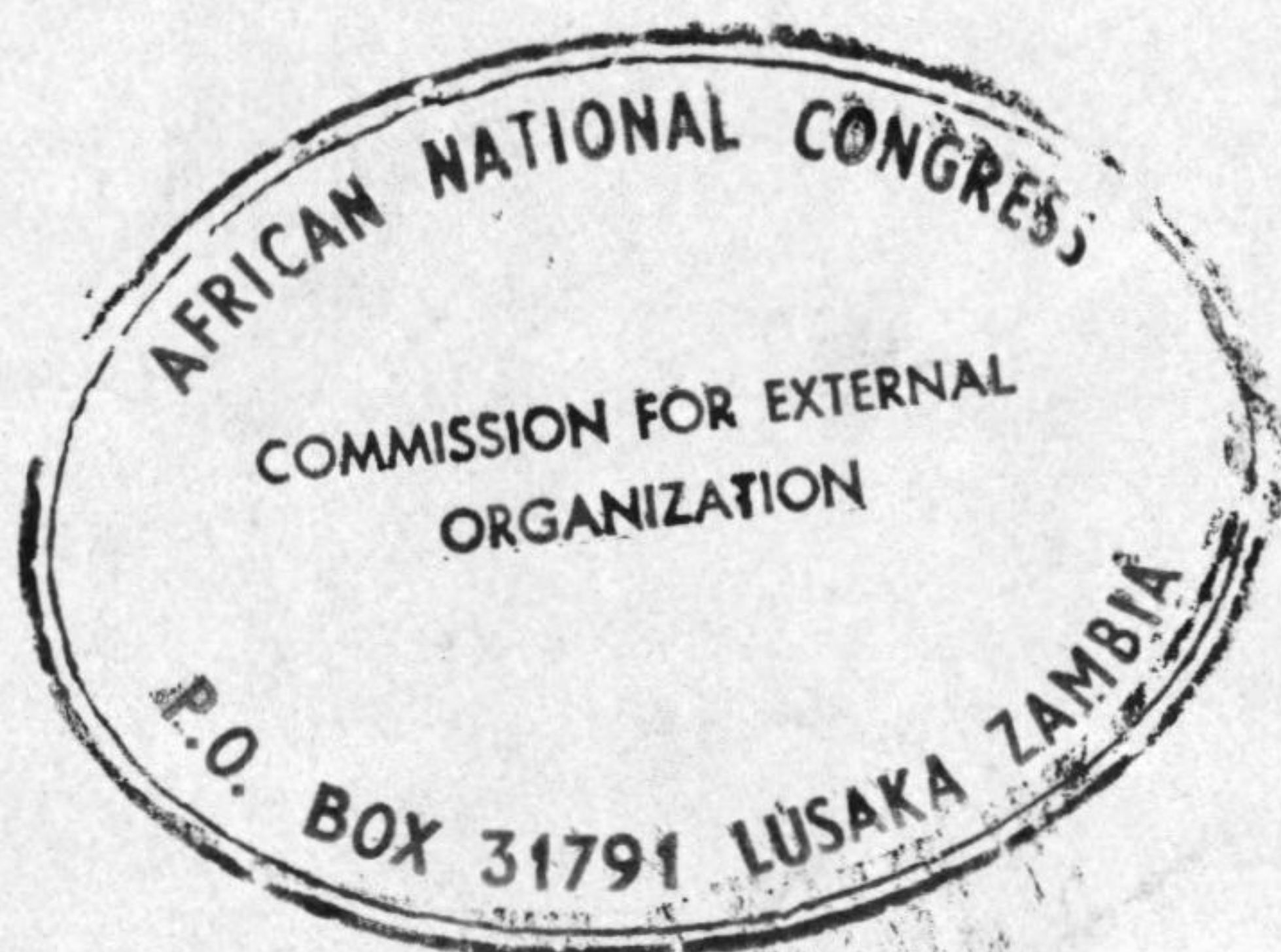



1.0 Introduction

1.1 The chairman explain the purpose of the meeting, as well as the duties of the Task Force as, to outline a plan for the implementation of the NEC Directive on Dakawa.

1.2 A brief outline of the CEO memorandum to the WC of the NEC was given, including recommendations on departments of the movement to be transferred to East Africa. The memorandum is yet to be endorsed by the NEC.

2.0 Situation in Dakawa

2.1 The meeting was briefed about the situation in Dakawa on the basis of a report and recommendations by a 3-man NEC delegation to Dakawa in September, 1988. (For details see Report on Dakawa by NEC delegation of Cdes Mzwai, R. September and J Selebi.

