THE CHANCELLOR

"Chancellor" is an office that goes back to antiquity: the original Chancellor or cancellarius (as the office was known) regulated access to the Roman Tribune. In medieval times, the office became associated with the heads of the writing departments of the early kings. Because so few people were literate, a chancellor was necessarily learned. This is why the heads and spokepersons of the early universities were also accorded the title. More recently, the office has become largely symbolic. The executive head of a university is its vice-chancellor.

Justice Pius Langa is the sixth Chancellor of the University of Natal. His predecessors are: The Honourable D G Shepstone (1949-1966), Dr G G Campbell (1967-1973), Dr B A Armitage (1973-1983), the Honourable R N Leon QC (1983-1992), and Archbishop D E Hurley (1993-1998).

THE MACE

The Chancellor's Mace is used on ceremonial occasions presided over by the Chancellor and is regarded as the Chancellor's "staff of office". It symbolises the University's protection of its Chancellor.

The use of the mace as a symbol of authority has a long history. The head of a copper mace, which apparently dates back to the 12th Century before Christ, has been excavated at Beyce Sultan in Asia. In the early centuries, churchmen who went to war often carried a mace in preference to a sword. One side of the mace-head was beautifully decorated with the owner's emblem and on the other side was a large knob which served as a weapon, but was always round as a reminder of church law forbidding the shedding of blood. In the early centuries the mace was a symbol of the king's authority. During the power struggle between the king and the Commons in the 13th Century, the king gave the speaker the mace as a symbol of his indemnity against arrest.

The Mace was designed by Mr G H Atkins, senior lecturer in sculpture in the University's Department of Fine Arts. The Mace was made in England, it was first used at the 1970 graduation ceremonies.

THE ARMORIAL BEARINGS (see front cover)

The armorial bearings of the University of Natal were awarded by the College of Arms in London.

The two black wildebeest come from the arms of the Province of KwaZulu-Natal. They are shown in full course to symbolise movement and progress. The two open books represent the universal heritage of knowledge and the two centres of the University, Durban and Pietermaritzburg. The five pointed star refers to the naming of Natal by Portuguese navigators when they landed for the first time at Durban on Christmas Day in 1497. Stella Aurorae (star of the dawn) symbolises the role of the University in bringing to light new knowledge and spreading the enlightening influence of education.

ACADEMIC DRESS

The wearing of gowns by judges, ministers, teachers and scholars is an ancient and significant custom. When the graduating students at universities receive their diplomas or degrees, they, too (and for some, only once in their lives) wear the caps and gowns and so participate in this long tradition. By wearing the ancient regalia, they join hands with students past and students present.

In modern academic ceremonies the standard cap and gown are almost universally worn. Of all the components of the costume, the hood conveys the greatest amount of information: it makes clear the level of the degree, the faculty in which it was given, and the institution which awarded it.

CONVOCATION

After being capped by the Chancellor, each graduate moves across the stage and hands the hood to the President of Convocation (or representative). The President places the hood upon the graduate's shoulders. At the end of the ceremony, after the Chancellor's procession has left the stage, the President leads a procession of the new graduates out of the hall, row by row, to symbolise their acceptance into, and future membership of, the Convocation of the University of Natal, the statutory body through which graduates have the opportunity to play a continuing role in the affairs of the University.



FELLOW OF THE UNIVERSITY OF NATAL JEFFERSON JOHN GUY

Professor Jeff Guy obtained a BA Honours (History) from the University of Natal in 1966 and a PhD from the University of London in 1975. His academic career began as a lecturer in History on the Roma Campus of the University of Botswana, Lesotho and Swaziland. He joined the University of Natal in 1992 and is presently Professor of History. He has held visiting fellowships at the Universities of Manchester and Oxford, and delivered lectures at universities and research centres in Southern Africa, the United Kingdom, Scandinavia and the USA.

As a historian, Professor Guy is internationally recognized, and considered a world authority on the 19th century history of Natal and Zululand. According to one of his referees: "Shula Marks and Jeff Guy are unquestionably the leading historians of KwaZulu-Natal, and would be recognised as such – I believe – by virtually anyone in the field of Southern African history. And given the eminence of Professor Marks (CBE, Fellow of the British Academy, a string of honorary doctorates and awards, etc) this is a remarkable yardstick". Another states: "Professor Guy is undoubtedly a scholar of international standing and influence whose work has influenced scholarly debate across the entire spectrum of African studies. He is also someone passionately devoted to rigorous scholarship. As a result, anything of his that one reads is deeply researched while also being meticulously and carefully argued. He cares deeply about the scholarship he does and the result is a series of books and articles which will stand the test of time and will be read with pleasure by generations of scholars to come".

