We would like you to be a special guest speaker at the 37th Annual London Ontario United Nation's Association High School Seminar. This years title is --- "Security, Stability and Development: Surviving the Nineties." The conference will be held from Friday, May 3, to Tuesday May 7, 1991 at Huron College, University of Western Ontario, London, Ontario.

Our prefered time for you to speak is Sunday May 5, 1991 at 7:00 pm. The final schedule of the conference, however, has yet to be determined so some flexibility still exists. Your food and transportation costs will be covered by the London United Nations Association. We also hope to able to provide a small honourarium, but this depends on the final budget of the conference.

The objective of the conference is to provide the students with up-to-date information on the issues of "Security, Stability and Development", to facilitate discussion and stimulate interest in international relations, development issues and the United Nations.

The participants at the conference will be high school students in grades 11 through 13 from across the province of Ontario. Approximately 150 students will attend the conference. Also participating will be about 20 conference facilitators, assistants and organizers. The conference and speakers usually receive extensive media coverage. Sections of the conference are also taped by the London Cable Station and played on the cable television network across the province of Ontario.

The conference is structured around a series of keynote speakers and panel discussions of the themes outlined in the title of the conference. After each introductory address the students break into small discussion groups and together with a facilitator discuss what the speakers have said. The students then reassemble for a question period with the speakers. Each of these periods takes between 30 minutes to one hour, depending on the structure of each section of the conference.

There are also practical and information work shops and films that round out the conference programme. On the last day of the conference students perform skits and conduct an evaluation of the conference as part of the closing exercises.

I hope that this letter serves to introduce our conference to you and we look forward to your participation.
