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As the liberation of the struggling S.African majority becomes more certain the international

anti-apartheid movement has a major responsibility to intensify pressure on key strategic supporters of the apartheid regime. In Europe and America groups are highlighting S.Afric ais

large foreign debt and placing appropriate pressure on key Swiss, US. and British banks involved in debt rollover negotiations. Following the disinvestrnent of Mobil the international

campaign against the Shell oil company is set to intensify.

To parallel these strategies it is appropriate that in Australia we identify and campaign against

our own primary areas of support for apartheid. The $\mathtt{AAAM}(\mathtt{Vic.})$ has identified the linkage s

that exist between S.Africa and Australia's gold sectors as deserving of our urgent attention.

Gold sanctions and the targetting of this precious metal in other ways has always been a sensitive

issue for the international anti-apartheid movement. Concerns over feasability and possib le

effects on price have in the past negated any action. However with the establishment of the UN.

sponsored World Gold Commission in London strategies have been developed which point the way to effective political and economic action against the apartheid gold industry and it is

international supporters.

The AAAM(Vic.) has been active on a number of fronts in this area throughout 1989. From B.H.P3s gold prospect in S.Africa to Hugh Morgants chairing of the World Gold Council we have

resolved to publicise the issues. One significant charactaristic of apartheid,s gold indu stry

supporters is their natural desire to shun publicity. Our primary task into the $1990 \, \mathrm{ts}$ will be to

expose their collaboration to the Australian public.

HUGH MORGAN AND THE WORLD GOLD COUNCIL

THE WORLD GOLD COUNCIL NINETY-FWE PER CENT ofgold produced in South Africa is mined by just five corporations: Anglo American Corporation of South Africa Ltd. Gold Fields of South Africa Ltd General Mining Union Corp Ltd Barlow Rand Ltd Anglovaal Ltd All these groups are locked together in a maze ofincestuous cross directorships and shareholdings. These companies provide R3.5 billions a year in tax revenue to the apartheid regime and directly control most of the manufacturing and distribution industries of the country. They are the chiefinvestots in the financial sector. They own almost all the rest of the mining sector, including diamonds, uranium and platinum and the strategically important production of oil h'om coal. Any apparent manifestation of healthy competition between these companies is quickly evaporated on any examination of their labour recruiting methods. All tecmimtent is handled by an organisation jointly controlled by the mining companies whose function is to use its monopoly position to keep wages and conditions ofblack workers as much below the poverty level as possible. In addition, all gold is refined in South Afrim by the Rand Refinery, owned by the South African Chamber of Mines, which is in turn contmlled by the mining companies. Until 1987 the South African mining houses used a jointly owned and lavishly funded gold promotion organisation called the Intemational Gold Corporation Ltd (Intergold). The one thing this companywas not, was intemational. Although it had many luxurious branch offices in all the leading gold consuming centres of the world, its headquarters were injohannesburg. This company spent millious of dollars promoting the South African gold coin, the Krugerrand. This massive promotion budget proved to be a poor investment when, after an international public boycott, this particular symbol of apartheid ceased to be minted. Intergold found itselfin even more difficulties in 1986 when the black townships flared into open rebellion against repression. It became clear that ifIntergold did not do something very quickly it might itselfmuse gold to be closely associated (as it truly is) with apartheid. Intergold found a few mining companies outside South Africa to join it, then changed its name to the World Gold Council. APART FROM the change in name, the main diiTerence between lntergold and the World Gold Council was the closing of the Johannesburg headquarters. The Geneva office became the new headquartets but all the other offices and staiTremained the same. Although this company spends over fifty million dollars each year on various methods ofgetting as much gold sold as possible it is strangely bashful about letting anyone know who its members are. The membership was known only to the members. Many people have asked the company who its members are: Stockbrokers, specialist metal trade magan'nes, gold dealers, other mining companies. Some even get as far as being promised that they will get a membership list but in the end, the result is the same The World Gold Council will not disclose its list of members. A membership list of the Council was leaked to The World Gold Commission. The reluctance of the Council to publicise the names of its members is explained by this list. The Financial Times Mining Year Book lists 269 gold mining companies in fifty-seven western countries alone. It tums out that the World Gold Council membership is just 39 mining companies (five of which are not even mentioned in the Yearbook), fi'om only six countries. Thirteen members are South African companies or companies controlled by them. Nine other members are owned or controlled by just four corporations. Two other members mine gold only in joint association with another. In short, it is obvious that the reason the list is kept secret is because very few gold mines want to be in an organisation so dominated by South African interests. In subsequent documents leaked to the World Gold Commission even more evidence has come to light on the nature of the Council. Contribution to the budget of the council is levied on the members

