

It had been hailed as the occasion where agreements would finally be signed between South Africa, SWAPO, the U.N., the Frontline States and perhaps, to please the South African regime, their proxy the DTA (Democratic Turnhalle Alliance).

The last sticking points had been settled and significant concessions had been made by SWAPO. These included an agreement to sign a cease-fire with South Africa, to agree to meet at Geneva with the DTA puppets, to fully support the UN peace plan and UN supervision of the transfer of power, to commit itself to fair elections under UN control and to abide by the results and even to accept that the election machinery be in the hands of the South Africans as the 'decolonizing power'.

But even though SWAPO had gone such a long way to meet the objectives of the Pretoria regime, who had indicated its willingness to accept the peace plan to the UN and other relevant parties, the regime demonstrated from the time the conference began on Jan. 7. 1981 that they were going to backtrack.

For the first time they raised the spurious argument that the UN was 'unfairly favouring SWAPO', insisting that the UN withdraw recognition of SWAPO as the 'sole authentic representitive of the Namibian people', even though they had through all the years of negotiation never raised this objection. Because of Pretoria's about-face and impossible demands the Conference broke down and ended in failure. SWAPO is now forced to intensify the armed struggle.

The scene shifts to Paris next month where an International Conference on the implementation of economic sanctions against South Africa will take place. What will probably result will be a demand from the Conference that the Security Council pass a resolution imposing mandatory sanctions against South Africa because of its refusal to end its illegal occupation of Namibia, placing the U.K. and the U.S. in the embarrassing position of at least one of them having to exercise veto power in the Council to defeat sanctions.



Mercenaries Granted 'Citizenship of SWA'

Military authorities yesterday said the former Angolan troops now fighting in the counter-insurgency 32 Battalkon in the SWA border war are SWA citizens. A London Daily Telegraph correspondent shown the Battalion in action last week, reported that it consisted of about 1, 100 men, of whom 80% are Portuguese-speaking black mercenaries who fought with the defeated FNLA. According to a Defence HQ spokesman, the former Angolans had crossed into South West Africa and decided to stay there. They were 'naturalised citizens of SWA', he said. 'They have joined the Permanent Force and been issued with SA Defence Force identification cards. We regard them as naturalised South West Africans. I could not care about international opinion regarding their status', he added, saying there was a stigma attached to the word mercenary.

WORLDWIDE SUPPORT FOR RELEASE OF MANDELA

More than 100,000 people throughout the world have to date supported the Free Mandela campaign which was launched in Natal last year. The campaign received overwhelming support, particularly from overseas students and trade unionists. 'We are absolutely thrilled by the tremendous success of the campaign', said Mr Paul David. Though most of the signatories of the petition are South Africans, thousands of others are not South African citizens. A striking feature of the signatories is that a large percentage of them are prominent people, ranging from politicians to church leaders the world over Some 30 United Kingdom universities are involved in the circulation of the petition calling for the release of Nelson Mandela, and a number of trade unions were also actively involved in the campaign, both in Europe and the USA, said Mr David. As soon as the full petition has been drawn up - a matter which could take between three and five weeks - it would be presented to the State President Mr Marais Viljoen. He together with his advisers, would then decide on whether to get Mr Mandela released from jail or reject the petition. The time lapse from the President receiving the petition and his decision, according to legal experts, could take up to three months. Said Mr David: 'If the petition is rejected, we'll continue with the campaign until Mandela is released'. He emphasised that the campaign was something on-going.

The Release Mandela campaign appears to have coincided with an apparently growing mood among some of the National Party verligte members that talks be opened between Mandela and the government. Indications are that the verligte group have come to realise that the creation of more 'independent bantustans and negotiations with bantustan leaders can only buy time, but would never be the ultimate answer....

STUDENTS REJECT KOORNHOF

Hundreds of university students, most of them white, disrupted a speech by a South African Cabinet Minister yesterday shouting 'Fascist' and 'Sieg Heil' and singing the anthem of the banned African National Congress (ANC). Dr Piet Koornhof was shouted down at the University of the Witwatersrand by students who pelted him with missiles and hurled stinkbombs. His speech coincided with the eve of the 21st anniversary of the Sharpeville incident when 69 blacks were shot dead by police during a protest. For nearly an hour Dr Koornhof, who is minister responsible for black affairs, tried to address the students, but his voice was drowned out by the singing, shouting crowd. The students chanted -'Free Mandela'. Dr Koornhof repeatedly tried to speak, shouting: 'Your behaviour is not worthy whites, coloureds or blacks'. He attempted to outline the policies of the ruling National Party, and said that one-man, one-vote would never be possible in South Africa. 'If you give me the opportunity I will tell you my party stands for important things ... for the just and equal treatment of all groups in this country, including you and Mandela,' but he drew chants of 'Apartheid, Apartheid'

