



- Greater Johannesburg has one of the best climates in the world - with all the best features of Africa, including the renowned African sunset, the light breezes.
- Greater Johannesburg falls within South Africa's summer rainfall region and has an annual rainfall of between 500 and 750 mm (nearly all between October and March).
- Johannesburg is a city of golden sunshine nearly two hours more per day than Sydney, 750 more hours per year than the French Riviera.
- Best of all for the world's athletes (who already come to train here) - our climate is consistent and reliable, and the humidity is very low.




- Most tourists to South Africa come to Greater Johannesburg - 60 per cent of them compared to the Cape's 27 per cent and Natal's 11 per cent.

 Greater Johannesburg can claim to be the nerve centre of the new South Africa.




ECONOMICS

- Johannesburg is home to the new Civic
 Theatre complex, the most modern in Africa.
 It has under construction South Africa's two
 newest museums. There's also Africa's
 leading art gallery, the internationally
 acclaimed Market Theatre, the National
 Symphony Orchestra and a myriad of live
 music centres and clubs and community arts
 centres, all reflecting and regenerating the
 vibrant culture of Africa.

- Only Greater Johannesburg could mount an Olympic Culture Programme that reflects the traditions and cultures of Africa - and matches the best standards in the world.





WORLD CLASS CITY







To win the 2004 Olympic Games, South Africa's candidate city must enjoy world stature. It must be known and recognised for its infrastructure and competence. If there is not to be an unacceptable drain upon national resources, the city must have a good deal of the facilities and services needed to host the first Olympic Games to be held in Africa. It must have a track record of great projects.

To win the 2004 Olympic Games, South Africa needs a world class city.



NFRASTRUCTURE

 Van Wyk and Louw's studies show that Greater Johannesburg already has the vital infrastructure, and the services, expected in a world class city capable of staging the world's biggest event. Only some specific upgrading would be required by and for 2004.



TRANSPORTATION


Johannesburg is the hub of Africa. This central location, as well as its role as the economic fulcrum, is supported by high quality air, rail and road services.

Road and Rail

- Already, Johannesburg has the road network required for an Olympic Games - extending some 2 900km, plus 54km of urban motorway, and 900km of main arterial road.
- More than one million people cross the Johannesburg municipal boundaries every day. Around 260 000 people enter and leave the CBD daily in peak periods - by bus, combi taxi and private car.
- 2 500 public and private buses transport people in and around the area.
- Our combi taxis are unique to South Africa.
 Very frequent and flexible, currently over 13 000 operate in Johannesburg bringing 140 000 passengers into the city centre at peak periods each day.
- The city is the major centre of the national railway network and over 475 trains carrying 125 000 passengers - come through the Johannesburg station every day.
- In addition, the city is building a new light rail transport network. This will provide a fast, highly convenient, reliable and comfortable public transport network, with regular capacity for up to 20 000 passengers per hour. For the 2004 Games, stations will be added to serve the Olympic Stadium and the Olympic Village.







Air Transport

- Jan Smuts, South Africa's largest international airport, already handles some 6,1 million passengers each year - 52 per cent of all South Africa's air traffic. Four regional airports - Lanseria, Rand, Wonderboom and Grand Central - deal with a further 328 000 passengers a year. Already, Greater Johannesburg has the airport capacity to handle an Olympic Games.
- By 1997, the only heliport in the country (with all the necessary supporting services and facilities) will be situated just south of the city's CBD.



HEALTH

 The full range of modern medical facilities is available in this region. There are some 19 900 hospital beds in state-owned and private hospitals and clinics. Greater Johannesburg's health care is the best in Africa in range, technology and professionalism.



CONFERENCE FACILITIES

• The metropolitan area already boasts nearly 50 conference venues, 26 with accommodation. In addition, the proposed Johannesburg Tourist, Trade and Convention Centre in the heart of the city is well on track; and the new Gallagher Estate is the continent's largest one-stop conference facility. Both will be world class facilities, supplementing what is already the best equipped conference city in South Africa.



ACCOMMODATION

 Greater Johannesburg boasts world class hotels, including some 17 of four/five star standing. There are already 32 000 bed nights available in the region, similar numbers to Sydney, the IOC's recent choice for the Olympic Games of AD 2000. And many more new hotels are being built or planned here than in any other area of the country.



MEDIA

 Johannesburg is South Africa's media centre, with the best and most up to date technology and the head offices of both the South African Broadcasting Corporation and M-Net.



 Greater Johannesburg has South Africa's four largest and most prestigious stadia: Ellis Park, FNB, Wanderers and Loftus Versfeld. It has more sports facilities (including for example more synthetic tracks) than any other region of the country; and it attracts the biggest crowds. 70 per cent of South Africa's national sporting bodies are based in Greater Johannesburg.



CULTURE

 Greater Johannesburg is the cultural capital of the nation, with the leading theatres, the most cinemas and live entertainment centres. It's home to South Africa's music, theatre and film industries.



RESOURCES

 Johannesburg is the economic powerhouse of Africa; generating over 60 per cent of South Africa's economic activity, 43 per cent of the country's Gross Domestic Product. The city and region can finance and manage a great Olympic Games for Africa.
