ILs approximaLe equivalents could be said LO be reportage (as distinct from report) in journalism or collage in fine arts. (photography is boLh a journalistic genre and an art form). This basic function of phoLomonLage seems to have been fulfilled if we assume thaw the intention is to potray the continuity and inter-relaiionship of our struggle in the work being done at and through soreh'eco.
