BACKGROUND AND INTRODUCTION



Under apartheid the majority of South African were written out of history. The story of their past was distorted and ignored. They were marginalised culturally.

Now, as South Africa stands on the threshold of democracy, the time has come to recover the rich historical and cultural heritage of all South Africans. Indeed, this endeavour is crucial to the whole process of change and reconstruction.

The University of the Western Cape has therefore established on campus the Mayibuye Centre for History and Culture in South Africa to provide a physical resource for the acquisition, research, production, publication and distribution of material relating to the history of apartheid and resistance to it.

Mayibuye is a popular slogan meaning "Let it return," and it sums up succintly the purpose of the Centre.

The multi-purpose Centre includes among its different components an archive on the liberation struggle in South Africa and photographic, film-video, publishing and audio (or oral history) units. A museum recalling the apartheid era, as well as spaces for art exhibitions, films, music, theatre and other cultural activities are also being developed.

The Mayibuye Centre aims to be a "living" community oriented resource, serving not only the university but also the broader community and a future democratic South Africa. It has embarked on an extensive programme of activities, including conferences, workshops and exhibitions. These generally involve community groups and often have an education and training focus. International visitors have included the Kenyan writer Ngugi wa Thiong'o, Archbishop Trevor Huddleston, Enuga Reddy, ex director of the UN Centre Against Apartheid, and scholars from a number of countries.

In the short time of its existence, the Centre has acquired a unique body of historical material and has generated considerable publicity and interest, both at home and abroad. Through the Mayibuye Centre the University of the Western Cape is demonstrating its commitment to excellence and its faith in the future of a democratic South Africa.



ARCHIVAL PAPERS

The Mayibuye Centre is setting up an archive of the liberation struggle in South Africa. Numerous individuals and organisations have donated material.

The list of acquisitions includes official papers from the African National Congress, the United Democratic Front, the Irish Anti-Apartheid Movement, the South African Non-Racial Olympic Committee, the United Womens Congress, the Western Province Football and Cricket Boards, the Workers Party and the South African Communist Party and the Grassroots newspaper.

The Mayibuye Centre has also acquired a collection of artifacts, clothing, minute books, political education material and correspondence from Robben Island political prisoners. This includes 8 000 pages of correspondence belonging to Ahmed Kathrada, one of the Rivonia trialists incarcerated for 25 years together with Nelson Mandela.

The London-based International Defence and Aid Fund for Southern Africa (IDAF) donated 800 boxes of newspaper clippings, periodicals and documents from its research department viewable on microfiche, as well as all the equipment and material in its photographic, audio-visual and publications departments (see below for more details). IDAF was a nerve centre of the International Anti-Apartheid Movement. At present this unique material forms the core of the Mayibuye Centre's resources.

The Centre has received personal papers belonging to political figures such as Dr Yusuf Dadoo, Govan Mbeki, Barney Desai, Peter Hain, Wolfie Kodesh, Harold Wolpe, Lionel and Sadie Forman, Ray Alexander, Jack Simons, Kader Asmal, Brian Bunting, W.A. Andrews, M.D. Naidoo, Albie Sachs and Archbishop Desmond Tutu. It has runs of more than 40 newspapers and journals, including Umsebenzi, the Guardian, New Age, Sechaba, African Communist and the alternative newspapers of the 1980s. Other miscellaneous material includes the front page of the World newspaper that was due to appear on the day it was banned in October 1977; court records relating to so-called terrorism and "public violence" trials; and the hand drawn copy of the Freedom Charter presented to Archbishop Trevor Huddleston at the time of the historic Congress of the People when he became the first recipient of the ANC's Isitwalandwe award, together with Chief Lutuli and Dr Dadoo.










PUBLISHING






As part of its plans to make accessible relevant material (most of it previously banned, censored or unknown) the Mayibuye Centre will be publishing through its publishing unit, Mayibuye Books, three series of publications:

- The Mayibuye History and Literature Series: full length books, often produced in tandem with other democratic publishing outlets.
- The Mayibuye Library: shorter length books and booklets, designed to popularise history and provide it at low cost to communities for use in literacy training and general education.
- The Mayibuye Centre Occasional Papers consisting of policy documents, addresses, conference reports and other relevant articles.