according to the tonnage each member produces. The South African

members produce several times more gold than the rest of the membership put together. Control is said to be equally distributed in a way that companies from no single continent an dominate any other. At least two of the directors that are supposed to represent North America on the board of the Council, Mr R Agnew and Mr G Parker, are both directors of South African mining companies. The Council is quite obviously a front for South African mining interests.

This is simply because the organization is absolutely dominated by S.Africa and in particular by gold mining companies there that are closely linked to the evil system of apartheid. It is dominated by apartheid interests in terms of membership and budgetary contribution. The primary function of the World Gold Council is to promote the international use of and investment in apartheid gold not the gold of Western Mining.

And indeed the shareholders should understand that they and Western Mining can only benefit from the exclusion of S.African gold from the worlds markets and the isolation of S.Africa in the World Gold Council. They can benefit particularly in terms of gold price stability and even appreciation and therefore healthier dividends. And this process of isolation has already begun with the US. Congress in July imposing a gold sanction against S.Africa.

Yet despite this Western Mining chooses to remain as a member of the World Gold Council and worse we have in the managing director Mr.Morgan the chairperson of the World Gold Council.

Now there can be no job that an Australian could choose which better serves the evil . apartheid system in S.Afn'ca than to be chairperson of the World Gold Council. In press reports earlier this year Mr. Morgan you labelled the statements just made as insulting to α

Australian companies. Well two final points before I ask my question. For your information Mr. Morgan the United Nations has labelled apartheid a crime against humanity and to chair an organization which serves apartheid that is where the real insult

lies. Secondly you will not despite numerous and repeated requests reveal to anyone a lis t

of the membership of the World Gold Council. And you wonit do it because you know it would prove what Ilve said.

It is now appropriate that we make formal contact for the first time. The issue of your c hairing of

the World Gold Council has risen to some prominence. We do not feel it necessary to in an y way

enter into debate as to the dominance of apartheid interests in the Council. The continuing

secrecy of the membership list and your own admission of S.African funding (Sydney Mornin g

Herald 8/8/1989) are testament to this fact. However we feel it wise to correspond after hearing a

transcript of WMC's annual general meeting and after information passed on to us from Australian and overseas gold mining sources.

write to you following the recent release of an I.C.F.T.U. report on Australian companies operating in South Africa. As one of eight companies that have confirmed their prescence in the land of apartheid it is of grave concern to us that B.H.P. should publicly announce that their interests in that country "promise further developement" (Age). We are sure that a great many shareholders would be disturbed to know just how such further developement would in practice give invaluable economic aid to the racist apartheid regime of President Botha.

I acknowledge that B.H.P. claims to observe the voluntary code of conduct for Australian businesses operating in South Africa. However the strategic importance of your interests there to the Botha regime far outweigh the socio-political considerations of improved management opportunities for 511 and desegregated workplaces. Your 1984 acquisition of Utah Minerals International included significant gold prospecting interests in South Africa.(Utah Gold Prospecting. Eloff Gold Mining p/l. Eloff Mining Co.)

I do not believe it is necessary to outline in great detail the crucial nature of gold to the survival of apartheid. The gold industry accounts for upto 50 per cent of South Africa's foreign exchange earnings and approximately 25 per cent of the Botha regimes tax revenue intake. The generation of such revenue allows the regime to finance its occupation of Namibia, its war effort in Angola, and its general political and military destabilization of the frontline states. Further such revenue allows South Africa to purchase crude oil from abroad at well above normal market prices. This it is forced to do in response to a United Nations general assembly resolution forbidding the transport of crude oil by member states.

