

THE CHANCELLOR

"Chancellor" is an office that goes back to antiquity: the original Chancellor or cancellarius (as the office was known) regulated access to the Roman Tribune. In medieval times, the office became associated with the heads of the writing departments of the early kings. Because so few people were literate, a chancellor was necessarily learned. This is why the heads and spokepersons of the early universities were also accorded the title. More recently, the office has become largely symbolic. The executive head of a university is its vice-chancellor.

Justice Pius Langa is the sixth Chancellor of the University of Natal. His predecessors are: The Honourable D G Shepstone (1949-1966), Dr G G Campbell (1967-1973), Dr B A Armitage (1973-1983), the Honourable R N Leon QC (1983-1992), and Archbishop D E Hurley (1993-1998).

THE MACE

The Chancellor's Mace is used on ceremonial occasions presided over by the Chancellor and is regarded as the Chancellor's "staff of office". It symbolises the University's protection of its Chancellor.

The use of the mace as a symbol of authority has a long history. The head of a copper mace, which apparently dates back to the 12th Century before Christ, has been excavated at Beyce Sultan in Asia. In the early centuries, churchmen who went to war often carried a mace in preference to a sword. One side of the mace-head was beautifully decorated with the owner's emblem and on the other side was a large knob which served as a weapon, but was always round as a reminder of church law forbidding the shedding of blood. In the early centuries the mace was a symbol of the king's authority. During the power struggle between the king and the Commons in the 13th Century, the king gave the speaker the mace as a symbol of his indemnity against arrest.

The Mace was designed by Mr G H Atkins, senior lecturer in sculpture in the University's Department of Fine Arts. The Mace was made in England, it was first used at the 1970 graduation ceremonies.

THE ARMORIAL BEARINGS (see front cover)

The armorial bearings of the University of Natal were awarded by the College of Arms in London.

The two black wildebeest come from the arms of the Province of KwaZulu-Natal. They are shown in full course to symbolise movement and progress. The two open books represent the universal heritage of knowledge and the two centres of the University, Durban and Pietermaritzburg. The five pointed star refers to the naming of Natal by Portuguese navigators when they landed for the first time at Durban on Christmas Day in 1497. *Stella Aurorae* (star of the dawn) symbolises the role of the University in bringing to light new knowledge and spreading the enlightening influence of education.

ACADEMIC DRESS

The wearing of gowns by judges, ministers, teachers and scholars is an ancient and significant custom. When the graduating students at universities receive their diplomas or degrees, they, too (and for some, only once in their lives) wear the caps and gowns and so participate in this long tradition. By wearing the ancient regalia, they join hands with students past and students present.

In modern academic ceremonies the standard cap and gown are almost universally worn. Of all the components of the costume, the hood conveys the greatest amount of information: it makes clear the level of the degree, the faculty in which it was given, and the institution which awarded it.

CONVOCATION

After being capped by the Chancellor, each graduate moves across the stage and hands the hood to the President of Convocation (or representative). The President places the hood upon the graduate's shoulders. At the end of the ceremony, after the Chancellor's procession has left the stage, the President leads a procession of the new graduates out of the hall, row by row, to symbolise their acceptance into, and future membership of, the Convocation of the University of Natal, the statutory body through which graduates have the opportunity to play a continuing role in the affairs of the University.

DISTINGUISHED TEACHER PAUL HOBDEN

The teaching of Science and Mathematics in our schools is at present in crisis. Dr Paul Hobden started his career as a schoolteacher. He moved into academic life as a science educator at the University of Durban-Westville. In 1986 he joined the University of Natal, in the Centre for the Advancement of Science and Mathematics Education where he undertook major inservice work with school teachers across this region. His doctorate, through the Faculty of Science, focused on questions of teaching learners how to approach problem-solving in school physical science. When the Faculty of Education was re-established in 2001 he became Programme Director for Science, Mathematics and Technology Education in the School of Education, Durban, in which role he has led teaching and research in this key area of Education. The award of distinguished teacher is made in recognition of that leading role.



Dr Cassius Reginald Lubisi

Chairperson: Ministerial Project Committee and Special Advisor to the Minister of Education

Dr Lubisi is a dynamic political and academic activist whose political and employment career spurns over two decades. He matriculated from Inkamana High School, Vryheid, Natal in 1984. He obtained a Bachelor of Science from the University of Natal, majoring in Mathematics. While studying he found time to play an important role in student politics as regional chairperson of AZASO and later SANSCO. It is significant to mention that it was during the years of studentship that he made his most important political contributions. Since obtaining his Bachelor of Education cum laude in 1995, his career as an academic has exhibited a meteoric rise. He enrolled for a Doctoral Programme with the University of Nottingham between 1997 and 2000 and his thesis focused on "An Investigation into Mathematics Teachers' Perceptions and Practices of Classroom Assessment in South Africa Lower Secondary Schools".

His first job was with Delta EMD in Nelspruit as a chemical analyst from 1986 to 1987. He started his career as student counsellor and then as administrative assistant. Between 1990 and 1991 he took up a full time job as Organiser and Political Education Officer for the South African Communist Party (Natal Midlands Region). Dr Lubisi's employment record reveals a total dedication to the University of Natal. From May 1993 until 31 March 2003 he was committed to providing quality education at the University of Natal. In these ten years he has been a member of the School's Co-ordinating Committee and a co-ordinator of Masters and Doctoral Studies in the School of Education. In 2001 he was appointed to head the Faculty MEd Review Committee and in the same year he became a member of the Faculty's Management Committee.

