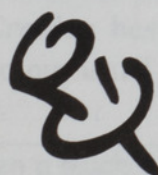

Foundation Day 2000 – President's Report

I am quietly complacent about the achievements of your committee this year - we have managed to perform on all fronts.

The **Second Hand Shop** still ranks as an essential service in the school and life is much easier with the additional assistance we now have - thank you to all those who give up their Wednesday mornings and Monday afternoons.

The **Jumble Sale** managed to raise about R6000 in two hectic hours of sales. With items costing on average about R10 each - this represents high pace business transactions. Anyone wanting tips on how efficiently a jumble can be run should join us this year - it is an exercise in its own class.

We held a **Cocktail Party** for Old Girls who have daughters or granddaughters at the school and the **Heritage Tea** in October was a little different. Those who attended saw a glimpse of life as a current Roedean girl on a scuba diving tour to the Comores. We were also treated to a tour of the boarding houses which John Crawley has so beautifully "done up" and we had our usual matric guided tour of the gardens.

There has been a much greater demand on the **bursary funds** this year with a number of new applications, some of whom are in the junior school. We were also able to assist one old girl in dire need of **financial support**.

I think we have at last managed to get the **newsletter** on the Web. Jackie Topping was busy doing this for us recently and thanks for your help.

I have initiated a project for the SAORA which I believe will enrich the heritage of the school. It was agreed at the Heritage Tea meeting that we pursue the project to recognise "**Old Girls who have made a difference**". To get the project off the ground I called for nominations in the Foundation Day mailing.



The objective of the project is to identify Old Girls who have in some way made a difference, either to the lives of others or in a significant achievement. Once identified the important thing is not only to share information on these achievements with the school, but to create a lasting record of them. Currently we have a list of Old Girls who have achieved success in their careers but no actual record of what they have done.

Not only is the creation of a record a very valuable resource for us as well as for the school, but I also encourage women to recognise each other's achievements. When I read through the nominations I was humbled by what some of us have done and reading the reports was a just reward for our efforts in starting this project.

I should not have been amazed to find that some of the women who were nominated for the recognition were not interested in participating if they were to be singled out as being better than any others. Roedean characteristics throughout! Dolores Fleischer then came to my rescue and proposed the format which we have adopted for this recognition process.

President's Report continued

I received eight fully documented nominations and have worked with these as the information is after all what we need - which is of course just what we want. There were a number of other people proposed and perhaps the girls could help with some research and interviews to find out more and create the necessary record. At lunch we will tell you just a short bit about each.

It has then been agreed that as an annual event one (or more) of these people will be identified to make a presentation to the girls of the school which will fully illustrate what they have achieved since leaving Roedean. It could be that this will be done by someone on their behalf. In addition to this presentation, the information will be appropriately collated into a handsome record for the Roedean Library. This process will be done after Foundation Day.

I believe this project should be continued and should be one of the priorities of the Association.

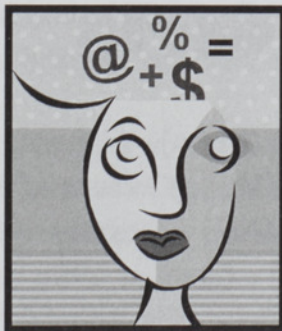
"And the circle they squared, of course"

The class of 1999 seems to have exceeded those "giants of old" in their approach to their studies.

All 74 pupils passed with a University Entrance and overall the girls achieved 118 distinctions between them.

Bronwyn Kirk achieved seven distinctions and Michelle van Zyl six. Five girls achieved five distinctions, five achieved four, nine achieved three and eight achieved two.

There were 24 distinctions in English, 23 in Mathematics (Higher Grade), 16 in Afrikaans and 12 in Physical Science.



All eight girls who wrote Additional Mathematics achieved distinctions: Karabo Morule scoring 100%; Lerato Machaba scoring 99%; and Yiwen Zhang scoring 97%.

It is a tribute to the cultural heritage and diversity of Roedean that distinctions were also achieved in History, Geography, Biology, Accounting, Speech and Drama, French, Portuguese, Spanish and Japanese.

Mrs Nelson said "The results are a reflection of potential realised, steady, hard work and a very high degree of dedication from the girls and their teachers".

Lucy Reyburn (Stratten), 1978, had a baby boy in July 1999 - Campbell. She and her husband Lawrence are thrilled.

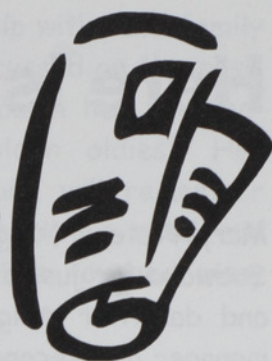

Her determination on the golf course displays her fortitude. She never had the longest drive, but played the game straight down the middle and never strayed from her goal. Her love of nature, particularly the birds and the bush tell us the depths and peace within her soul.

Jane was born to Joan and Ginger. She is the older sister to Tish and Jack and mother of Alli, Gill and Sal. She always maintained a
