CRICKET, 1932-33.

CHRISTMAS TERM.

Cole took over the captaincy of the Eleven, as Bennett had left during the Rugby season. He was able to call on much the same team with which the previous season ended, although a new wicketkeeper had to be found to replace Todd who had temporarily to give up games. But Cole had a difficult task as the form of players was most erratic and there seemed to develop a decided inferiority complex. The captain's form in consequence suffered, and both he and Stevens were but shadows of their former selves.

The batting usually broke down badly against slow bowling, which was partly due to lack of practice against such bowling. We would have welcomed a slow bowler of even moderate merit, but failed to find one. Lack of clean foot-work was the main source of weakness, and the spectacle of opposing fielders grouped near the wicket almost on top of the batsman was never a pleasing one.

We had a wealth of bowlers of moderate talent and of medium pace, but lacked fastish opening bowler and a leg-break

exponent. Scott bowled steadily in most matches and Egner found the turf to his liking. But Stevens was most disappointing and De Lisle failed to make the progress we had hoped for.

One match only was won, and that against the Technical High School during the Schools' Cricket Week. We were glad to have the experience of these matches on turf, in spite of the complete strangeness of these wickets to most of the team. A very pleasant week was spent in Durban.

EASTER TERM.

On returning in January, we had to start team-building, as seven of the Eleven had gone at Christmas. Dickinson was elected captain and was fortunate to be able to call on some promising and keen players, who were ready to respond. This keenness had the result of an improved record and much better cricket was played, both in front of the wicket and in the field. The experience of Kock, who came from the D.H.S. was a decided asset. Although he hardly realised expectations as a bat, he put in some efficient work as a bowler.

Lack of experience and a good deal of nervousness accounted for the moderate performances of newcomers to the team, but everyone had made definite progress by the end of the term and prospects were more hopeful for the oncoming season.

Sanders proved a reliable wicketkeeper and a useful opening bat. He and McKenzie participated in some useful partnerships. Most of the others played good innings at times, but were not consistent run-getters.

The brunt of the bowling fell 011 Dickinson and Kock, who came out with very good records. Dickinson's off-spinners were often too much for lower batsmen, and Kock's accuracy was noteworthy. Egner was the most useful change-bowler, while Freakes got a few wickets in spite of an ungainly action. The fielding was usually of a satisfactory standard, catches being held and returns to the wicket accurate.

The turf practice was not put into use, but was left to settle down for this season. It has, been used during October and has played remarkably well in spite of the unsuitable weather conditions.

We shall now be able to face matches on turf with much greater confidence. We are hoping that some steps will be taken at once to provide a suitable field for First Fifteen practices, which will enable us to proceed with the laying of a match wicket on the Main Ground, which should make an ideal cricket ground. This will not prevent its use for Rugby matches during the winter season. The turf wicket has come to stay in Natal, and Maritzburg College should not be behind in this matter.

Henwood.-A promising bat, strong on the off-side but defence needs strengthening. A smart fielder.

FraNklin.-A correct batsman with a sound defence. Leg-break bowling has been useful, but he must concentrate on consistent length.

Freakes.-An unorthodox cricketer both in batting and bowling. Footwork good: has improved a lot.

Wiles ii.-A promising bat. Good off-drive and square cut. Defence needs attention. Sound field.

Barker.-Batting has not developed: style is too cramped. Fielding good.

Barnes.-A steady opening bowler but his form is erratic. Is often bowling short of length. Fielding could improve.

RUGBY, 1933.

After the last year's run of unbroken success we were inclined to be a little pessimistic over our prospects, but of eleven school matches we won six, lost four and drew one. Though Durban High were unable to beat us, the difference in points on both matches was one, and that out of a total of fifty-seven! Our next fixture was a mid-week match against Technical High, who broke our long string of fourteen school victories by beating us 4-0. Their forwards were a heavy proposition and we take this opportunity of congratulating our opponents on emerging successfully from some very lean years, always a hard test for a new school. Owing to a threatened epidemic the fixture with Michaelhouse was cancelled and our last match for the term was lost to the visiting team of Dale College.

During the July vacation the Combined Schools played the University Colleges as a curtain raiser to the Wallaby Test; our representatives were McIntosh, Nel, Egner and Drummond and although the match was lost, the game was a good one. Against us were several old boys, Gutridge, Erskine, Todd, Stevens (1932) and Tyrrell (1930).

We opened the second term by beating St. Charles' on our ground. Dundee Intermediate visited us and played good rugby to be beaten narrowly 10-8. We avenged our defeat at the hands of Technical High and lost to Michaelhouse. Later we travelled to Hilton College and were beaten 10-16; our last school match was against Durban High, a match of thirty-eight points, marked by an exciting finish when the High School wiped out a five-point deficit by a splendid try on time, to draw with us 19-19. We concluded the season by defeating N.U.C. 2nd XV. 6-3.

