Speech Day was held on Friday, 27th October on a day of pleasant warm weather The occasion was well-attended and the marquee, with its agree able flower-show smell of newly-cropped grass, was comfortably full. Mr Chester Franklin, Chairman of the Board of Governors, welcomed our guests, outlined the preliminary activities of the Foundation Trust and th anked staff, girlsand the whole community for their support and enthusia sm throughout the year.

Mrs van Biljon's alterting and amusing address was very well received by

Cape Town journalist, Mrs Madeleine van Biljon, said she was horrified by the ethic that makes a heroine of a Miss Universe but will not give a cl ever woman her rightful place in the sun

Mrs van Biljon, a columnist for a Sunday newspaper, was addressing pupils, parents and staff at St Anne's Diocesan College speech day at which she was the guest speaker

'We as women have to learn to use power. We re so indoctrinated in this male-dominated world, so grateful for the occasional opportunity we get. that we don't use the power we already have effectively.

Because South Africa is a male-dominated society you have already been s ubtly indoctrinated into thinking that a woman's place is in the wrong a nd marriage is a suitable career."

Women, she said, were regarded as high-risk employees because they either marry, become pregnant or their husbands are transferred If we had more creches attached to say great mining houses, hospitals, un iversities or schools, the problem of childcare would be solved."

Mrs van Biljon said if women were given equal pay their husbands might we Il have to leave their jobs and go along if their wives were transferred.

Mrs van Biljon told pupils they were singularly fortunate to be in a scho ol with a long tradition and one which set a high value on academic achie vement

" I would ask you to exploit the opportunities offered to the best of your ability But above all, I would like you to learn the necessity that women be supportive of one another and aware of the multiplicity ot choice they face

She said she had the greatest possible faith in the contribution the wom en of St Anne's would make to South Africa

In introducing and concluding the customary review of the year (dealt wi th passim in these pages) the Headmaster pointed to the way private scho ols, feeling themselves much more in partnership than in competition, pr opounded their ethos and were, in the friendliest way, mutually supportive; he explained the steps taken to make out-of-school private tuition s upererogatory; asked for help, support and advice in attempts to give a broader cultural base to the curriculum and to Club activities; thanked the Social Service Club for their charitable efforts; offered a frivolous disquisition upon School Reports and thanked the whole community for their friendly encouragement throughout the year.

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Obituaries

MARGO PISTORIUS born 18 August 1962 died 20 April 1978

A short span for such a vital girl: Margo was an outstanding swimmer, a keen pianist and had a bubbling sense of humour which made her popular w ith all of us at St Anne's.

Margo had two years at St Anne's, and her elder sister Karen had four ye ars, before the family moved to Surrey late in 1976. She became ill in 1 977 and her death followed a painful illness, bravely endured.

Girls from Margo's form and House held a Memorial Service in the Chapel and are arranging to have a plaque inscribed, and the family is presen ting a Cup for junior swimming, in Margo's name.

Responding to letters from the School, Mr Pistorius has written:

"We have been very moved by the demonstrations of sympathy from St Anne 's. There was no more loyal past pupil than Margo. As I said in a lette r to the girls of F.B., she staunchly and openly refused to lower her s tandards from what she thought would have been thought correct at St An ne's, and she was ever grateful for her years there. She experienced gr eat happiness and contentment there, and for this we are thankful.

The observance of standards of conduct learned at St Anne's contributed materially to Margo's success at school here and, I am convinced, also t o Karen's becoming Head Girl in a 900-girl school after being there just on eighteen months."

ANNE HOLLAND (nee Stacey)

The death of Anne Holland (nee Stacey) at the hands of terrorists in Rhode sia on April 22,1978, brought to a tragic close a life filled with achieve ment, cheerful kindness and a tremendous zest for living. She was travelli

ng with two of her

children and a friend in an escorted motor convoy from Umvuma to Fort Victoria when they were ambushed by terrorists 27 km north of Fort Victoria. Anne was 46 when she died and leaves her husband, Geoff, and the ree children

Born on September 28, 1931, at Ulverston. Lancashire, Anne came to South Africa with her parents and a sister, Jennifer, in 1934. In 1938 the fami ly moved to Rhodesia and farmed in the Bromley district, until Mr Stacey's death in 1968 Mrs Stacey still lives on the farm but takes no active part in running it.

