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Thir ly, the fact that she, a mother and housewife, was willing to make the sacrifice of leaving her family to study at that level impressed the Committee to view the applicant as one of positive affirmative action since women were under-represented. Unfortunately, as you know, she spent only one term at the University and did not, therefore, finish the cqurse.

2.2: Mr D. Setiloane

In addition to the criteria referred to in Paragraph 1.1 above, there were, as I recall, the following additional reasons for approving the application: At the time we had one student in South Africa doing Medicine at the University of the Witwatersrand. Donors (especially SIDA) were pressing the LMT to sponsor students in South Africa where, they said, costs were 1/4 of costs in the U.K. They made it clear that they were no more willing to fund students in the U.K. but might do so if iwe sponsored students at South African educational institutions. At about the same time we received four applications from four students at the University of Cape Town (the only other student I remember who was in this group was Mr Ramotshehoa) and who said they were experiencing such financial problems that they might not be ablet to continue. All four (including Mr, Setiloane) were considered at the same meeting and approved for sponsorship. All have since compioted their studies and are contributing to the economic and aeaial life of this country at this critical time in ' our historw '