L. F. Johnson was at the top of his form and deserved his victories in the open sprints. His Quarter was a splendid piece of running, and he won by at least 30 yards. C. S. Nel showed his versatility by an all-round performance, but was not quite good enough to win the laurels from Johnson. The open events produced the best contests, there being close finishes in all the events.

A. Staley, without doing anything exceptional, showed promising form in the Under 16 Division and was easily the best of his class. The best race was the Mile, which saw an exciting and close finish.

B. H. Hosking outclassed his rivals in the Junior Division, revealing a nice style and a strong finish.

The Senior events produced a satisfactory standard of Long Jumping, as three or four competitors were capable of 19 feet, but lower down the style was poor and the results mediocre. Real hurdlers were markedly absent, and the only hurdler with

any pretensions to style was able to equal the record, which is a poor one in comparison with the high standard of other events.

Mrs. H. Gordon Watson, who was accompanied by His Honour the Administrator, had kindly consented to present the various trophies. Tea was served on the terraces, under the efficient guidance of the Matron. The College Band, although seriously depleted by the call of competitors on its full complement, rendered a number of delightful selections.

SWIMMING.

Great enthusiasm has been shown for this sport during the past year, and a very high standard has been achieved by many of the boys in the School. There are, however, still some thirty boys who cannot swim. Boys at school have every opportunity for learning to swim. The bath is near, the admission is much

cheaper than it is in the case of the general public, and yet we find bo3Ts who will not trouble to learn, but who risk their own lives and the lives of would-be rescuers by bathing on the dangerous Natal coast.

In the Inter-School Sports, held on March 31st, the College repeated their success of the last two seasons by gaining the Senior Shield. The College representatives gained first and

second places in every event in the Senior and Intermediate

Divisions, except in the 200 Yards Open, where they were placed first and third. In the Junior events our representatives did not fare so well, gaining second place to Merchiston in the Championship. They gained, however, two firsts, four seconds and a third in the various events. The times recorded by the College representatives were excellent. Six records were broken, including the times of the Open and Intermediate Team Races. Special mention must be made of von Gerard's swimming. He

won all the open swimming events and broke the record in each.

Other prominent representatives were D. B. Anderson (winner

of the Seals' Cup), J. H. Finlay, W. A. Speirs, J. K. Osborn, L. P. Henwood, J. B. Pickup, W. Fyvie, C. B. Smith, I. Mowaty

D. H. Holder, C. G. Rowse, W. Nichol, K. A. Manson and W.

H. Mutton.

The Intertown Team Race trials to represent Pietermaritzburg against Durban resulted in three of our senior boys being chosen. They were R. O. von Gerard, J. H. Finlay and H. B. Moore. The team, however, lost by a narrow margin at the Durban baths, and so the Ellis-Brown trophy returns after one year to Durban.

The College teams were again entered for the Natal Team Race Time Tests. After having won the Senior Division for the past four years, College lost to Durban High School, whose time was nine seconds better than last year. The Senior B Team came third and the Junior Team second to Merchiston in the lower division.

The College Swimming Sports were held just before Easter, and proved a most successful event. The House contest very quickly resolved itself into a runaway victory for Stalker's, whose representatives, headed by von Gerard, soon established a substantial lead. The fight for second place resulted in a ding-dong fight between Oxland's and Langley's, but eventually the former gained it. The general standard of swimming and diving was high, and there were many close finishes. Records were established in the 50 Yards Open and in the Back Stroke under 16.

The First Class Honours Certificate of the Pietermaritzburg and District Schools' Swimming Association was awarded to ten College swimmers during last season. This certificate is of genuine value, as it is only awarded on attainment of a high standard of speed, style and proficiency in three different strokes, of which breast stroke and back stroke are compulsory. The successful candidates were B. L. Hutchinson, W. H. Mutton,

D. B. Anderson, W. R. Fyvie, R. Emerton, C. B. Smith, B. E. Dixon, J. K. Osborn, L. P. Henwood and G. A. Drummond.

During the winter many of the boys in the School had the opportunity of witnessing the official film of the Royal Life Saving Society, and they have followed it up by practising for the bronze medallion award of that society. At present two classes are training, and the first will take the examination in December. It is hoped that others will join up in the New Year. Knowledge of the correct methods of releasing oneself from the clutches of a drowning person, of effecting a proper rescue and of resuscitating a drowning person are of great value when one is called upon to help in such cases.

OLD BOYS' SECTION.