Anne attended Chisipite Preparatory School in Salisbury before going to St Anne's where she matriculated in 1948. She then went to Studley Agricultural College in England and after completing her course there went to the Durban Tech to do the domestic science diploma. Anne and Geoff were married on March 4, 1953, at the Anglican Church in Marandellas and farmed in the Karoi district for six years before moving to Salisbury. In 1963 they moved to Marandellas where Goeff accepted an appointment in the pasture research department at the Grasslands Research Station, and Anne managed her father's nearby mushroom farm. During these busy years she studied for and passed the final Chartered Institute of Secre taries examination. At the time of her death, Anne was reading for a B.A. degree through UNISA, in addition to managing the legume inoculation factory at the research station.

Anne and her husband, a former Marandellas councillor, both took a grea t interest in public affairs and served for many years on school councils, parent-teacher associations and other bodies. As an Old Girl of St Anne's, Anne was tremendously interested in and proud of the school, and travelled down from Rhodesia to be present at the Centenary celebrations. In addition to all her other interests. Anne was much involved in the local hospital at Marandellas, where she worked as a VAD and spent many hours of her time each month.

The Holland's elder daughter, Jane, teaches science at a high school in S alisbury, where the younger, Susan, is nursing, and their son, Richard, i s at senior school in Marandellas.

GLADYS FRIEND LESTER (nee Addison)

One of the oldest Old Girls of St Anne's, and certainly one of the proud est of her school, died in Durban on April 23,1978, at the age of 88. Gl adys Lester (nee Addison), gracious, vital and looking twenty years youn ger than she was, had attended the Centenary Celebrations just a year be fore with her family, and loved every moment of that exciting day. Glady s family was very much part of the history of old Natal. Her grandf ather, DrW. H. Addison had arrived in Durban in 1849 in a ship called the Lalla Rookh", bringing with him his son, Friend Addison, who was to be G lady s father. Their place of

origin was Addington in Kent, and as Dr Addison became the first medical superintendent of the hospital in Durban, it was named after that place Friend Addison was one of the sugar pioneers of Natal, and until he sol d out to C. G. Smith and Company in 1919, had owned the whole of Gledho w Sugar Estates (then called Addison Bros.), which comprised thousands of acres under cane, various mills and so on A member of the Natal Legi slative Assembly at one stage, Friend Addison played a prominent part in public life, and was also the first colonel of the Natal Mounted Rifles Gladys was born in Durban on February 27,1890. and spent four years at St Annes, two when the school was in Pietermaritzburg and two after the move to Hilton. She was there with her two sisters, Kathleen and Christe

lle, the latter eventually becoming head girl. All her brothers went to Hilton and some later to Cambridge, as in those days there were no unive rsities in this country.

During her years at St Anne s, Gladys kept wicket for the first eleven an d was in the rifle musketry team, their instructors being various sergean ts from the regiments stationed at Fort Napier. different pursuits indeed from those enjoyed by the schoolgirls of today1 She left school in 1906 and, like so many of the young ladies of those happy far-off days, did no thing but enjoy herself, with perhaps a trip overseas here and there for. as she herself said, there was not really much else one could do Gladys married William Alexander Lester, an Englishman from Devon, in S. t Paul s Church. Durban, on July 29,1919, and they farmed firstly in Zu luland and then at New Guelderland on the North Coast until 1933, when they moved to Kloof, and finally to Durban in 1946. Their daughter, Joy Windeler, who now lives in Johannesburg, went to St Anne s, as did one of her daughters, Caroline Gladys son, Mick Lester, a chartered accountant in practice at Umhlali, went to Hilton, and his daughter, Jane, at tended St Anne s, matriculating in 1973 Mick was chairman of the North Coast region for the St Anne s Centenary Appeal.

In memory of his mother, Mick Lester is to present a stained glass window to the St Anne s chapel Designed and made in Canterbury, England, the window will depict St Elizabeth of Hungary, a saint remembered particularly for her love of flowers. Gladys Lester had a passion for gardening and a ll flowers, birds, animals and anything with a natural beauty, and it is appropriate that the window will depict St Elizabeth carrying a basket of blossoms, whilst at her feet is shown a cluster of anthuriums, which were Glady s favourite flowers
