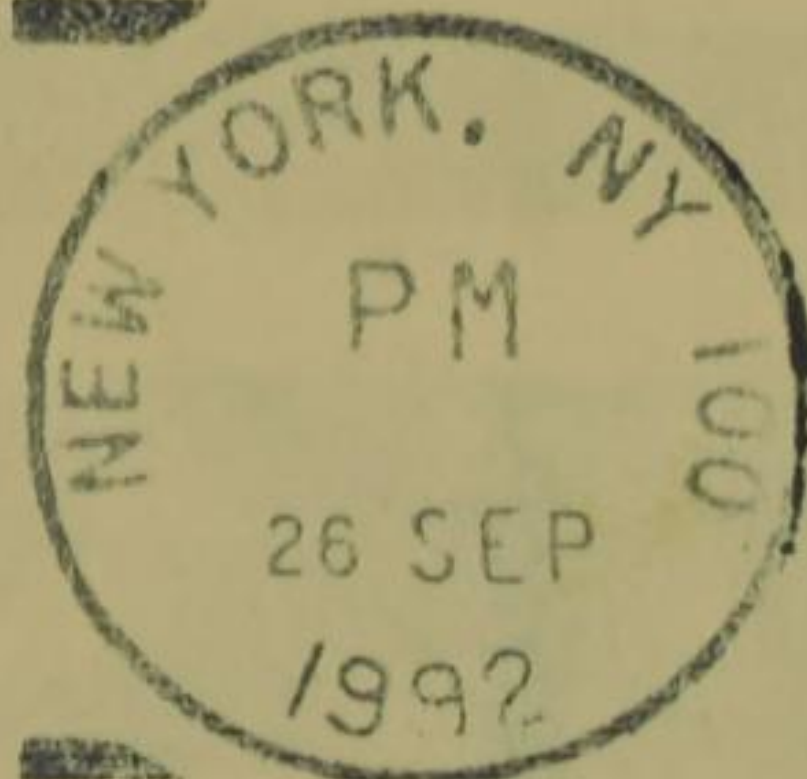

# NATIONAL CONFERENCE IN SUPPORT OF THE AFRICAN NATIONAL CONGRESS AND OTHER DEMOCRATIC FORCES FOR A NEW SOUTH AFRICA

We, the undersigned, invite you to a **National Conference in Support of the African National Congress and Other Democratic Forces for a New South Africa, November 13-15, 1992, at Riverside Church, New York City.**

This conference commemorates the 80th anniversary of the ANC which has led the oppressed people of South Africa in the struggle against apartheid tyranny towards a democratic, non-racial and non-sexist South Africa.

Since Nelson Mandela's triumphant tour of 1990, political events within South Africa have shattered the myth that apartheid is dead. Although President Mandela and other leaders of the ANC have been released from prison, political power remains a monopoly of the white minority regime. Throughout the country people continue to suffer from the political and economic ravages of many years of institutionalized racist oppression and exploitation.

State-sponsored violence continues to undermine the progress towards the democratic transformation of South Africa. In the two years up to early July of 1992, the minority regime and its security forces have, in the words of President Mandela, been responsible for "direct and indirect involvement" in countless attacks

including over 50 massacres in the townships with, at least, 6,000 dead and many thousands more maimed and wounded. On June 17, 1992, more than 42 men, women and children were killed in Boipatong, including an eight month old infant and a pregnant woman. This massacre caused the ANC to withdraw from negotiations concerning the installation of an interim government of national unity and establishment of a constituent assembly.

This National Conference will provide the most current and accurate presentation of the realities and issues facing the democratic forces struggling for a new South Africa. It will also produce a **PROGRAM OF ACTION FOR THE 90s**, to be undertaken in the United States, in support of post-apartheid South Africa.

Senior representatives from the democratic movement in South Africa will lead discussions in workshops and will present the critical issues they confront in building their society as well as the impediments to political, economic and social change.

Representatives from the United States-based constituency organizations including religious groups, universities, trade unions, corporations, elected officials, artists, women and student groups will serve as workshop facilitators.