For B.H.P. to be pursuing the further developement of _ the South African gold industry is therefore to be actively involved in the . maintenance of apartheid. It is also appropriate to draw the B.H.P. boards attention to the inhuman labour conditions in South Africas gold mines. The workforce is expected to live in dickensian dormitories. There is even a ducted pipe system which allows the pumping of tear gas to if necessary force workers to the pit face. Are these conditions that any B.H.P. board member can justifiably ignore? . .000000002

Utah Internationals involvement with coal deposits

is of further strategic import to the Botha regime. South Africa is forced to engage in oil from coal conversion (Sasol plants) as a response to the crude oil embargo. To help in the further developement of the coal industry is thus aiding the drive towards a self sufficient crude oil status for the regime. Clearly this gives direct logistical support to the South African army and police who are very vulnerable to the intensifying international campaign to deny them petrol. (The International Shell campaign). I am at a loss to understand how the B.H.P. board could possibly justify such a strategic involvement in South Africa.

I do note that part of B.H.P.'s strategy for the

1990's involves going multisnational. There are obvious reasons of economic rationale for this move. Internationalization will reduce the companies vulnerability to the Australian/American dollar exchange rate. Certainly a diverse currency portfolio spreads exchange rate risks. However given the fall in the value of the Rand in recent years and its likely further demise I fail to see an argument along such lines to justify B.H.P;'s prescence in South Africa. '.

Indeed the A.A.A.M.(Vic.) can see no validity

whatsoever for the prescence of any Australian company in South Africa. I am therefore appealing to you and the board of B.H.P. to make the morally sound and wise decision to withdraw totally the companies interests in South Africa. The board has an excellent opportunity to do this following the need to embark on major asset sales as a result of the recent deal to reduce the Bell stake in B.H.P.

I would like to finish by quoting your chairman Sir James Balderstone. Following last weeks extraordinary meeting of shareholders permission was gained to cancel shares representing 19 per cent of B.H.P.'s capital. Sir James said " shareholders will have a larger interest in B.H.P.'s underlying assets and profits." I am certain that such an interest would extend to grave concern at the terrible image to a company that the giving of strategic support to apartheid obviously brings. I therefore appeal once again to you and the board to preserve the corporate image of B.H.P. by urgently considering our request. I look forward to the positive response of the board.

- I believe that if I clear up some of the misapprehensions in your letter of lst August, the Australian Anti-Apartheid Movement (Victoria) will have less cause for concern.
- 1. The release of the ICFTU report should have caused no surprise. As you know, the Australian Government has been in the forefront of international efforts to arrive at a resolution of the South Africa situation. BHP worked with its "Bannerman lnquiry" which reported last year on the code of conduct for Australian companies. We provided full information about the extent of BHP's involvement in South Africa and since then have observed the spirit and letter of the Report's guidelines.
- 2. The words in the "Age" to which you refer were a reporter's liberty (you will note the words were not in quotes and were not attributed). It is not accurate to say our interests in South Africa "promise further develOpment".
- 3. We have no plans to develop the coal deposit in which we inherited our interest on the acquisition of Utah.
- 4. The gold prospect in which we have a 30% interest has not yet been proved so there are no plans for development at the present time.
- 5. I think you will agree, then, that the rest of the concerns in your letter (converting coal to oil, risks in the value of the Rand, etc.) are premature. \cdot

BHP in its activities takes into account prevailing majority attitudes. particularly those formalised by the elected representatives of our country. I do not anticipate any changes in that policy. If for any reason we had cause to reconsider our situation in South Africa, we would do so in the light of all the circumstances then prevailing.

The phenomenon of a "reporters liberty" is something we fully appreciate. I therefore accept that there are no plans at present to develop BHP's mineral interests in S.Africa. However there are some very real concerns that we still feel with regards to BHP's potential and actual strategic support of apartheid. You should be aware that the regime's senior economists are very concerned with S.Africa's low level of gold reserves. Currently they stand at an equivalent of only two months import cover. Should BHP be part of a group who decide to develop or sell for developement a proven gold prospect in S.Africa then the company will be seen to

As regards actual strategic support I now raise the issue of BHP Gold's continued membership of the World Gold Council. The formation of this organization has been clearly designed to forestall any move towards a boycott of S.African gold. Its further aim is to allow S.Africa to break out of its international isolation. Various items of evidence in the hands of respected international economists and United Nations advisers now prove beyond any doubt that the Council is S.African dominated.

advance directly the strategic interests of the racist Botha regime. I need not remind you that this will involve highly adverse publicity

The simple truth is that continued membership of the World Gold Council now involves a direct benefit to those responsible for perpetrating the evil system of apartheid. It is not an exageration to say that the long term interests of BHP as a gold producer involve a sound working relationship with the inevitable post-apartheid govt. of S.Africa. Thus I would suggest that continued membership is not in the companies best interest.