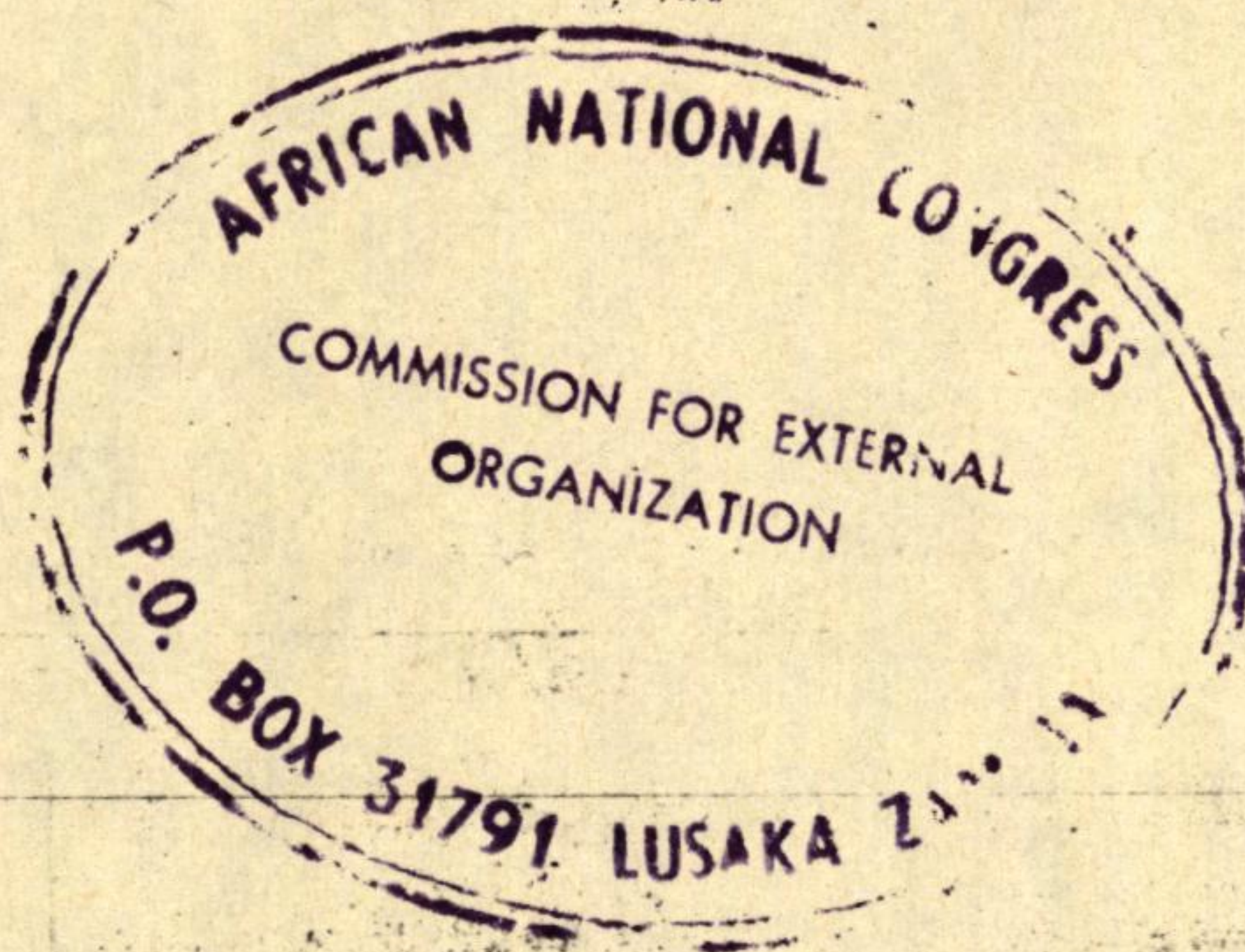
3.0 NEC Directive on Dakawa

3.1 For the implementation of the Dakawa directive, the following sub-committees have been proposed to be formed;-

i) Co-ordination - to co-ordinate the transfer of comrades and structures to East-Africa with relevent departments of the movement.

ii) Transport - is to organise, on the basis of the decided mode of transport, all necessary arrangements for transportation of comrades and departments.

- iii) Logistics - to see to the logistical requirements of such an operation, both in the Lusaka-East Africa route, as well as in East Africa
 - iv) Implementation sub-committee shall be charged with the responsibility of conveying the message to, and arranging the pick-up of comrades recommended for transfer to East Africa.
 - v) Reception sub-committee - to prepare to receive comrades in East Africa. This sub-committee shall be based in Dakawa, but its membership shall be mixed, ie Lusaka and Dakawa.
- 4.0 Implementation of Directive in Phases
- 4.1 Phase One - is to affect all comrades presently not engaged with any department of the movement, together with recommended personnel from departments (pending NEC endorsement)
- 4.2 The RPC, NAT, MHQ, CEO and Branches are to be involved in the execution of Phase One.
- 4.3 Phase Two - is to affect the remaining comrades and departments.
- 4.4 During the implementation period, sub-committee members shall have to be full-time, ie released temporarily from their respective engagements.
- 4.5 The NYS has been requested to assist with an office for the administration of the work of the Task Force.

