costly resistance this week to the transition to a national democracy casts a shadow over: the election campaign and presents a daunting challenge to the Independent Electoral Commission at a time when it already has its hands full running the campaign throughout the rest of the country.

There are some who will say Lucas Mangope has shown courage in his resistance, but the truth is that his extraordinary reaction betrays a pitiful and dangerous political greed.

Not only is he deluding himself that his nominal State is independent $a\200\224$ and that he therefore has a sovereign integrity to defend $a\200\224$ but he appears determined to foist this fantasy, violently if need be, on his own people.;

His advisers ought to disabuse him of his own myth.

He will find, at considerable cost to himself and his followers, that the force of history, here, this year, is irresistible. -

But the more pressing concern right now is

what the South African government is going to

do about the crisis.;

It has a more than neighbourly interest.

After all, there is now no such thing $\hat{a}\200\224$ statutorily $\hat{a}\200\224$ as a Bophuthatswana citizen.

In terms of legislation passed late last year, citizens of the apartheid-created homelands are automatically granted South African citizenship and, by a stroke of the Presidential pen, have been granted the right to vote next month.