Recent studies now show that there are very real mechanisms in existence for an assault on S.African gold sales. Indeed such an assault could lead to tangible benefits for Australian gold producers. concern that I make contact with you regarding BHP-Utah's involvement in S.Africa together with your continued membership of the World Gold Council. Our sources within S.Africa have informed us that BHP-Utah is involved with one of the five notorious gold corporations there, namely Anglovaal Ltd. Further you are prospecting in an area which has large

potential for developement (the Bothaville Gap).

South Africa's racist regime is

desperate for a 1990's expansion of their gold mining industry. They are hoping to tie this expansion in with reduced production elsewhere in the world and thus generate incrused foreign exchange earnings and tax revenue thereby hoping to alleviate international sanctions. Furthermore the involvement of foreign corporations in prospecting and mining reduces S.Africa's need to generate local financing for such operations. We thus have a situation where BHP-Utah is giving direct logistical support to an industry responsible more than any other for the maintenance of apartheid. I cannot believe that the board

of BHP lacks both ethical concern or a regard for healthy public relations not just in Australia but indeed worldwide. Logically and rationally BHP-Utah's involvement in S.Africa is morally repugnant. Once again I appeal . to the board to withdraw the company's involvement in the land of apartheid. The spectacular \$2.7 billion buyback of BHP shares last year has transformed the company to the verge of becoming one of the world's greatest resource corporations. This has also necessitated a degree of selloff in which surely BHP-Utah's S.African involvement could be painlessly included.

For whatever reason the board may

ignore our eminently reasonable request. In which case the AAAM(Vic.) cannot any longer take no action. Late last year we met with the ACTU and discussed a strategy of BB? share selloffs by trade unions should the company's support for apartheid be serious and sustained. We would expect to begin making renewed overtures in the near future. There is a growing ethical investment advice industry throughout the world including here in Australia. Again we are prepared to make imminent contact with Australian and overseas services with a view to placing BHP on their blacklists. We must also warn that the

international anti-apartheid movement has decided to target the World Gold Council in it's work. Any rational investigation of the Council IIOOIZ

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reveals it for what it is, a front for S.African mining interests. The exclusivity and secrecy of the Council is understandable given the domination by S.African interests. There must unfortunately be a suspicion that BHP's membership of the Council and gold prospecting in S.Africa are evidence of a degree of sympathy for the minority racist regime.

In your correspondence of 11th

August 1988 you stated that "BHP in its activities takes into account prevailing majority attitudes." If this be the case why is the company ignoring the wishes of the majority of the suffering people inside S.-Africa? Their credible representatives such as Bishop Tutu, the Rev. Allan Boesak, Oliver Tambo and leading trade unionists all plead for international corporations to withdraw. This request is nowhere more strategically important than in the infamous gold industry.

I would like to finally appeal

to your own personal vision and integrity. From a leadership point of view your work with BHP in the last 18 months has been noteworthy. Australia's largest company has acquired a degree of success which is unparalleled. It would in my view be needlessly unfortunate for that success to be sullied by an involvement in maintaining apartheid. Australia's most prestigous company deserves an ethical decision. I remain,

The report. compiled by Foreign Affairs official. Mr Bannerman. purported to show all Australian busines interest 1n the republic. But despite its omission from the report Phoenix Mining turned up in BHP's financial statement. It was reported that Phoenix Mining contributed \$121,000 towards BHP's consolidated profits during the financial year The company contributed \$944,000 in 1988. Victorian Democrat Senator. Ms Powell. asked the Minister for Foreign Affairs, Senator Evans, why BHPts principle corporate solicitor did not include Phoenix Mining. Senator Button, representing Senator Evans. said the Government would instruct the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade to write to 81-1? seeking an explanation for the omission. "The code of conduct for Australian companies with interests in the Republic of South Africa operates on a confidential basis, " he said. "In spite of this the BB? group has consented to being named and having its interests in South Africa particularised." A spokesman for BHP was unable to shed light on the activities of Phoenix Mining. but suggested it was a holding company for BHP's divested South African interests. A major shipment of South African gold was melted down and recast in Western Australia with Perth Mint markings last year contravening accepted gold- -refining practice.

