ON THE eve of his return to South Africa, Anglican Bishop Desmond Tutu told the outside world that five to 10 years was the time limit set by blacks in South Africa for a black prime minister.

He added: * that prime minister be Nelson Mandela. $\hat{a}\200\231$

Bishop Tutu was speaking in a committee room of the House of Commons here at the culmination of a campaign for the release of black nationalist imprisoned leader Mandela.

The. petition for his release has been endorsed by 94 MPs, 25 lords, 30 leading churchmen â\200\224 including 19 bishops â\200\224 and 98 sors. Other signatories include 500 organisations, such as the trade unions, repretent ting an estimated 12 million people.

Mr Foot pointed out that the Labour Party had striven for the release of Mandela for many years.
