BUILDING VOTER EDUCATION ON DOOR-TO-DOOR

Volunteer structures must be committed and disciplined. We must build incentives into deployment, eg travel, subsistence and phone calls.

Allocate volunteers according to streets.

" Setting up target groups for volunteers.

" . Volunteer groups to work under street co-ordinators.

Must have all necessary supplies to fulfill their tasks, eg video cassettes, tape recorders, paper, documents etc

Volunteers must be accountable to the Elections Co-ordinating Team at the Branch level.

Back-up of volunteers in terms of literature. We need a dissemination/distribution strategy.