It also violated the spirit of the Australian Gov ernment s policy on trade with South Africa which bans the import of South Africais Krugerrand coins. Gold industry sources said the cargo of 100 40002 bars, worth about \$20 million at the time had been melted down and recast into 40002 bars bearing the Perth Mint stamp and shipped overseas. A spokesman for Gold Corporation, which manages the Mint, has confirmed that the shipment in September bore Rand Refinery Ltd stamps and had been imported from Switzerland.

' The reprocessing of the South African gold shipment could bring the Perth Mint into conflict with the London Bullion Market Association which sets strict requirements for acceptance of gold bars in world markets.

The Perth Mint has applied for accreditation for its new refineries in Western Australia and is anxious to maintain its good standing in the world bullion markets.

Gold burs refined In South Africa the world s largest gold- producer, are not accepted in most Western countries and many Third World nations which impose trade sanctions or restrictions on business dealings with South Africa.

The reprocessing of South African gold is a widespread but surreptitious practice in the world refining industry: It is not illegal In some countries but it is actively discouraged by the London Bullion Market Association, which regulates the reining of gold to maintain integrity and credibility in the gold markets.

The practice actually breaches the _world-wide standard which Specil'Ies that the bullion with an approved relinery marking must be refined and assayed at that refinery.

The rule prohibits the reprocessing and restamping ofrefined g.old Gold Corp has recgently built a new gold refinery at Kalgoorlie and is building another near the Perth _.Airport These new facilities will require accreditation from the London Bullion Market Association to allow the bars to be accepted by major buyers.

The Perth Mint's aim is to seek accreditation to produce '9999i bars, the top standard in bullion markets and accepted by buyers world-wide.
Gold Corp management has been acutely sensitive about the shipment, partly due to the former association of Gold Corpis management with the South

. African gold industry.

Gold Corpis upper management is largely South African, including the chief executive, Mr Don Mackay-Coghill. and Mr Brian Bath, who is charge ofthe Mint and refinery redevelopments.

The West Australian Government recruited members of the former Intergold team, which ran the successful Krugerrand gold coin programme for South Africa, to launch the Australian Nugget coin programme.

Soon after the South African shipment arrived at the Mint last year it was reported that the management put up posters warning of big fines or prison terms for employees who disclosed information about the Mints transactions.

The Corporation 5 spokesman, Mr Ron Barry, said there was no documented evidence that the bars were imported to the Mint but managers recalled that the shipment was needed to meet short-term demand on the local market.

"Late last year there was a shortage to meet the needs of the dealers," Mr Barry said. I $_$.

tiWe bought some in from Swnzerland : and when the bars turned up they were - South African bars. . .

"We did not know we were getting South African bars itil they came through the doors here."

Mr Barry said all the gold was intended for sale locally but he refused to rule out that some may have been exported.

He said that the gold could have been sitting in the suppliers vaults for years x and in fact bore date stamps from the late '19605 and early 19705.

The management had _been sensitive about the import partly because they were South African and partly because the corporation had been gearing up to apply for a banking licence to become the Gold Bank ofAustralia.

We have received your undated letter which is presumably based on the erroneous article published in The Australian Financial Review. A copy of our letter to the editor of that newspaper is enclosed for your information. The Perth Mint is the major refiner of gold in Australia and the major supplier of gold bullion to the Australian market. It is rare indeed for us to have to import gold, in fact, no senior staff member can recall an occasion prior to the importation last year, when The Perth Mint previously imported gold. While Australian production continues at its current high levels, we are unlikely to

Last year's importation arose because we were temporarily unable to meet demand from Australian dealers for Perth Mint bars. Consequently, we placed an order for gold with a Swiss bank which is a member of the London Bullion Market Association. You mention in your letter that you are in touch with the LENA, consequently, I am surprised that you are not aware that the Association's rules (p14) state that "a buyer may not stipulate any particular brand when taking delivery". In other words, when you buy gold you have to take what you are given. A copy of the relevant section of the rules is enclosed for your information. We had no knowledge that we were receiving gold refined in South Africa until it had been freighted to us.