In 1991 the Centre published the first five books in the Mayibuye History and Literature Series and the first two Mayibuye Library Series booklets. Several new titles are planned for 1992. The Centre is also re-issuing under its own publishing imprint a selection of titles received from IDAF and their associated company Kliptown Books. Not freely available in South Africa until now, these books form an important part of a struggle and exile generated intellectual tradition in South Africa. They include classics such as Jack and Ray Simon's Class and Colour in South Africa 1850-1950 and Govan Mbeki's South Africa: The Peasants Revolt. Several photographic books originally drawn from the Centre's photographic archive are also being re-issued.









FILM AND VIDEO LIBRARY



The Mayibuye Centre offers among its several resources a unique film-video library and archive of 1000 documentary productions; several hundred hours of news footage; stock footage from more than 200 film and video production projects; and a comprehensive shot list to facilitate access. It also includes recording, viewing and dubbing equipment appropriate to all the video formats.

The collection formed an important part of the IDAF operation in London where it grew in response to the needs of international solidarity with the struggle against apartheid. It became a valuable research resource and many of the productions were networked internationally to raise awareness about the situation in South Africa.

Most of the films and videos in this comprehensive collection have not been seen in South Africa before and the Centre is opening its library to all those interested in film and video production whether engaged in community work or in more widely based projects: whether as students or professionals; historians or journalists; critics or film-makers. Research is facilitated by detailed shotlists and a computerised data base. A full film-video catalogue is available. Enquiries are welcomed.

At the core of the library are films and videos produced by IDAF, sometimes in cooperation with other producers. Other components are:

- Videos on the Front Line States including the struggle for Zimbabwe independence; the liberation war in Mocambique; Angola and the post independence struggles against South Africa and its surrogates; the struggle for independence in Namibia.
- Feature films on South Africa viewable on video.
- "Anti-fascist" documentaries and feature film's (viewable on video).
- Non-Southern African documentaries. Subjects include Vietnam, US civil rights, Nicaragua, international culture.
- News programmes: SABC TV, BBC, ITV and Dutch T.V.
- IDAF production rushes including interviews with leaders of ANC, SACP, SACTU, COSATU, UDF etc; footage of solidarity events including major demonstrations, rallies and meetings; footage of the successive visits to London of Mandela; footage of important conferences and cultural festivals



e.g. Harare conference on the repression of children and the CASA and ZABALAZA cultural festivals.

The Mayibuye Centres film-video unit also has a production capacity. Many of the IDAF productions were international film festival award winners.

Funding has been received for a film project on the role of women in the struggle in South Africa, and the Centre is interested in becoming involved in co-operative film ventures
















PHOTO LIBRARY

The Mayibuye Centre's photographic library consists of approximately 30,000 negatives, 70,000 prints and 4,000 transparencies. It documents South African history from colonial occupation to the present with a specific focus on life under apartheid, and resistance to it. The subjects covered include: history of colonialism; history of apartheid; images of apartheid; liberation movements; forced removals and resettlement; repression; political prisoners; trials; labour and trade unions; women; culture; education; armed struggle; personalities. The archive is the largest and most comprehensive of its kind. Its photographs have been used in countless publications and productions over the past two decades.

Important components of the photographic library are:

- The **Eli Weinberg collection** which consists of the work of an outstanding photographer and activist who documented the struggle against apartheid from the 1940s to the 1970s. Almost 2,000 negatives cover all the major events, campaigns and personalities of this period.
- The **Leon Levson collection** which is an incisive document on social conditions in South Africa from the 1940s to the 1960s. Almost 3,000 negatives give unusual insight into African rural and urban life in this period.
- The **ANC** photographic archive, a collection of approximately 2,000 prints, which chronicles the history and campaigns of the liberation movement from the 1920s to the present.
- Extensive material on the mass mobilisation and uprisings of the 1980s as well as the international campaigns against apartheid.
- A collection of approximately 3500 colour transparencies...
- Various individual collections, including those of internationally recognised photographers such as Tony McGrath and John Seymour, and political figures such as Brian Bunting and Archbishop Trevor Huddleston.

The photo library is concerned to network with community groups and social documentary photographers in the Western Cape and elsewhere in the hope of starting co-operative projects and enriching the core collection. All material is available for editorial reproduction at commercial rates, with some reductions for community and non-commercial publications.

