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STATEMENT BY THE AFRICAN NATIONAL CONGRESS ON POLICE AGGRESSION AGAINST ANC DEPUTY PRESIDENT, WALTER SISULU

The belligerent behaviour of the police in the early hours of Sunday morning. 13 July 1993. warrants immediate investigation by independent bodies.

The life of ANC Deputy President, Walter Sisulu, travelling with his wife Albertina from the 75th birthday celebrations of Nelson Mandela. was placed in great jeopardy by the actions of the police.

On nearing Diepkloof. a car, travelling at speed. Attempted to travel immediately alongside the vehicle in which the Sisulus were. It was the middle vehicle in a three-vehicle convoy. When the lead vehicle of the security escort slowed to force the unidentified.vehicle tarmOve away from the ANS Deputy President's vehicle, shots were fired at the convoy.

The driver of the lead vehicle was shot (and subsequently died), resulting in the ear overturning. The ether occupants were also seriously injured.

This is the second incident in a matter of months involving police firing. or preparing to fire, at Mr Sisulu at virtually the same location.

The ARC demands that:

- i the police involved in this. and the previous, incident be publicly identified and immediately suspended;
- i the international police monitors, together with independent "experts. inveStigata the role of the police in this incident;
- . Commissioner of Police Johan van der Nerve provide the ARC with an explanation of the incident:
- i the ANC be granted immediate access to those detained
- i Minister Kriel publicly guarantee the safety of the injured and detained. and assure us that thevaill be free from intimidation. torture or harrassment of any kind by the police;
- i Minister Krial take full responsibility for ensuring his police force ceases its acts of aggression against Walter Sisulu and Other ANC officials ${\bf r}$

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The unbanning of the African NationaT Congress has ushered in a fundamentale new era in the struggTe against apartheid. The Movement's immediate chaTTenge is to reconstitute itseTf in South Africa as a TegaT organisation after 30 years of proscription.

During those 30 years the ANC conducted an all round struggTe against white minority rule through mass mobilisation, underground poTiticaT organisation and the mobilisation of internationaT support.

Another v1tal aspect of the ANCTs struggle has been the creation of alternative institutions in preparation for Tiberation. During its years of exiTe the ANC diaspora has been democraticaTTy organised for the formuTation of poTicy quideTines on constitutionaT matters, education, cuTture, etc. Huge settTements were established with comprehensive fa0111ties for its exiTed membership. A Targe range of projectsproviding educational, training, health, agricuTturaT and cuTturaT faciTities were set up for purposes of seTfreTiance and in preparation for a Tiberated South Africa. The SOLOMON MAHLANGU FREEDOM COLLEGE (SOMAFCO) encompassed in the Mazimbu CompTex near Morogoro began in 1977 and the ANC DAKAWA DEVELOPMENT CENTRE began its existence in 1982. Both settTements provide varied faciTities and cater for those from infancy to 01d age and produce food, furniture, clothing, Teather goods and various services.

The ANC estabTished other projects, such as the ChongeTa and Makeni farms ianambia, a furniture factory and motor repair workshop, also in Zambia. the Moses Kotane SeTf-Reliance Centre in AngoTa provides vocationaT training in motor mechanics and sewing. There is a farm in AngoTa and one in Zimbabwe.

With the unbanning of the ANC and the decision of the National Executive Committee to transfer the ANC, S Headquarters to Johannesburg, the future of all these projects and activities had naturaTTy to be reviewed.

In attempting to determine the future of ANC projects it was necessary to take into account the decTared intentions in the De KTerk government and its abiTity to ensure the practicaT impTementation of a new reconciliatory and humane policy by all government agencies, incTuding the poTice and security forces. If the process of negotations were to be protracted, or, even worse, there were to be a dramatic reversaT in the white power structure in South Africa, Tegal oppositionaT work coqu again be jeopardised, necessitating again faciTities externaTTy for further struggTe.

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The crux of the matter is that there needs to be a cTear indication that the political changes taking pTace in South Africa are irreversible. Until such a point has been reached, the Movement will continue to bear responsibility for its membership and it is necessary that our pTans for the future contain contingency arrangements to enabTe us to be flexible and to adjust if advances are more rapid than anticipated. It is the view of the ANC that there are compelling reasons for the continued existence of externaT projects, especially in relation to human resources deveTopment. Therefore, SOMAFCOx will remain in operation in the forseeabTe future to cater for over 1,000 students. Due to the system of Bantu Education, thousands of young peopTe are denied educationaT opportunities and it will take years for a democratic government in South Africa to introduce universaT, compulsory and free education. To enabTe a further 500 out-of-schooT youth in South Africa to benefit from education and training, the ANC has decided to continue providing secondary education and vocationai training at the Dakawa DeveTOpment Centre and to restructure these institutions to meet the needs of the new situation. In contrast to the Mazimbu CompTex, the Dakawa Development Centre is less well deveToped infrastructuraTTy. The ANC is proceeding with ongoing deveTopment at Dakawa and is presentTy revising the 1984 Dakawa Development Plan in the Tight of the unfoning situation. The revised Dakawa DeveTOpment PTan wiTT be avaiTabTe by July 1990.

At present, all other projects at Mazimbu and Dakawa (the farms and small scaTe production units) will continue. As regards projects in Zambia, Angola and Zimbabwe, they will remain in operation for the present and a thorough review has commenced on their future.

The ANC is pTanning a series of consuTtations with donors, during May 1990 in order to examine further the issues raised in this Statement.

As regards the Conference for Donors scheduTed for the third quarter of 1990, it will proceed as pTanned. By then a concerted strategy and coherent pTan of project deveTopment in South Africa and externaTTy will be available for presentation to donors. Efforts are underway to plan and coordinate with internaT ANC and MDM structures on projects. The African NationaT Congress has had the good fortune of receiving considerabTe assistance from donors, especiaTTy over the Tast twenty years of its exile. It has enabled the

Movement to establish viable settlements and projects through which human resources development for self-rellance and for a liberated South Africa has been the major achievement. Through our settlements and projects the reconstruction process for a new, democratic and non-racial South Africa was set into motion.

16. The oppressed people of South Africa are indeed deeply grateful for the generous assistance and the moral and political support that accompanied it. It is the hope of the Movement that in the unfolding situation, more, rather than less, assistance and support will be forthcoming for continued reconstruction.
