In an obvious reference  
to Gatsha Buthelezi â\200\230of  
KwaZulu and Enos  
Mabuza, formerly chief  
executive councillor of  
KaNgwane, Dr. Msibi said:  
\*\*A pitiable figure is the so  
called black leaders who  
have thrown caution and  
moral aptitude to the wind  
simply because he can only  
rule under the protection of  
the apartheid policy. He  
would rather see the black

man remain in Sservitude  
than for him to lose his  
Bantustan . leadership.

the past by the presidents of

" POLICE have launched a

massive hunt for a gang of  
men suspected to be