South African Military Men in Washington - Violation of the Arms Embargo The Department of State said yesterday it had told the American Security Council that it was not likely that visa applications by a team of top South African military intelligence officers would be approved. This is the latest development in a controversy sparked off by the visit to Washington of 5 South African officers headed by Lt. General P W van der Westhuizen, Chief of Staff, Military Intelligence. Their one-week visit to the US capital, in apparent contradiction of long-standing US policy, has caused a furore in the State Department - a furore reflected in prominently displayed major American newspapers. The 5 men came to the United States at the invitation of the American Security Council. They briefed the ASC, met senior congressional aides and one member of the party called on a top official of the United States Defence Intelligence Agency and an official of the National Security Council. The State Department said yesterday the Washington representative of the ASC, Brigadier-General Robert C Richardson, asked whether the USA would issue visas to Lt. General van der Westhuizen and two other military officers. They wanted the guests to attend an ASC briefing...

PEKING BACKING FOR PRETORIA

The magazine Afrique-Asie claimed in Paris last week that Peking has officially notified the Pretoria authorities of its willingness to 'give support' to South African efforts aimed at destabilising Angola. Quoting western diplomatic sources in Pretoria, the prestigious liberal-democratic monthly adds that Chinese military 'advisers' are now to be sent to camps in Namibia with a view to advancing the Peking/Preforia Axis. Further confirmation comes from the Nigerian magazine Times International which charges the Chinese authorities with training troops of both anti-Angolan government groups, Unita and FNLA, in Namibian camps. Chinese intelligence services and news agency reports now coordinate subversion against the People's Republic of Angola both with the South Africans and with

REGIME'S ATTACK ON ANC IN ZIMBABWE

Zimbabwe bomb disposal experts have defused an explosive device which was planted at the home of Mr Joe Cqabi, a leading official of the banned African National Congress, at the weekend. The lethal package was set to explode if Mr Gqabi's car was moved and it was powerful enough to have blown the garage 'sky high' according to reliable sources. The device was taken away by a team of army engineers who rushed to the scene after the explosives were found by police in the garage of Mr Gqabi's house in Salisbury. Residents in the neighbourhood were evacuated from their homes as the army team went to work. Mr Gqabi is a long-serving executive member of the ANC who went into exile a couple of years ago after serving about 11 years in prison, mostly on Robben Island.

And talking about Zimbabwe, here is an exerpt from the long letter that was recieved from Bryan Haddon who is now living in that country.

My job here is for a few months while the hospital gets back on its feet and I find out a little about health in the rural areas. I work on the finances, drive the ambulance, fix water pumps, battle with various funding authorities and plough through mounds of paper. I enjoy working in the fairly informal setting: frequent laughter along the verandahs, the constant to and fro of patients' relatives (many sleep overnight beside the beds) and nurses

taking time for a chat as they go about their work.

Staff are: one doc. registered nurse registered nurse/midwife (Drew and Fiona Walker from Scotland with OXFAM), eight medical assistants and twenty other staff. The medical assistants (3 years training) handle regular deliveries.

and a fair bit of diagnosis and treating.

It's the only hospital for 60-80,000 people, with no other doctors and only a couple of small clinics. So the push has been to start outreach clinics in the remoter parts (some 80 kms. away). With the enthusiastic help of local ZANU Committees (who have strong public support here), eight such clinics are now arranged each month. 200 - 400 people come, all seen by Drew or Fiona plus one or two of the medical assistants. Emphasis on expectant mothers, charting 1 - 4 year-olds, vaccinating, holding a short discussion on local concerns and prevention.

Reguarding the newspaper changes, the Government set up an independent "Media Trust" with a grant from Nigeria and this bought out the 40% share in our 5 main papers which was previously owned by Argus Press of South Africa. The six trustees include Grace Todd (wife of Carfield, the former liberal white Prime Minister) and Walter Khamba (head of the University, ex Dean of Law at Dundee University). Both are gentle, thoughtful people.

As a whole the Trust members are clearly separate from Government and will appoint their own successors.
