of thellnternational Union of Students from 19_21st January in the Musht-

observers and visitors from Austria, Bulgaria, Chile, China, Czechoslovakia,
Cuba, Ecuador, Germany, Hungary, India, Indonesia, Iran, Iraq, Italy, Japan,

The IUS President, Giovanni Berlinguer, was unable to partielpate 1n the
meeting because the Italian authorities had confiscated his passport. The

The Executive Committee discussed the programme of IUS acthlties- for
1954 and the XIIth World University Summer Games.
The report on the first point of the agenda, presented. by the .IUS General
Secretary, J. Pelikan, dealt with the development of the international student

this year of the anniversaries of great figures in the world of science and
culture, such as Aristophanes, Dvorak, Chekhov and Fielding. the IUS will
offer its full 'support and encouragement. In its programme fothhe year the
Executive Committee stressed the importance of academic and material needs
and rights of students everywhere. It called attention particularly to the
struggle for improved living conditions and academic rights for colonial
students and urged large-scale celebrations of February 21st, Day of Solidarity
with students of colonial and dependent countries.
The report- on the second point of the agenda, devoted to the XIIth World
University Summer Games, reflected considerable interest among student
sportsmen in the organisation of these traditional Games by the IUS on an
Olympic basis. The report enumerated the efforts made by the IUS to lay
such a basis while regretting that the Federation Internationale du Sport
Universitaire wished to impose conditions that would exclude many countries
from participation. The IUS, however, will continue its efforts towards the
united organisation of the Games together with FISU and other interested
organisations. Regarding the date and location of the XIIth World University
Summer Games, the proposal of the Hungarian student and sport organisations
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to hold them in Budapest in the second half of July was accepted with thanks. The programme of the Games will include most of those branches of sport featured in world Olympics. The suggestion to call a meeting in February of the International Organising Committee of the representatives of IUS and FISU member organisations, and of organisations which are not members either of IUS or FISU, was supported.

The Executive Committee decided to convene the annual meeting of the IUS. Council in August, 1954. It accepted with pleasure the invitation of the Anti-Fascist Committee of Soviet Youth to hold the Council in Moscow. Invitations will be sent out to member and non-member organisations of the IUS and the Executive Committee called upon student organisations all over the wdrld to prepare for/this Council, which will be an occasion for student representatiV'res to discuss problems of 'common interest.

This meeting of the Executive Committee once again demonstrated that the work of the IUS reflects the needs and aspirations of students everywhere

I 3 and that it will continue its efforts, in 1954, to bring students together, to foster friendship and good will and thereby contribute to the safeguarding of a world at peace.

ALBANIA

Higher Educational Institutes Today

Before 1945, Albania did not have a single higher educational school in the country. At the most 35 to 40 persons a year'went abroad to study. A number of higher schools have since been established including pedagogical, polyj technical, medical and'agricultural linstitutes. In addition, thousands of young Albanians are attending courses in the Soviet Union or in the Peoples Democracies. (National ipress)

Holiday Camp for Music Makers

Approximately 150 young students were expected to attend the Music Camp in Corio, Victoria, during January. F mm a tentative and experimental 'beginning in the summer of 1947, Music Camp has become an annual event of great importance to music in Australia. Leading teachers and players from symphony orchestras, concert halls and the Universities also attend the Camp. They live as a community, sharing not only a common interest in music but sport, recreation and friendship. (National press)

National Union of Students Against Disloyalty Law

111 a manifesto addressed to the public and sent to the National Congress, the National Union.of Students (UNEB) condemned the so-called Law of Disloyalty to the country which it considers contrary to the interests of the people and against (the principles of democracy. The law, under discussion in congress at the moment, on the pretext of _an anti-communist drive, constitutes a real threat to the democratic way ofilit'e and the democratic organisations of Brazil, says the manifesto, signed by Joan Albuquerque de Pessoa, UNEB President. (National press)

