Nevertheless, the rally will remain memorable for two reasons.

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(a) It was the first May day rally taht was atte'nded'by leaders of all the main

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opposition parties, that is-, including the Social Democrats, the Socialists as

well as the Euro-Communists.

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(b) It was the. biggest May day rally that--cou}.d be remembered in the his tory of

the country. This was because all the previous May day ralies were secta rian with

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each party or trade union having its own meeting. Even on this occasion they first

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met at their own centres, and only later walked to the grounds where the main

rally was to be held. '

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The only two meetings thaft were held outside the the rally was between the Com-

munist Party and the ANC and the one between'.the ANC' and the D^nch urch Aid.

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The Danchurch Aid confirmed tljeir approval of the request that-the DM D had made to them towards the end of 1987 for assistance in the following:
