Jimmy Carter has been in the White House for one year, and government programs that support the South African Vorster regime are still in place.

Some things have changed. The Carter Administration officially supports majority rule in South Africa. The U.S. voted for a mandatory arms embargo against South Africa at the United Nations in response to the October crackdown against all organized opposition to agertheid. Now Administration spokespeople say that this small step is as far as they are willing to go.

But the economic crux of U.S. policy hasn't been touched. We think it is time to mount a hajor Eublic camgaigg to end U.S. ggvernment economic sugggrt for South Africa. And we think the place to start is with official Export-Import Bank financing of trade. In Congress, a bill has been introduced to end the use of Export-Import Bank facilities to finance exports to South Africa. H.R. 9746. introduced by Rep. Andrew Maguire (D-N.J.). provides that: "In no event shall the (Export-Import) Bank guarantee, insure or extend credit or participate in any extension of credit to the Republic of South Africa."

Over sixty prominent Americans in leadership positions of national church, civil rights and peace groups have called for an end to Eximbank support for South Africa.

The Eximbank campaign can build on the momentum of organizing already going on across the country. In at least ten cities. coalitions are organizing to stop commercial bank loans to South Africa. It is just as important to oppose financing by the government-run Eximbank, where we, American taxpayers, bear the ultimate burden if South Africa defaults. Many national and local groups are also working to stop foreign aid to governments which commit gross violations of human rights against their own people.

Stopping the flow to racist South Africa of Export-Import Bank financing. which is considered by the Executive Branch as a form of foreign aid. should become a critical part of this human rights work. We need to mount a campaign against Eximbank's South Africa connection to demonstrate to the Congress that there is a popular demand in this country for not only talk, but action, to break U.S. links with agartheid, beginning with the Export-Import Bank. We also need to direct ourtattention toward the Executive Branch. President Carter could decide, even without the Congress acting, to stop Eximbank financing to South Africa tommorrow.