In an assessment of his contribution to education in South Africa, a referee states: "Over the years he has been a remarkable inspiration to many schoolteachers who have learned from him that history is as much about transforming the ideas of young people about the present as it is about understanding events in the past. He has always been ready to give time and energy to the defence of history in the schools — whether that was within the context of the struggle for history under apartheid or in the complex context of Curriculum 2005 and OBE".

The University of Natal is fortunate to possess in Professor Guy an historian of genuine distinction and international recognition, one who continues to serve in the forefront as an innovative teacher, and a member of the scholarly community utterly dedicated to his discipline and craft.



FELLOW OF THE UNIVERSITY OF NATAL JOHAN UYS JACOBS

Professor Johan Jacobs has served the University with distinction both as a teacher and a researcher. After completing a BA Honours (English) degree through the University of South Africa, he obtained his M Phil (cum laude) and PhD from Columbia University, New York. He joined the University of Natal in 1975 as a lecturer in English. He presently occupies the position of Head of the School of Graduate Studies in the Faculty of Human Sciences. Under his direction the research ethos in the Faculty has been significantly enhanced, resulting in the establishment of a supportive structure for postgraduate students and an increase in the publication output of staff.

Professor Jacobs has been invited as a visiting professor at several universities in Europe, including the Universities of Turin, Macerata and Venice in Italy.

In assessing him as a researcher, a highly respected scholar states: "Jacobs has built an international reputation as a leading critic of contemporary South African fiction. As postcolonial debates – usually emanating from Northern institutions – threatened to intrude upon the colonies, or ex-colonies (including South Africa) as yet another import rhetoric, Jacobs proved to be one of the authors capable of originality of response. Without simple 'reaction' against the West, he re-adjusted the categories, the North and the South, to permit local literature its own context of significance while suggesting to readers abroad that voices from this country had accents to share with a wider, post-apartheid world."

According to one of his referees: "Professor Jacobs' curriculum vitae and analysis of research highlight the considerable extent to which his work has found a substantial and wide-ranging international audience. His work is both prolific and pioneering. He has formed close and productive ties with several overseas scholars and institutions and these have fed into the intellectual life at his own university. Durban is indeed most fortunate to have someone as energetic and committed in developing such communities of scholars whose interests are so profoundly relevant to living in South Africa in the twenty-first century: issues concerning place, region and identity in postcolonial worlds". Another states: "Undoubtedly one of the most impressive aspects of Professor Jacobs' career has been his ability to combine a deep commitment to the life of the university (relevant and innovative teaching, supervision and examination of postgraduates, sterling service on committees, administration, etc, etc) with a remarkable breadth of interest, both academic and cultural in the widest sense".

The University of Natal is, indeed, most fortunate to have on its staff such a distinguished scholar.



CONFERMENT OF THE DEGREE OF DOCTOR OF LAWS honoris causa upon ABDURRAZACK (ZACKIE) ACHMAT

Growing up in poverty in the Cape Flats, when the norm was to join gangs and do drugs, Abdurrazack (Zackie) Achmat chose to tread a different path – a path of truth and justice and one to which he has remained unwaveringly and consistently dedicated and committed nearly three decades later. In 1976, aged 14 years and in Standard 7, he chose to take his first public political stand against the apartheid state. The immediate cost was an interrupted education and, over the next 5 years many hours of detention, imprisonment and torture. He built a series of NGOs in the 80s providing educational support to disadvantaged youth and skills training for school leavers. For most of the eighties Zackie lived underground and it is during this period that he revealed a flair for strategising and tactical application, as well as political education.

In 1992, Zackie was awarded his BA Honours degree in English Literature *cum laude* from the University of Western Cape. He is the recipient of fellowships from the Ford Foundation, Mellon Foundation and most recently the Desmond Tutu Fellowship. Zackie has developed a reputation for undertaking high quality research in both legal and social matters, leading to an evidence-based approach to his activism. He has contributed to, amongst others, the development of the HIV/AIDS Employment Code of Conduct, the Prisons and Medical Ethics Policy, and Trade Barriers to access to essential HIV/AIDS drugs. He has convened conferences on "AIDS, Human Rights and Law" and "Sexual Orientation: Equality and Justice" and is a contributing editor of the AIDS Law Manual.

Zackie Achmat has played a key and critical role in expanding democratic participation, widening frontiers of public knowledge and challenging conceptions of public morality. He has in the past three decades been relentlessly involved in organisations and social movements that oppose state and societal oppression, prejudice and elitism. He is the principal visionary strategist and mobilising agent in bringing key cases to the Constitutional Court. These cases are already included in law school curricula throughout South Africa and the many landmark cases that he has won serve as important case precedents in the future.

