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Protest by Blacks in Soweto Grows

After Police Killings of 6 Workers

JOHANNESBURG, April 23 — A protest strike by residents of Soweto, Johannesburg's sprawling black satellite city, appeared to gain momentum today as tensions remained high after six black workers were killed by the police,

On the second day of a three-day protest, major Johannesburg companies reported from 20 percent to 70 percent of their work force absent. A spokesman for the bus company serving

Soweto said ridership was down by 50 percent.

' Although the stay-home protest was

called to protest the eviction of resi-

dents taking part in an 11-month-old rent boycott, it also appeared to reflect

pathy with 16,000 striking railroad workers who were dismissed Wednesday after ignoring a deadline to return to work. Six of the railroad workers were killed Wednesday in two clashes with the police in the Johannesburg area.

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Trade union leaders vowed today to continue the six-week-old dispute, described by labor experts as the worst in South African history.

Violence Subsides

The dispute has become a major

challenge to the authority of the Pretoria Government with the approach of

the May 6 general election in which

only whites can take part against a

nal back-drop of defiance by anti-

apartheid groups and sporadic violence by urban guerrillas.

Despite the continuing tension and a heavy security presence in Soweto, no serious incidents of violence were. re-

ported there today.

But on Wednesday, an 18-year-old black was killed when police officers shot at a group described by the South

African Bureau for Information as rioters. The bureau is the only official source of news on civil unrest.

And in Cape Town's mixed-race townships, a 2-yearsold was wounded early today in one of several hand-grenade attacks on houses, including one belonging to a policeman, state officials reported.