Vice-Ptesident UNEB Stricken by Heart Attack

Mr. Helio Ramos, well-known student leader and first vice-president of the NUS of Brazil (UNEB)_ died in Italy. It was to have attended the Executive Committee Meeting of the IUS. The E. C. Meeting observed a minute of silence _ in tribute to his memory and sent messages of condolences to UNEB, several _ State unions and to the family of the deceased. (Special report)

BULGARIA

Agricultural Academy Welcomes Plan for Faculty Conference A meeting of students of the G. Dimitrov Agricultural Academy of Sofia warmly approved the suggestion that the agricultural faculty conference be held in Bulgaria this summer and notified the IUS that it would welcome all participants. The meeting was addressed by the Rector of the Academy and discussion dealt with preparations to ensure a successful conference. (National press)

CANADA

Fare Reductions Sought by Saskatchewan Students

Students of the University of Saskatchewan obtained reduced travel fares for the Xmaslholidays from three railway companies on presentation of vacation certificates. The Student Representative Council of the University is now trying to obtain lower transit fares, in general, for its members. No definite plans have been made but the SRC appointed three of its members to consider the matter. The subject was brought up by the Saskatoon Teacher 5 'College (Saskatchewan province) which is also working for reduced rates for student teachers. (Student press, "'I he Sheaf")

Higher Technical Training Institutes in Wuhan

Engineering colleges have grown in size and number in Wuhan, the triple city of Central-South China. Expansion has been rapid since the overall school re-organisation carried out last year. The Central-South Engineering College was set up by combining the departments of mechanical and electrical

engineering, formerly under Wuhan, Hunan, Nanchang and Kwangsi Universities. This engineering college will be further enlarged in the summer and will then be able to accommodate nearly 3,000 students.

Another important technical institute is the Central-South Water Conservancy College set up in 1952. When a college of dynamics is finished within the next few years, together with the engineering college, the thiee will tackle .the .development of hydroelectric power along the Yangtze River.

Wuhan will be further developed as one of the countryis leading centres of technical education when the hydroelectric, navigation and automobile schools are moved there this year. (National press)

"We want every member of the public to resist inroads into the freedom
. of the universities."
A statement by, NUSAS says that there is no foundation for the contention
that academic no'n-segregation is contrary to long-established South African
traditions. If it were so it could not have survived for 30 years at Witwaterse
rand University and-longer at Cape Town University without anyone saying
a word against it until the Nationalists came to power.
Expressing its opposition to apartheid, the Witwatersrand Student Liberal
Association says: uI'n attacking the system of non-segregation, the Government
is attacking the idea that all men are equal and that education should be
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available to all with the requisite intelligence. By attempting to make higher education the privilege of a white skin the Government is upholding the principle which daily blackens the name of South Africa in the eyes of the world? Among the distinguished alumni of the Institute are K. Simonov, E. Dolmatovsky, M. Aliger, V. Azhaev, S. Babayevsky and S. Mikhalkov, all of whom have achieved considerable success in various literary fields. (National press)

Anti-Fuscist Student Strikes in Madrid and Barcelona According to radio reports, when the demonstration for Spanish control of Gibraltar, organised by SEU (fascist student organisation) on 25th January, on the instigation of government authorities, took on an anti-Franco character, police intervened killing one student, wounding 24 and imprisoning number of others.

The following day Madrid students called a three-day strike. Thousands joined in the march from the University to the Puerta del Sol shouting, tiDown with the eriminal Minister Blas Perezl", iiDown with the chief of police, General Hierrol", "Down with Fernandes Cuesta and Jordana Fuentes!" (Cuesta is the head of the Falange Party and Fuentes, the leader of the fascist student organisation, SEU). The demonstrators stood in front of the Police Headquarters in Madrid, shouting iiMurderersl". Despite a police attack students continued their march to the Ministry of Interior, calling for the dismissal of the Minister. Later they entered the radio broadcasting building and interrupted service for 30 minutes. At several news kiosks, all copies of iiArribai the official Franco organ, were seized and burned. On the 27th, in spite of orders by the Madrid University Rector to return to classes, demonstrations continued. More clashes took place between police and students in the Ciudad Universitaria (student hostels). On the same day ' in Barcelona, students went out on strike in support of their colleagues in Madrid. (Special report)

Vietnamese students observed National Students' Day on 9th January by pledging to oppose forcible conscription and obscurantist culture in the French occupied areas.