More recently, under Zackie's leadership the Treatment Action Campaign (TAC) has demonstrated to South Africans and the international community that the Constitution can, and must be used as an instrument for furthering democratic rights and social justice. He has been the single most important visionary in refining methods for building civil society to occupy the space created by the constitutional state in 1994. The approach is one of persistent lobbying and legal action, combined with mass education and mobilisation. In its short history, TAC has notched up some real achievements: its critical role as a friend of the court in the Medicines Act case against big Pharma, the flucanozole campaign and subsequent drastic price reductions, the public campaign and constitutional court victory to prevent mother to child transmission of HIV and placing treatment on the national and international agenda.







A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE UNIVERSITY OF NATAL

Early Days

Natal University College - the forerunner of the University of Natal - opened its doors in Pietermaritzburg in 1910 with eight professors and 57 students. Lectures in Classics, English and Philosophy, Law, Modern Languages, Botany and Geology, Chemistry and Physics, Mathematics and Zoology were held at various venues throughout the city, including Maritzburg College, the Natal Museum building and the City Hall.

In August 1912, Old Main Building (built on 16 hectares of land donated by the Pietermaritzburg Corporation) was opened and the core of the present-day Pietermaritzburg campus was established.

In 1923, NUC extended its tuition to Durban with university-level courses in Commerce and Engineering being offered at the Technical College. In 1928, NUC took over full responsibility for university classes in Durban. A generous donation by Mr T B Davis, whose son, Howard Davis, had been killed during the battle of the Somme in World War I, facilitated the building of Howard College on 20 hectares of land on the Berea, which formed the core of a separate campus in Durban. Howard College was formally opened in 1931.

Largely through the efforts of Fabian Socialist Dr Mabel Palmer, separate classes for 19 black education students at NUC were introduced in Durban in 1936. This number grew to nearly 900 by 1960. However, as in the case of the University's Medical School, founded for black students in 1951, classes still reflected the segregated nature of South Africa under apartheid.

Multi campus system

In 1953, the administrative control of the University was moved from Pietermaritzburg to Durban. In response to mounting travelling costs, the two centres were academically separated in 1973. Recent restructuring has occasioned the re-merging of some faculties, with the establishment of university-wide single faculties of Engineering, Education and Law. At both centres, departments have been replaced by multi-disciplinary schools of cognate disciplines. With the incorporation of Edgewood College of Education in 2001, the University acquired another campus in Pinetown, while the Medical School, which was renamed The Nelson R. Mandela School of Medicine in 2000, constitutes a fourth campus.

Leadership

The University of Natal is fortunate to boast among its past vice-chancellors and principals some exceptional leaders. Its first principal, Professor John Bews (1930-38), was a world-renowned botanist, while Dr E G Malherbe (1945-65) was known internationally as an educationalist. They were followed by Professor Owen Horwood (1966-70), Professor Francis Stock (1970-77), Professor N D Clarence (1977-84), Professor Piet de V Booysen (1984-91) and Professor James Leatt (1991-93). South Africa's first female Vice-Chancellor, Brenda Gourley, served the University of Natal from 1993 to 2001. The present incumbent, Professor Malegapuru Makgoba, is an internationally-recognised Molecular Immunologist and a graduate of the University of Natal's Medical School. Chancellors have also been distinguished figures, not least the present Chancellor, Justice Pius Langa, and the recently-retired Archbishop Denis Hurley.

The Struggle for Autonomy

A government ruling that the Medical School should be closed to white undergraduates was the first major inroad into the University's freedom to determine its own admissions criteria. In 1957, this was threatened further by a Bill that provided for the removal of the Medical School from the University's control, and the exclusion of 'non-white' students from the University's other Faculties. Academic staff at the Medical School resolved to resolved to remove if the Bill was enacted. As a result, the government withdrew the proposal to remove the Medical School from the University's control.

The government's Extension of University Act of 1959 limited new enrolments, other than those at Medical School, to whites only and thwarted the University's aspirations to serve the educational needs of broader society. Although NUC was granted full university status in 1949, it was not until 1983, when the University circumvented the government's racial admission "quotas" by an appeal to the High Court, that the University could attempt to meet its responsibility to serve the educational needs of the broader community.

The University today

Today, the University of Natal has approximately 27 500 students who represent all sectors of South African society.

The University is known as a centre of excellence in Africa, is one of South Africa's top research institutions, and has links with hundreds of international institutions. The University has led the way in the establishment of a number of multi-disciplinary innovations such as the Centre for Ethics, the Leadership Centre, a School of Maritime Studies, the Centre for Entrepreneurship and the Centre for Civil Society.

The University is also committed to community-based education and service learning. In keeping with its mission to be a socially-responsive institution, significant research is being conducted in many sectors of the University into issues such as HIV/AIDS.

The University has, over the course of time, built an impressive reputation as an institution of high academic standing. It has shown itself over time to be capable of adapting to a changing context and responding to the needs of the region. It is a mission that the University intends to fulfil with even greater efficacy as it engages with the opportunities presented by the intended merger with the University of Durban-Westville.
