MERRIESPRUIT MINE DISASTER
1 We refer to our discussions last night. During the course of the discussion
you asked our offices to prepare a memorandum for you setting out certain
aspects of possible interventions in the Merriespruit Mine disaster.
2 THE CONTEXT
2.1 The mining community as well as the entire region and the whole
country, has been profoundly affected and moved by this disaster.
2.2 Press reports indicate that :-
2.2.1 on the night of 22 February 1994 at Harmony Gold
Mine, a slimes dam near the Merriespruit suburb broke
sending a wall of sludge about 2km long into that
suburb;
2.2.2 at present, the official death toll is 14 with 31 people
missing (presumed dead);
2.2.3 the damage caused has been estimated at R100 million.
80 of the 600 houses in the suburb have been totally
destroyed while 200 houses have been damaged;
2.2.4 21 patients aged between 10 and 68 are in the Virginia
Hospital, 6 seriously injured patients are in the Welkom
Provincial Hospital while there is 1 patient in the
Universitas Hospital.

At the moment there is no integrated holistic approach to disaster management in South Africa. Our legislation is inadequate as it presently stands in the statute books. Such disaster relief which exists is designed to protect special interests rather than to address the redevelopment of the area affected by the disaster and the survival strategies of that society. The country is in desperate need of a comprehensive national, regional and local strategy and a state policy.

The ANC could properly intervene very powerfully in this matter of national concern.

To realise this, the ANC should formalise their representation at the forums which will no doubt be created to hear evidence surrounding the disaster. There will be an enquiry in terms of the Occupational Health and Safety Act 85 of 1993 into the reasons why the slimes dam gave way. Simultaneously there will, in all probability, be an inquest held in terms of the Inquest Act. Locus standi, the capacity to be represented at a judicial enquiry, can be established for the ANC.

The ANC and its provincial and local governments in particular must, as a matter of urgency, gain hands on experience in the management of the various structures and institutions that have been created by government.

Formal and powerful intervention and involvement in the Merriespruit disaster would enable the ANC to explore and experience the range of existing institutions and mechanisms for disaster relief. At the same time a valuable opportunity will be afforded to design alternative and more appropriate interventions and methodologies.

The time delays involved in such enquiries are such that the first provincial government of the Orange Free State will, in all probability, be responsible for administering the relief necessary. It is for this primary reason that your participation in the process from the start is imperative.

5 THE MINE AND THE MINING INDUSTRY

The National Union of Mineworkers ("NUM") has a large constituency in the province. NUM members and other mineworkers are profoundly affected by the disaster. The Harmony Gold Mine is apparently a mine which employs some 16 000 people. In the result reasonable efforts should be made to save jobs and ensure the ongoing viability of the mine. Political and business pressure should be brought to bear on the Harmony Gold Mine by the ANC, so that an independent person might sit on its board of directors in order to ensure that the business is not operated to the detriment of potential claimants. 6 INSURANCE CLAIMS

A large number of individuals and possibly businesses have suffered losses as a result of the disaster. These losses would normally give rise to monetary claims against the mine and/or various insurance companies. In the interests of efficiency and delivering social support, the process of administering and lodging of these claims should be centrally co-ordinated. We believe that the ANC should be involved in the co-ordination of claims. The fact that various right wing elements are already involved in relief work points to the political utility of being involved in the disaster relief. Such relief efforts should, however, reflect the reality and concerns of the entire society which has suffered the loss.

Should it be found that there is negligence on the part of the mine, its employees or agents there will be a claim for compensation

against the mine and its insurers and/or the company contracted to maintain the slimes dam. There may also be criminal prosecutions against those who may have contravened the relevant legislation. INOUESTS AND ENQUIRIES

- 7.1 Section 33 of the Occupational Health and Safety Act provides for the creation of a joint enquiry and an inquest. Mr Snyman has indicated that Kobie Coetzee as the political head of the Department of Justice will in all probability appoint a judge to head the enquiry.
- 7.2 The ANC should consider giving input when this appointment is made bearing in mind the importance of the enquiry.
- 7.3 The important of having lawyers representing the diverse interests affected by the disaster at an inquest or at enquiries has been previously demonstrated. The weight, support and presence of the ANC at the inquest will go a long way to enhancing openness and preventing unnecessary delays and obfuscation.
- 7.4 Foreign and local mining experts and engineers would be necessary independent witnesses at the enquiries. An ANC request for outside independent assistance will be useful given the lack of transparency in recent mine disaster enquiries.

  CO-OPERATION

The ANC should co-operate with its traditional allies in devising an approach to the disaster. Various other allegiances and co-operative arrangements might develop during the course of the ANC's involvement. It is however, important for the ANC to seize the opportunity for involvement, without being seen to be delaying the enquiries. We are in the process of compiling a dossier, for your information, of relevant legislation and regulations pertaining to enquiries normally instituted following such a disaster. We are also in the process of compiling a volume of press cuttings relating to the Harmony Gold Mine, the area of Virginia and the events leading up to and following the disaster.
