The Africa Prize annually honors a distinguished African who has exhibited exceptional leadership in bringing about the sustainable end of hunger at the national, regional or continent-wide level.



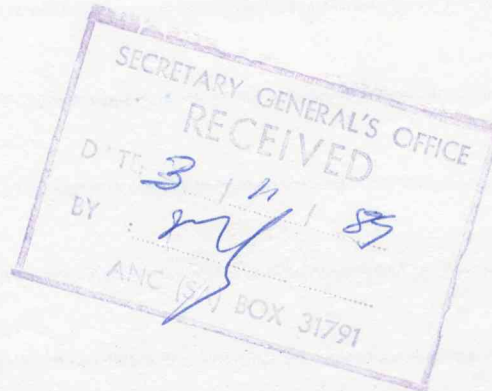

I trust that my belated correspondence will find you in good health and spirit. I write to thank you sincerely on behalf of the ANC, the Makatini family and our struggling people and indeed on my own behalf for the moving

condolence message you telexed us occasioned by the tragic death of our brother and colleague, Comrade Johnny Makatini.

Indeed you, Sonny, more than many others, would have a more precise idea of the extent of this loss to the ANC and our people, to Africa and to all those in the world who had come to value the rich and enriching qualities of Johnny as a normal, natural and essential part of many important deliberations.

Over the years and especially in the time of the Eminent Persons' Group I came to know of countless discussions and consultations between yourself and Johnny and the spirit of mutual interdependence at countless Commonwealth sessions, where you piloted us through turbulent waters of the other side's machinations.

But today our struggle continues with ever more urgent demands for greater mobilization of the hearts and minds of all. Even as we learn the tough task of not counting on the late Johnny's informed judgement and

made through the muddy bog that is the deliberate creation of apartheid. The ruination of the apartheid regime in its desperate efforts to cut a new and acceptable image for itself. That is the trademark of Pretoria with more intelligent action. This becomes especially crucial

in this year as we proceed on the difficult path towards independence for Namibia - a country and people who even at this hour of hope have not been spared the vicious and atrocious behaviour of South African police and military elements. The world has been once again reminded of the acute urgency of pooling efforts to rid us all of that veritable outpost of tyranny and destabilisation, the apartheid system.