Dr Lubisi has contributed to the transformation of the national education system in different capacities. For the past year he has been a projector manager and chairperson of the Ministerial Project Committee (MPC) that has developed the National Curriculum Statement for grades 10-12. The Committee has also developed a new qualification, the Further Education and Teaching Certificate (FETC), to replace the current Senior Certificate (Matriculation). As chairman of the MPC he submits reports to the Minister of Education, the Council of Education Ministers (CEM), the Heads of Education Departments Committee (HEDCOM) and senior management. He has also been involved in Presidential projects such as the Presidential Lead Project and the Presidential Project Team (Science Education - Eastern Cape). He was a member of the Ministerial Review Curriculum 2005, and a member of many evaluation teams sponsored by the South African government as well as foreign governments such as the Royal Netherlands Embassy, Commonwealth Centre of Learning and many more. He is also the chairman of UMALUSI: Council of Quality Assurance in General and Further Education and Training.



A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE UNIVERSITY OF NATAL

Early Days

Natal University College - the forerunner of the University of Natal - opened its doors in Pietermaritzburg in 1910 with eight professors and 57 students. Lectures in Classics, English and Philosophy, Law, Modern Languages, Botany and Geology, Chemistry and Physics, Mathematics and Zoology were held at various venues throughout the city, including Maritzburg College, the Natal Museum building and the City Hall.

In August 1912, Old Main Building (built on 16 hectares of land donated by the Pietermaritzburg Corporation) was opened and the core of the present-day Pietermaritzburg campus was established.

In 1923, NUC extended its tuition to Durban with university-level courses in Commerce and Engineering being offered at the Technical College. In 1928, NUC took over full responsibility for university classes in Durban. A generous donation by Mr T B Davis, whose son, Howard Davis, had been killed during the battle of the Somme in World War I, facilitated the building of Howard College on 20 hectares of land on the Berea, which formed the core of a separate campus in Durban. Howard College was formally opened in 1931.

Largely through the efforts of Fabian Socialist Dr Mabel Palmer, separate classes for 19 black education students at NUC were introduced in Durban in 1936. This number grew to nearly 900 by 1960. However, as in the case of the University's Medical School, founded for black students in 1951, classes still reflected the segregated nature of South Africa under apartheid.

Multi campus system

In 1953, the administrative control of the University was moved from Pietermaritzburg to Durban. In response to mounting travelling costs, the two centres were academically separated in 1973. Recent restructuring has occasioned the re-merging of some faculties, with the establishment of university-wide single faculties of Engineering, Education and Law. At both centres, departments have been replaced by multi-disciplinary schools of cognate disciplines. With the incorporation of Edgewood College of Education in 2001, the University acquired another campus in Pinetown, while the Medical School, which was renamed The Nelson R. Mandela School of Medicine in 2000, constitutes a fourth campus.

Leadership

The University of Natal is fortunate to boast among its past vice-chancellors and principals some exceptional leaders. Its first principal, Professor John Bews (1930-38), was a world-renowned botanist, while Dr E G Malherbe (1945-65) was known internationally as an educationalist. They were followed by Professor Owen Horwood (1966-70), Professor Francis Stock (1970-77), Professor N D Clarence (1977-84), Professor Piet de V Booysen (1984-91) and Professor James Leatt (1991-93). South Africa's first female Vice-Chancellor, Brenda Gourley, served the University of Natal from 1993 to 2001. The present incumbent, Professor Malegapuru Makgoba, is an internationally-recognised Molecular Immunologist and a graduate of the University of Natal's Medical School. Chancellors have also been distinguished figures, not least the present Chancellor, Justice Pius Langa, and the recently-retired Archbishop Denis Hurley.

The Struggle for Autonomy

A government ruling that the Medical School should be closed to white undergraduates was the first major inroad into the University's freedom to determine its own admissions criteria. In 1957, this was threatened further by a Bill that provided for the removal of the Medical School from the University's control, and the exclusion of "non-white" students from the University's other Faculties. Academic staff at the Medical School resolved to reside an enaste if the Bill was enacted. As a result, the government withdrew the proposal to remove the Medical School from the University's control.

The government's Extension of University Act of 1959 limited new enrolments, other than those at Medical School, to whites only and thwarted the University's aspirations to serve the educational needs of broader society. Although NUC was granted full university status in 1949, it was not until 1983, when the University circumvented the government's racial admission "quotas" by an appeal to the High Court, that the University could attempt to meet its responsibility to serve the educational needs of the broader community.

The University today

Today, the University of Natal has approximately 27 500 students who represent all sectors of South African society.

The University is known as a centre of excellence in Africa, is one of South Africa's top research institutions, and has links with hundreds of international institutions. The University has led the way in the establishment of a number of multi-disciplinary innovative such as the Centre for Ethics, the Leadership Centre, a School of Maritime Studies, the Centre for Entrepreneurship and the Centre for Civil Society.

The University is also committed to community-based education and service learning. In keeping with its mission to be a socially-responsive institution, significant research is being conducted in many sectors of the University into issues such as HIV/AIDS.

The University has, over the course of time, built an impressive reputation as an institution of high academic standing. It has shown itself over time to be capable of adapting to a changing context and responding to the needs of the region. It is a mission that the University intends to fulfil with even greater efficacy as it engages with the opportunities presented by the intended merger with the University of Durban-Westville.
