Permanent Collection

This house museum which became the first satellite of the South African National Gallery in October 1988, contains a collection of twenty-seven paintings, including work by the Englishartists George Morland and George Romney, as well as paintings from the schools of Bordone, Hogarth, Metsu, Rubens and van Dyck. The public rooms of the museum are furnished with ornate gilt ceilings, damask wall coverings, oriental carpets, elaborate chandeliers and period furniture.

French Art Glass (1880-1940)

This exhibition of glass produced in France between 1880 and 1940 includes works of master glass makers such as René Lalique, Emile Gailé, the Daum Brothers, Argy Rousseau, Degué and Auguste Legras amongst others.

Works on the show include those produced by unusual methods such as *pate-de-verre* where a cold paste of curshed glass crystals is sculpted and heated to vitrify the paste, Gallé's double and triple overlaid glass with acid-etching and wheel-cutting and Lalique's use of the *cire-perdue*, or lost wax method.
