreed to contribute 75% of the costs of establishing and running at least three of them. Coordination is also taking place with the National Coordinating Committee for the resettlement of exiles (NCCR) and Church Organizations. The five Institutions are:

a. a Benegtjgn Qentze that will reorient, introduce, support and assist the returning students. In addition, the Centre will assist in personal matters such as establishing linkage with families, etc. This Centre will be etaffezi by nab

professional staff, including counsellors and educationists and operate between July-Deeember 1881.

b. . a Ezinazziseggndazz_sghggl that will begin operating in January 1892. l

It should be emphasized that, except for the Reception Centre,
these Institutions will also enrol local students and
trainees, other than those returning from exile. In this way,
the process of reintegration will become easier.
The Institutions will be governed by broad- based, nonsectarian boards of trustees, who will be responsible for the
oversight of these Institutions. During the period of
transition in South Africa, they could play an important role
ln innovative educational development in response to the
educational crisis.

It is proposed that the Computer Equipment meant for SOHAFCO be utilized in the Computer Training Institute while the Electronic equipment should become part of Khuphuka Sk:.lls Training and Employment Project.

In addition to the equipment, there is a training component which allows for It alien experts to go to SOHAFCO to install the equipment and to provide training. This component will also be of greater value inside South PF tica.

CIES will shortly carry out a Hission to South Africa to visit the sites of the Institutes and consult with the ANC to ensure the smooth transfer of the equipment to the relevant Institutions in South Africa and to plan the implementation of the training programme.