The Life Membership Scheme, which came into operation early in 1930, with the object of raising funds for the establishment of a Scholarship at the College, continues to draw new members to the Association, with the result that, with the addition of seventy-seven new names during the past year, membership now totals approximately 330. An amount of £342 17s. 9d. stands to the credit of the Subscription Account, to which, however, for the purpose of estimating the amount available for the Scholarship Fund, must be added the amount of £69 8s. 3d. derived as a result of Dances held in recent years.

The Fund is still considerably short of the total originally aimed at-viz., £600-and it is obvious that no rapidity of growth can be expected for the future, owing to the fact that the majority of the older Old Boys have been enrolled, leaving as the sole source of recruitment the small band of boys, not more than 25 or 30, who leave the College annually. However, better times and careful propaganda might revive interest in many quarters.

Following with the subject of Finance, the several statements which will be submitted to you will shew that your Association's position is very sound. Unfortunately, however, owing to unusual expense being incurred in one or two items, the year's working, despite careful economy in the main, shows a profit of only 4/11. When it is explained that, to cover normal expenses, the Association relies on donations, which last year amounted to only £1 11s. 6d., plus the interest on investments, it will be realised that any additional expense is sufficient to upset matters. The reprinting of the Association's Buies is one unusual item which will not require to be repeated for some years.

As regards the Life Subscription Account, an amount of £250 is invested with the City Permanent Building Society, and endeavours are still being made to place a further amount of £100 which at present is lying idle in the Bank. Owing to unprecedented conditions in the market of finance, it has been found to be practically impossible to invest safely any further available moneys, at a remunerative rate of interest.

In connection with the decision to obtain photographs of past Headmasters of the College, framed photographs of Messrs.

E. W. Barns and Calder have been supplied at a total cost of £11 17s. 6d. towards which, I regret to state, only £2 has been subscribed. In view of the conditions under which these photographs were to be obtained it is hoped that further subscriptions will be made without delay to defray a cost which otherwise will have to be borne by the Association.

In reporting on the Sports Club, which comprises the Rugby

and Cricket Sections, I intend to confine myself to the question of finance entirely. Little need be said of the Rugby Section, the financial position of which is sound, though hardly encouraging owing to the abnormal amount of outstanding subscriptions. Notwithstanding an increase in expenditure, the Club still shows an excess of Revenue over Expenditure on the year's working, and when outstanding subscriptions are paid the position will be more satisfactory.

The Cricket Section unfortunately does not appear to have practised economy to the same extent as in the previous season, with the result that only a small profit on the year is reflected. Moreover, owing to the amount of unpaid subscriptions, the debt to the Association has increased to a serious extent.

The question of unpaid subscriptions cannot be given too much attention, and I consider that if members individually cannot realise their obligations to their Clubs, it is high time for a more serious view to be taken of their default.

At a recent Meeting of the Sports Club Committee the question of these arrears received careful consideration, and although in several cases it was decided to write off the amounts owing as irrecoverable, it was considered that the majority were in a position to pay, and should be pressed accordingly.

Under the heading General, two items only call for comment, the first being the efforts of your Committee to acquire a suitable ground for the purpose of constructing playing fields for both Sports Clubs. The need for such a ground requires no amplification, and although a suitable site was located in Braid Street-opposite the Drill Hall-negotiations with the Corporation for a lease at a nominal rental fell through owing to certain requirements regarding the deviation of an existing drain at your Association's expense. Other sites were investigated, but without success. Although the subject has been shelved temporarily, it is still hoped that a suitable piece of ground will be

located.

The other item referred to is the Annual Ball held on the 6th October, 1933, for which the Victoria Hall at the College was again selected. The Ball, as is now customary, was an unqualified success, due principally to the energetic efforts of Mr.

Dudley Shackelford, and a hard-working Ladies' Committee, in whose hands rested the responsibility of providing the supper.

The Matron, Miss Cooper, rendered invaluable assistance, and helped considerably to lessen the work usually imposed on a

Dance Committee. The Association's grateful thanks are due to Miss Cooper and the Ladies' Committee for their voluntary assistance.

The Annual Reunion was held on the 3rd December, 1932, and was attended by some 200 Old Boys. Luncheon in the

Victoria Hall at 1.30 p.m. was followed by Cricket matches on all four grounds in the afternoon.

After the luncheon, the photograph of E. W. Barns, Esq., late Headmaster, was formally handed over to the care of the present Headmaster by our President, and now hangs in the

Victoria Hall. At the same time was also handed over one of

three copies of the original proclamation of the Natal Government declaring the establishment of the Boys' High School in Maritzburg in 1863.

In conclusion, I desire to express my thanks to the

members of the Committee for their regular attendance at Meetings, and also to the Assistant Treasurer, Mr. Roy Foster, who has given generous assistance in the financial side, which, as you will observe, is yearly becoming more and more onerous. As an improvement to the present organisation I suggest that the dual post of Secretary and Treasurer be abolished, and that in future separate officials be elected for the two positions.
