After repeated attempts to reach the ANC, no comment could be obtained from the organisation at the time of going to press.

During a three-week ordeal, the pupils said, ANC officials refused to harm over their passports and frustrated their efforts to leave the camp

"We eventually persuaded them to give back our passports and we ' bought our own bus tickets back to South Africa " .

Seem 1ty police said they had no ' reason to detain the pupils as, by their own admittance, they had not undergone any military training the outskirts of Lusaka identified 1 ' as the Charlton Transit Centre.

We were approached for assistance once they reached the South African border and we agreed to transpmt them to their homes in