A BRIEF REPORT ON THE SITUATION IN TANZANIA

11th February, 1989.

The Political situation in East Africa is becoming satisfactory with the functioning of Mazimbu/Dakawa under the Political Committees and the relations with the administration. Our relations with the locals remains that of Ndugu or Comrades and we are working together with the Party Officials and its members and the Government especially the Prime Minister's Office which is meeting us half way in most of the things.

We have a good working relations with the Embassies, N.G.O.S. we have also normalised our relations with the Embassies of the Democratic People's Republic of North Korea through Comrade Violet Weinberg, but Embassies like Rwanda, Yemen People's Republic and Burundi are still waiting for a member of the National Executive to visit their countries.

THE INTERNAL SITUATION IN DAR

In Dar es Salaam the Political work is being done very unsatisfactory due to the EPC which is not re-organised by the RPC, we need a new EPC to pick up the Political Level.

FRIDGE THEFT

Untill today we do not know who carried out the stealing of the Fridge in the Kurasini Resident, and nobody is prepared to tell us who is the thief, this shows the low Political understanding of our comrades. Meetings of the resident are being organised and some problems are partly solved. Because of this theft we were forced to engage two Watchmen and this was done through the CCM Office to Guard our Kurasini Residence

The Office has appointed Cde Martin Maphisa as Acting Deputy Chief Representative, who is doing very well, this is due to the absence of Cde Chiliza who went to GDR, to study a course in Administration.

We have been discussing to consider Solly Rathebe to be Acting Administrative Secretary, Solly is the Head of the DIP Department.

Preparations are going on well in the Construction of the new Office Premises.

TRANSPORT:

We are short of Transport, since the removal of Mechanics from Dar es Salaam our transport running has been paralised we are now using taxis and Public transport.

SMASHING OF CARS

Two cars have been Smashed by our drivers and they are both Cressedas, the Cresseda I was using and another one from Mazimbu. One accident occurred while taking comrade home after a wedding ceremony at 2-00am and other one occurred while I was away in Lusaka on a SACTU Conference. The driver was being hit by another car at 11-30pm, both of these accidents occurred at awkward hours (late) and the cases are still under the police and they will be taken to court soon.

I am arranging for calling a meeting of the RPC to discuss about these matters and hand it over to the disciplinary committee.

VISITORS

We have been receiving visitors who are coming to visit Mazimbu/Dakawa from all over the world, especially Europe, USA, Scandinavian countries.

We have employed some Tanzanian teachers and also need teachers from the front line states, UNESCO's Representative Dr. Frank Mbengo has discussed this issue with us and have reached an agreement of being capable to pay these teachers.

The Nigerian Government has offered to send us about ten teachers, but I suggested that they wait, because we are lacking accommodation for them.

MAZIMBU

There is a great improvement in the case of theft since the changing of the head of the Social Order Unit, stealing has decreased.

The political situation under the ZPC has improved and we hope that Politics will soon reach the required standard needed and everything will be well.

SOCIAL PROBLEMS

These problems are always there, as we all know that where a large number of people stay you have to face such problems. The directorate of the ZPC and RPC are busy trying to reduce them by installing some politics in the society.

SOCIAL PROBLEMS

Comrade Mkuku and Tamar have been appointed as chief Catering Staffs but between these two there has been some conflicts, I am still waiting for a written report from Mazimbu, regarding their conflicts. Cde mkuku was being jailed for three months after he had kicked a primary school child.

Tamar is the wife of Cde Doctor Nnumalo and is a Soviet Nationality.

DAKAWA

In Dakawa things are a bit organised from the point of view that comrades are being accepted and their are deployed.

SOCIAL PROBLEMS IN DAKAWA

Drunkness, some of the cdes are drinking the local drink (Katsaso) which is poison and not good for health there was a suggestion from the Luthuli Detachment that those who don't quit from drinking this thing must be locked up after working hours and on weekends they must be locked up untill Monday, unless they retreat. These cdes are:-

1. Morrise Saleleoga
2. April Left
3. Robert Mogatta
4. Edward Molefa

The second problem is that cdes in Dakawa are having love affairs with the local women and taking them to the settlement to stay with them there, after that they demand supply for these women, of which it is impossible, so they decide to vacate from the place to live with their women outside. We are still finding a solution to takle this problem.

Recommendations:—

We need a Social Worker.
