Re: Harare Symposium on the Survival and Development of Children
in the Frontline States and Southern Africa

It gives me great pleasure to extend an invitation to you to attend the Symposium of Artists and Intellectual Workers for Child Survival and Development in the Frontline States and Southern Africa, to be held in Harare from March 1st to 5th, 1988. The Symposium is jointly sponsored by the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF) and the Zimbabwe Committee for Child Survival and Development, of which I am the Chairperson.

The Harare Symposium is the second of a series organised with UNICEF'S assistance. The first one was held in Dakar, Senegal, in March 1987. A copy of the "Dakar Plan of Action" and background material are enclosed.

Like in Dakar, the Harare Symposium is to mobilise Artists and Intellectual Workers to use their respective talents as accomplished communicators to contribute to the survival and development of Africa's children. The five-day programme will conclude with a musical rally.

A recent UNICEF report, "Children on the Frontline", which focusses on the impact of apartheid's destabilization and warfare in Southern Africa states: "A small child dies every four minutes in Angola and Mozambique. In the nine countries of the Southern African Development Coordination Conference (SADCC), some 50,000 children die before the age of five".

The Symposium will focus the attention of the international community on the threat caused by apartheid's economic and political destabilization on the survival and development of children in the Frontline States and Southern Africa. Efforts made by Governments and peoples in the region to address the underlying causes of under-development will also be highlighted.

I understand that Mr. James Grant, Executive Director of UNICEF, has already been in touch with you in this connection.