National Studentsl Day dates from 9th January 1950 when the French fired on a_ mass student demonstration in the streets of Saigon-Cholon. More than a thousand students were parading to demand the release of Viet Nam students illegally arrested a few days earlier. The French killed 30 students and wounded a hundred others but the demonstration continued and the French had to make concessions: (National press)

be to discuss similar problems facing Asian students and to strengthen ties
of friendship among them.
The call to the conference was approved at the last AISF Council, w'hich 1
made it one of its main tasks. In a letter of support, the AISF announces. that
it has appointed representatives to work on the Preparatory Committee for
the Conference. At the convention which set up the All- Pakistan student
organisation the statement was welcomed and favourable' action on it assured.
The National Union of Students of Indonesia. PPMI, which meets in
February, will discuss the whole question of the conference, tentatively
scheduled for Indonesia, and the formation of a Reception Committee for

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THE IUS AT WORK ,

The International Union of Students was represented at the Executive Committee meeting of the World Federation of Democratic Youth, in Stockholm, Sweden from 25t11_28th January, by its Secretary, Lionel Soto of Cuba.-SNVVD

'lhe Student Needs and Welfare Department organisgd a meeting of student health experts and students in Prague, in January. Doctors from France, Great Britain, Czechoslovakia, Austria, Rumania, Hungary and Germany and students from India, Italy Norway (in a personal capacity), Burma and Iran attended.

The discussion revealed considerable differences between the health conditions of' students in different countries of the world. One fundamental fact emerged, however, that from the long term point of view, the health of students depends primarily upon their living conditions. Inadequate nutrition and housing; unfavourable circumstance for study and recreation; financial assistance which cannot meet the students needs; uncertainy as to the futule, the meeting agreed, are all important factors producing physical and mental ill health among students.

From the meeting came a number of suggestions for the improvement of living and studying conditions for students, a health service programme and proposals for seif-help activities. Participants at the meeting also emphasised the need for further information on student conditions and asked that student organisations conduct surveys on housing conditions, canteen and recreational facilities, available medical examinations and treatment. These surveys should be made with the assistance of a questionnaire provided by national or inter-1 national student organisations. In this work it should be possible to obtain the support and assistance of various medical associations, university teachers. anaindividual doctors. In particular, medical students can play an important part in this regard.

From such information, the meeting suggested, national student bodies will' be able to'estiinate their own requirements, and to make their own proposals. as to which are the most urgent and necessary tasks. P4

New IUS Proposals for Xlllh WUSG Rules ${\tt x}$

On examining the proposal of the Federation Internationale du Sport Universitaire (FISU) that the right to participate in the XIIth World University Summer Games be given only to the national student sport organisations which are recognised by the National Olympic Committee of the country concerned, which decision would exclude from participation many countries where these committees do not exist or where the national student sport organisations are not yet established; the Executive Committee of the IUS, in the interest of furthering discussions with FISU, adopted the following formulation:

article 3: The Games are to be organised on an Olympic basis, this means, that the World University Games are open to all countries without exception. They are exclusively reserved to national university teams set up by a body 'recognised by IUS and FISU considering the differences of organisation of students sports in different'countries. 1

article 8: Invitations'are addressed to all organisations agreed by the IUS and FISU. In the list of the organisations to be invited should be included members of IUS, FISU, Scandinavian countries, sport organisations and 110n-members of these federations, according to article three.

Reasons Offered for Student Non-Participation in Sports in Belgium 011 the question of obligatory students sports in higher schools, a most controversial subject in a number of countries; the report by H. Storme Of the University of Ghent, Belgium, at the IIIrd International Sport Conference

in Dorthmund last summer suggested four reasons why 90% of Ghent Unit versity students are non-participants in sports.