The markings on the bars we received indicated they were manufactured in the early 19708. This is consistent with the durability of gold which results in bars remaining in circulation for many years, during which time a bar might have many different owners. For example, bars refined at the branch of the Royal Mint in Melbourne, which closed in the 19605, are still acceptable on the world market. The owner of the bars we bought was a Swiss bank.

Contrary to the assertion in the article in the "Financial Review", the melting and recasting of the bars we bought was contrary to neither the rules nor practice of the LBMA. It is against the rules to restamp bars without checking weight and assay and every bar that has left The Perth Mint in the past 90 years with The Perth Mint stamp affixed has been assayed and weighed. We recast the bars to get sizes to meet market demand and because of the Australian market's preference for bars whose weight and purity are guaranteed by The Perth Mint.

In light of the above, you will not be surprised we resent

In light of the above, you will not be surprised we resent your suggestion that "it is extremely unfortunate that Gold Corporation should choose to support apartheid by contravening the spirit of Australian government policy towards South Africa". Apart from our gold refining business, Gold Corporation manufactures and markets internationally the Australian Nugget series of gold coins by agreement with the Australian Government. We are hardly likely to do anything that would put that agreement at risk. The Corporation's owner is the Western Australian Government which is on record as endorsing the current national policy towards South Africa. In addition, we were able to break into the international gold coin market only because of the international trade sanctions imposed on the Krugerrand as an anti-apartheid measure. It should be apparent from the foregoing that we have a vested interest in the maintenance of antiapartheid policies and in respecting the policies of the National and State governments. Unfortunately, we cannot control the rules and actions of the LBMA and its members. If we can provide further information or other assistance, or there are matters arising from this reply which you wish to clarify, please do not hesitate to contact me. urs sincerely

I have received your letter of August 2 in which you raise a number of new issues.

Firstly, the Australian Koala platinum coin which we began producing last year, has not contained one ounce of South African platinum. The agreement with the Commonwealth under which the coins are produced requires that we do not use any platinum that could reasonably be expected to have come from South Africa. The Japanese manufacturer of the blank coins we have used so far is aware of this requirement and has provided documentary evidence that the platinum he has supplied has been of Soviet origin. By early next year we expect to have the facilities available to produce our own blank coins, providing absolute control over metal source.

"The Australian Financial Review" report of threats of dismissal and prison sentences made against Gold Corporation employees was, to say the least, colourful. The matter arose because an employee (in ignorance) invited a non-employee into an area where access was available to confidential client records, and, as far as we are aware, innocently, revealed some details of a particular transaction. Clearly any financial institution must be concerned about such an occurrence, especially a financial institution which (as we were at that time, though are no longer) aims to achieve bank status. The Gold Banking Corporation Act under which we are established prohibits such disclosure and provides substantial penalties. A copy of the relevant section of the Act is enclosed for your information. As a result of the incident, one of the union shop stewards working here said he believed there was an insufficient awareness of these matters among staff members and requested that information be circulated. A copy of the resulting circular is enclosed for your information. I did not deal with this matter in my last letter because you had not raised it.

I do not entirely agree with your assessment of the World Gold Council and its role given that South Africa's share of western gold production has declined every year since 1980, dropping from 70% in that year to 40% in 1988 while Australia's share has risen in the same period from 1.7% to 10%, but, in any event, as a Western Australian Government body, Gold Corporation is and will continue to be subject to State Government policy and is not a nongovernment body that has the opportunity to lobby the government.

If there are other matters you wish to raise with me, please do not hesitate to do so. As you might expect of someone with my background, I am rather more sensitive about the sorts of issues that concern you than most people in Australia and therefore more anxious than most to ensure not only that this organisation is not engaged in trading with South Africa because of the repercussions that attracts, but also to ensure that any misconceptions that arise, such as those in "The Financial Review" article are dealt with.