EXHIBITIONS AND VISUAL ART COLLECTIONS

EXHIBITIONS

Over the years, the resources of IDAF were used to produce regular exhibitions, some of which were subsequently published as portable exhibitions and/or picture books. These exhibitions, now part of the Mayibuye Centre's collection, were displayed in many countries and at many important venues, for example, Westminister Abbey in London, the United Nations in New York, the ILO in Geneva, the EEC in Strassbourg and the Olympic Games in Montreal.

The Mayibuye Centre has already held three of its own exhibitions, utilising the IDAF resources and complementing them with materials acquired from other sources. Several new exhibitions, to be held in conjunction with other institutions and community groups, are being planned.

FINE ART

The Centre has an art collection which includes paintings, lithographs, etchings and sculptures from Mocambique donated by Albie Sachs and a 12 piece "Transitions" exhibition created and exhibited by the community based Visual Arts Group in Cape Town in 1992. Mr. E.C.L. Bosman bequeathed a valuable collection of Cecil Skotnes woodcuts and several hundred books on South African art to the centre.

MURALS

This collection consists of 51 murals displayed at the historic 49th ANC annual conference in Durban in June 1991, and others produced for the Zabalaza conference in London in 1990.

POSTERS

The use of political posters to publicise, mobilise and protest were a feature of the 1980s struggles in South Africa. The Mayibuye Centre has around 500 posters depicting these struggles, and another 500 on transparencies. There are also 200 posters relating to international campaigns against apartheid since the 1960s.

CARTOONS

This collection includes general struggle cartoons and 5000 copies from the collection of Abe Berry, doyen of South African cartoonists, which depict everyday life under apartheid.

ORAL HISTORY LIBRARY

The audio tape library consists of some 600 recordings on cassette and 1/4" tape. It covers the history of struggle including extensive in-depth interviews with leading cadres of the liberation and trade union movements, as well as grassroots activists, cultural workers, church people, war resisters and students.


The Julie Frederickse collection is an important component consisting of over 200 tapes recorded in South Africa and Namibia during the early 1980s and includes protest meetings and interviews with SADF personnel and South African businessmen.

Material recorded by IDAF includes:

- Major meetings, rallies, briefings and press conferences of the Southern African liberation movements and allied support groups over a period of roughly 15 years.
- Material from IDAF film and video productions and recordings (e.g. the film Isitwalandwe The story of the South African Freedom Charter which includes rich interviews with those who took part in that historic event and the consequent Treason Trial).
- News, interviews and features on UK radio and TV recorded "off air".
- Lectures such as the annual Canon Collins Memorial Lecture Series delivered by amongst others Oliver Tambo and Govan Mbeki.
- Tapes of historic importance such as Chief Albert Lutuli's Nobel Peace Prize acceptance speech and an interview with Nelson Mandela recorded in 1961.

The Mayibuye Centre has just launched an oral history project on the exile experience in South Africa, which will be one of the Centre's major focuses for the next few years. Three Trainee Researchers have been employed to conduct interviews, undergo training and help process and prepare for eventual publication the material generated by the project. Hilda Bernstein, author of a book on exiles has donated transcripts of 330 interviews ensuring a readymade database of information on the subject.

Scholars who may have interview material relating to apartheid, social life and struggle in South Africa are being requested to deposit this in the Centre so that it can form part of the oral history library.



ACCESSIONING

CATALOGUING SYSTEM


The Mayibuye Centre has developed a computer indexing programme to catalogue the Photographic, Film, Video and Audio collections.

All items have been captured on the programme and all words referring to specific subjects or categories, eg. labour, women, resistance etc are highlighted (keyworded) to enable comprehensive and precise subject information retrieval.

The system is very easy to operate requiring no prior knowledge or experience of computers making it simple and quick to retrieve information and to research items.

NETWORKING

All the photographic contact sheets, as well as a selection of key video and audio material has been duplicated and will be distributed in 5 regions in South Africa with copies of the computer programme. This will enable individuals and organisations to research the entire archives, identify the material they wish to use, and to order the material from a central source. Hopefully these organisations will also use the system to input their own collections so that a central audio-visual resource research facility will be established at the UWC.



MESSAGES OF SUPPORT
